Nolan, Ph.D. is a Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychology at Seton Hall University, where she previously served as Associate Dean of Graduate Studies and Director of Women's Studies. She is currently chairing the Statistical Literacy Presidential Taskforce of Division 2 (Society for the Teaching of Psychology). Susan also is active in International Psychology. She is an NGO Representative for the American Psychological Association at the United Nations where she is Treasurer and an Executive Committee Member of the NGO Committee on Mental Health and has been an active member of the NGO Committee on Sustainable Development.
