# Office of the President and Vice Chancellor

In addition to my regular administrative and governance engagements, the following are of note since the last Board meeting.

I sit on the board of the Peatlands Protection Society, a local organization founded by Eliza Olson, KPU honorary degree recipient. KPU has an MOU with the PPS and we hope to collaborate in a number of ways in education and research into this important natural resource.

On June 4 and 5 I was fortunate to attend the EAB Presidential Experience lab at the NVIDA Corporate headquarters in Silicon Valley. The objectives of the lab were to learn about how NVIDIA's advancements are shaping the future of AI; interact with cutting-edge generative AI technologies; look at their application in various fields from music production to medical diagnostics; and to see how educational institutions are leveraging AI to transform operations, education, and research.

On June 10 I chaired the second of the steering committee meetings of the Ridge-Meadows feasibility study.

June 11 to 14 was of course Convocation, which was a glorious event once again, with honorary degrees awarded to Stephanie Cadieux (Canada's first Chief Accessibility Officer), and a posthumous award to Arley Cruthers (McNeney), a wonderful educator and colleague who passed away last year. She was a former Paralympian, and a passionate advocate for social justice, equality, accessibility and inclusion.

On June 17 I joined the Canadian Society for the Study of Higher Education conference (virtually) in a roundtable discussion entitled *Old Bottles, New Wine: Distance Education (old bottles), Teaching and Learning Units (new wine),* and on June 20 and 21<sup>st</sup> I attended the first in person meeting of the University of Illinois President's Advisory Council.

On June 26, I attended the BCAIU presidents' regular meeting in Vancouver.

In July I will be attending the 31<sup>st</sup> International Conference on Learning: *The Converging Challenges for Inclusive Education: Intercultural Competences and Digital Literacies in Global Contexts* at Utrecht University.

## **Experience**

## **Student Experience**

Library Survey of Students: This biennial survey collects information relating to use of and satisfaction with various library resources, facilities, and services. The survey, sent to half of all students enrolled in the Spring 2024 semester, ran from February 8 to March 3. A report of the results was provided to the University Librarian on April 15.


Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Program Completion Survey: This is a recurring survey for students about to graduate from the BSN program. Students provide feedback about the program including their development of professional competencies and overall satisfaction. The survey of spring 2024 graduates ran from March 1 to March 24, and results were reported to the program on April 15.

International Peer Mentorship Program Surveys: This program matches senior students at KPU with new international students in order to increase social connections and help them navigate services and resources while studying at KPU. The survey of mentees captures how students did or did not make use of the program, whether and how it benefitted them, and their suggestions for improvements. Program mentors were also surveyed, about their reasons for applying to be a mentor, benefits and challenges of being a mentor, and their perceptions and suggestions regarding training. Both surveys ran between April 2 and April 21, and reports of the results were delivered to the Office of Global Engagement on May 6.

Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) Survey: This survey was sent to students enrolled in COIL courses at KPU (i.e., courses in which a portion are taught collaboratively with a partner institution abroad, and students work together on a joint assignment). Covering their engagement levels, opinions about delivery methods, and other forms of feedback, the survey ran from March 27 to April 14. A report of the results was provided to the Office of Global Engagement on May 6.

Student Satisfaction Survey: This survey collects a broad range of information from students on their KPU experience to identify areas for improvement. Reporting in this period included two enhancements to the 2022 Student Satisfaction Survey Dashboard. It now includes a tab to display all openended comments., Users are able to select questions of interest and display comments by specific parameters (i.e., the student's faculty, domestic/international status, and their overall level of satisfaction with their educational experience at KPU). The other enhancement was the inclusion of graphs that show the breakdown of students views about being fairly treated at KPU in greater detail by breaking down responses based on students' background. For instance, compared

responses of fair treatment for LGBQ+ and non-LGBQ+ students as illustrated below:



## **Student and Employee Health and Wellness**

The Mindful Campus Initiative is a federally funded program led by Ontario-based OCAD University. The program consists of a series of courses on mindfulness and resilience strategies to improve well-being of staff, students, and faculty on postsecondary campuses across Canada. The program was rolled out at the Wilson School of Design September 2023 and OPA has been supporting administration of surveys as part of the program's evaluation. Pre-course surveys measuring current levels of resilience and mental well-being of the initiative's registered students and employees were conducted in the Fall 2023 and Spring 2024 terms. A post-course survey was also administered for registered students and employees to measure changes in resilience and well-being over time. During this reporting period, student pre- and post-course survey results as well as employee post-course results were provided to the Mindful Campus Initiative program coordinators located at the OCAD University in Toronto.

## Sustainability

## **Cultural, Social and Environmental Sustainability**

Provided 2023 (calendar year) FTE data for the Climate Change Accountability Report to meet legislative reporting requirements under the Climate Change Accountability Act (section 8.1) and the Carbon Neutral Government (CNG) Regulation.

Provided data to Campus and Community Planning to assist in their Sustainability Tracking Assessment and Ranking System (STARS) reporting, a global sustainability standard created by and for higher education.

Sustainability Survey: This survey was sent to all KPU students and employees, and included questions on everyday decision -making, transportation behaviours and interests, and knowledge of sustainability issues. The survey was open to employees from February 5 to February 25, and to students from February 8 to March 3. A report of the results supporting KPU's STARS submission was sent to the Office of Sustainability on March 27, and the full results were sent on

April 23.

## **Integrated Planning**

Ongoing enhancements and updates of OPA Power BI dashboards: Academic Standing, Grade Distribution, Credential, Applicant Funnel, Enrolment Tracking, Current Enrolment, Over-Enrolment, Seats, Employee, Retention Overview, Limited-Intake Retention, and others.

## **Enrolment Planning**

Delivered a presentation on Enrolment Projections for Governance Retreat on May 7. This presentation included past domestic and international enrolment trends, estimates of enrolments for this year, and projections for FY30. The financial implications of the decline in international enrolments was also included.

Monitoring international applications on an ongoing basis to estimate the impact on enrolments for Fall 2024 and Spring 2025.

Developed and distributed an infographic fact sheet that provides an overview of enrolment (e.g., headcounts, FTEs, and international student seat utilization) for the most recent semester and academic year for KPU decision-makers. In this reporting period, a fact sheet was produced for Summer 2024. Fact sheets are produced each term following the stable enrolment date and are published on OPA's new SharePoint site.

Created the Stable Enrolment report for Summer 2024 as of May 20, 2024 in the PowerBI Enrolment Tracking Dashboard.

Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Summer 2024, Fall 2024, and Spring 2025, are currently running and dashboards are updated weekly. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted, and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of international applicants.

Applicant Tracking Reports: Provides weekly updates during the final six months of the applicant cycle on expected conversions of applicants to admitted, and admitted to enrolled. Once registration begins, the report also includes the number of admitted who actually registered in courses. The weekly updates for Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 are ongoing.

## Creativity

## Research, Scholarship and Innovation Partnerships

Speaker Series Survey: This survey collected feedback from attendees at the Science World Speaker Series, which featured the Director of KPU's Applied Genomics Centre, Paul Adams.

The survey asked about attendees' overall satisfaction, interest and suggestions for future events, and demographics. It launched at the event's conclusion on February 15, and closed on February 21, with a report of the results delivered KPU's Lead Advisor, Work-Integrated Learning on February 26.

Two demographic surveys were conducted in order to meet research grant EDI requirements. The first was sent to members of the Applied Genomics Centre research team, launching on March 6 and closing March 17. A report of the results was provided to the Centre's leadership on March 21 for submission to Fisheries and Oceans Canada. The second was sent to student researchers in the Wilson School of Design, launching on March 22 and closing on April 14. A report of the results was sent to the Dean's Office on May 6, for submission to the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada.

#### Quality

## **Continuous Improvement**

Published a dashboard called Graduate Outcomes that presents results from four surveys conducted by BC Stats: (1) Baccalaureate Graduate Survey, (2) Diploma, Associate Degree, Certificate Survey, (3) Trades Foundation and Trades-Related Vocational Outcomes Survey, and (4) Apprenticeship Student Outcomes Survey. The dashboard allows users to view KPU graduate employment and education outcomes and compare them to similar programs at other institutions.

Program Review: OPA's Quality Assurance (QA) Team supports the Program Review process, from planning to data collection to coordination with the Senate Standing Committee on Program Review (SSCPR). The work the QA team supported this reporting period includes:

- Asian Studies external review site visit took place on February 28 & 29, 2024.
- Operations and Supply Chain Management student, alumni, faculty, and discipline sector surveys were conducted and reports of results were provided.
- Bachelor of Nursing and Computer Aided Design and Drafting student, alumni, faculty, and discipline sector surveys were conducted.

Course Feedback: Course Feedback surveys for Spring 2024 were conducted for 1,933 sections. The Quality Assurance Team prepared and delivered 1,186 individual reports to instructors. In addition, 102 aggregated reports were delivered to post-probationary instructors. Deans received the reports for probationary instructors and aggregated reports for post-probationary instructors. The overall course feedback response rate for Spring 2024 was 27%, slightly higher than the rate for Spring 2023 (26%).

#### **Holding each other Responsible for Promises and Expectations**

Completed major revisions to IM7 (Management of Surveys) Policy and Procedure, which was approved by the President March 8<sup>th</sup>. The policy and procedure required revision as they were over 10 years old and did not reflect current context and process. A comprehensive review of similar policies at other post-secondary institutions and extensive consultation with a range of individuals and groups across KPU informed the changes.

Academic Plan Survey: This survey was sent to all KPU employees in order to gather feedback on KPU's draft Academic Plan 2027. Respondents were asked how much they agreed or disagreed that each of the proposed actions in the Plan would help achieve its four main goals. They were also asked to provide input if they thought anything was missing from the Plan. The survey was open from February 26 to March 10, and a report of the results was sent to Academic Plan developers on March 27.

with over-enrolment due to Last Class to Graduate (LCG) in Summer 2024 for providing to KFA in compliance with article 11.02.a of the KPU-KFA Collective Agreement.

Provided the total count and proportion of CPS classes among the total classes provided by the university in compliance with LOU#4 in the KPU-KFA Collective Agreement.

# Accountability and Transparency to Friends, Communities, Partners and Governments

Submitted the Final FY 2023-24 FTE Report to the Ministry of PSFS.

Completed the draft Institutional Accountability Plan and Report for submission to PUE. The Institutional Accountability Plan and Report is reported annually to the Ministry by all BC's public post-secondary institutions. The report includes KPU goals, a summary of our key accomplishments addressing our strategic priorities, and VISION 2026 performance measure results along with contextual information to describe KPU's role in providing service to our students and communities.

Completed the IRCC Compliance Report by providing the status of 7,325 International students as of Spring 2024.

In coordination with the Faculty of Academic and Career Preparation and KPU International, provided data in partial completion of the 2024 Submission to Languages Canada.

In coordination with Finance, provided data at the request of the audit team working on the financial statement audit of the Polytechnic Ink Publishing Society (PIPS), a non-profit society, that governs KSA's publication (The Runner).

Submitted the KPU response to the 2024 Tuition and Living Allowance Survey conducted by Statistics Canada.

Provided data to support the Communications and Media Relations Office's submission to the 2025 Maclean's Colleges Questionnaire.

Submitted to the annual IR Data Collection of Polytechnics Canada. This includes Application, Enrolment and Credential count summaries.

## **Organizational Development**

## **Employee Engagement**

The pilot project for the Support Staff Ride Along Program was successfully launched in the Spring semester. The program provides an opportunity for support staff to develop connections, share and enhance jobs specific knowledge and skills, engage with others to exchange ideas, and promote a sense of community within the organization. To date, we've received positive feedback from the pilot departments, which is encouraging for the program's future success. We anticipate a University-wide rollout of the program in early Fall this year.

## **Employee Workshops**

Human Resources offered several professional development workshops and webinars to KPU employees which included: Skillfully Responding to Distress, Coaching for Performance; Cultivating Calm: Mindfulness, Stress, and You; Taleo Hiring Manager/Recruitment Support Training; True Colors; Understanding and Preventing Burnout; The Working Mind for Employees; and, The Working Mind for Managers.

The team also facilitated a variety of needs-based sessions for various departments/areas at KPU, including:

- Employee Engagement Workshops
- Faculty Chairs Circle Series
- Department Strategic Planning Workshop
- Senior Leadership Development Session (Practical Tools for Senior Leaders)

These interactive workshops resulted in actionable next steps to help implement employee engagement initiatives, enhance professional development and set and achieve strategic goals.

## **People Services**

## Compensation

Submission of the annual Executive Compensation Disclosure for KPU occurred in May. In British Columbia, organizations subject to the *Public Sector Employers Act* are statutorily required to disclose all compensation that is both accrued and paid to the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and the next four highest ranking/paid executives with decision-making authority earning an annualized base salary of \$125,000 or more during a fiscal year. The Public Sector Employers' Council Secretariat (PSEC Secretariat) is responsible for coordinating and analyzing the executive compensation disclosure.

#### **Health and Benefits**

The Health and Benefits Team has finalized the benefit plan adjustments for the administrative employee group, marking the completion of all plan adjustments. Collective bargaining improvements for BCGEU and faculty members included retroactive enhancements, leading to premium increases. To address these increases, retroactive premium adjustments were calculated and communicated to affected employees responsible for contributing a portion of their premiums to maintain coverage. Moreover, annual premium adjustments effective April 1<sup>st</sup> for all employee groups were calculated and communicated to affected parties.

## **Human Resources Information Systems (HRIS)**

Over the past few months, HRIS finalized multiple system reports including the mass faculty name change for Faculty of Science and Melville School of Business. Alongside Finance, HRIS supported the fiscal year end encumbrance clearance and budget roll processes.

## **Payroll**

Payroll has been extremely busy during these past few months working diligently to pay retro to GEU and faculty employees as a result of collective bargaining. Retro payments for GEU staff were paid in February and faculty were paid in May. During this time, Payroll also processed employee T4s at the end of February and completed their fiscal year end reporting and account reconciliations in March.

## **People Relations**

## **Human Resources Administration**

Following the ratification of the collective agreements, the HR Administration team updated processes to align with new language. The team conducted a detailed workload analysis which identified training opportunities for all employee groups on how best to submit employee information changes and contracts for processing. The team also supported the processing of retroactive payments for BCGEU and KFA employees.

#### **Presidential Search**

Over the past few months, many employees and students participated in town hall discussions facilitated by Leaders International, a leading Canadian executive search firm, to help shape the presidential candidate profile. This profile is intended to showcase KPU and define the ideal candidate for the role, which differs from a job description focusing solely on position details. Thank you to everyone who participated in these sessions and provided valuable input as part of this critical process.

The search for KPU's next president has officially been launched. The competition is now live on <u>Leaders International's</u> webpage and <u>KPU's Career Centre</u>. Early in the new academic year, the Presidential Search Advisory Committee will convene to review and short list applications. The remainder of this process will unfold throughout the fall semester.

#### Risk and Security

## **Emergency Planning**

Emergency Planning recently organized an active shooter tabletop exercise in collaboration with the Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) team, focusing on recovery strategies in the event of such a crisis. Following its success, a tailored version of the exercise was also conducted for the Facilities team. Ongoing enhancements from this session include the establishment of protocols for handling threatening phone calls.

KPU actively engaged in Emergency Preparedness Week at the start of May to help foster a culture of readiness both on campus and at home.

The blackout blinds project has reached its conclusion, with blinds now installed across KPU's Surrey, Langley, Richmond, and Cloverdale campuses. These installations offer added protection during security threats.

## Occupational Health & Safety (OH&S)

A consultant conducted a comprehensive safety review of equipment and machinery in all KPU Tech shops. Work has begun to develop an action plan based on their recommendations.

OH&S organized its annual training for Joint Occupational Health and Safety Committee members. This year, the focus was on safety inspections. The fourth annual Health and Safety Week was also celebrated in May and featured a safety-themed Jeopardy game for all KPU employees.

To ensure the health and safety of employees conducting field research, a Field Work Safety Plan and guidance document were developed. This plan documents hazard assessments, communication plans, emergency procedures, and safety training.

The annual OH&S summary report was recently published which highlights initiatives and key performance indicators related to KPU's Safety Program. One of the resulting action items is to increase the completion percentage of the health and safety orientation. Strategies will be put in place over the next year to help achieve this goal.

## **Risk Management**

Risk continues to support the university with various ongoing engagements including the management of insurance claims and renewal of the Optional Property Program. This program provides insurance coverage for all non-core KPU buildings which includes buildings not used for educational purposes.

#### **Security Operations**

During this reporting period, Security generated approximately 201 Incident Reports. The team responded to various issues, including alarms, property crimes, suspicious activities, trespassing, and aggressive behavior.

Security also provided continuous support to the threat assessment team, Board elections, campus events, and VIP visits. Enhanced support was given to a staff member facing elevated personal safety concerns. Additionally, a feedback tab was added to our website to facilitate receiving feedback, positive and constructive, from the KPU community.

# Office of the Chief Financial Officer

The Finance department celebrated and said goodbye to FY2024, and hello to FY2025.



## **Financial Services**

Sunmeet Grover, a Financial Coordinator, resigned and the team welcomed Lara Tiu, an Auxiliary employee, to support in the Financial Coordinator role. Thank you Sunmeet for your contributions to KPU and welcome Lara!

## **Procurement Services**

In February 2024, the Procurement Services team participated in a workshop aimed at acquiring insights into Construction Manager at Risk ("CMAR") procurement. CMAR is a method of project delivery in which KPU contracts a construction manager to take on a project during its design phase and oversee it through project closeout. The workshop delved into the advantages and disadvantages of the CMAR methodology when compared to approaches currently employed by KPU.

In April 2024, the Procurement leadership team engaged in a webinar hosted by the Canadian Association of University Business Officers ("CAUBO"), centered on Canadian Sustainability Disclosure Standards ("CSDS") reporting. Although adherence to CSDS reporting remains voluntary until mandated, Procurement Services is taking proactive steps to research the requirements applicable to the postsecondary institution sector to initiate planning for any required reporting.

Procurement enabled Public Procurement training for all members of the team.

## Strategic Projects in the Procurement Cycle:

The following projects were completed or in progress during the period of March 2024 to May 2024:

- Project Manager for student housing solicitation completed and contract awarded in April 2024.
- Feasibility study for Post-Secondary Education & Training in Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows contract awarded in April 2024.
- Building management system replacement solicitation closed in April 2024. Proposals are currently being evaluated.
- Main electrical room upgrade solicitation closed on May 6,
   2024. Proposals are currently being evaluated.
- Cleaning services auditor solicitation is now posted.
- Construction Management Services for KPU Child Care and Early Childhood Education project solicitation closed for submissions on May 15, 2024. This project will employ the CMAR methodology.
- Accent lighting for all campuses' solicitation is currently open and will close for submissions on June 10, 2024.
- Campus shuttle services solicitation is currently in progress with contract award anticipated in July 2024.



## **Provost Presents**

On May 28<sup>th</sup> C. Edward Watson, Vice President for Digital Innovation at AAC&U, presents "Al's Implications for Higher Education: Our Shared Responsibilities in a New Era of Learning and Thinking." Al is being used in our university classrooms, and there is also growing demand for graduates who possess Al competencies and literacies. Drawing from Watson's new book, Teaching with Al: A Practical Guide to a New Era of Human Learning (Johns Hopkins University Press), this presentation explores the evolving Al landscape and details the companion challenges and opportunities that are emerging for higher education. The core focus of this keynote is on concrete approaches and strategies higher education can adopt, both within the classroom and across larger curricular structures, to best prepare students for the life that awaits them after graduation.

## **Policy and Academic Affairs Team**

# <u>Full Written Proposal on Establishment of Faculty of Graduate Studies</u>

Following a university-wide consultation process from January to March 2024, the Faculty of Graduate Studies Full Written Proposal Task Force endorsed the full written proposal and submitted it to the April 22<sup>nd</sup> Senate meeting, where in a unanimous vote Senate recommended the Board of Governors approve the establishment of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FoGS). The full written proposal was then submitted to the May 8<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Board Governance Committee and the Board meeting on May 22 for final approval.

## Policy AC5 Graduate Degree Studies, Omnibus Policy Revision

After completing Phase Two Posting in early March, draft Policy AC5 and omnibus policy revision received advice from the Polytechnic University Executive to proceed to their respective approving jurisdictions for final approval. At the April 22<sup>nd</sup> Senate meeting, Policy AC5 and omnibus policy revision were approved. Two Board-approved Procedures within the omnibus package, AC13 Minimum Qualifications for Faculty Members and AC10 Development and Change of Senate-Approved Programs, were then submitted to the May 8<sup>th</sup> Board Governance Committee and the May 22<sup>nd</sup> Board meeting for final

approval.

## **Policy Consultation**

Policy and Procedure AD5 Honorary Degrees and Awards is currently undergoing consultation, with plans to consult Senate Standing Committees on Tributes and Policy in late May prior to Phase Two Posting in June.

Policy and Procedure AC3 Program Review completed Phase One Posting in late March and is currently undergoing consultation, with plans for Phase Two Posting in early June.

#### Annual Report, Policy Sponsor's Report

Per Procedure GV2 Policy Protocol, the President will report annually to the Board and Senate on University Policies developed and reviewed during this academic year and the action taken or recommended, including all Policies or Procedures that went through the clerical change process.

The Policy and Academic Affairs team is currently reviewing progress and consolidating status updates for all 101 KPU Policies and Procedures. The team will present the AY2023-2024 Policy Annual Report to the Senate Standing Committee on Policy on May 29 and the Board Governance Committee on June 19.

In addition, the team is currently consolidating progress reports and requests for review for individual Policy Sponsors at KPU. These reports will also include Policies and Procedures due for review during AY2024-2025. In compliance with GV2 Policy Protocol, the team will reach out to the Policy Sponsors in June to initiate the AY 2024-2025 policy review process.

# <u>Updates to Enhance Accessibility of Policy Blog and Consultation Engine</u>

The Policy and Academic Affairs team is committed to creating a more person-centered and inclusive space for effective service and meaningful resources for the KPU community. This goal closely aligns with the Vision 2026 goals identified in Accessibility Plan 2023.

With support from Teaching and Learning Commons, the team has implemented the new accessibility plugin to the KPU Policy Blog and Consultation Engine on WordPress. This feature supports users to adjust font sizes and contrast settings to their preferences, ensuring a seamless browsing experience for all.

The team is currently conducting an inventory check on all internal and external facing communication and documentation within the policy development portfolio, with the aim of making continuous updates and adjustments to enhance accessibility. The team will provide more information in the coming months.

#### **Curriculum Support Team**

The team has received final approvals for the newest module of curricular software, CIM-Programs, and has progressed to the soft launch stage of this project. This module of software integrates with the University calendar and with course outlines which will reduce duplication in documentation and permitting standardization in workflow. The Curriculum Support Team has developed training materials with the aim to provide presentations and offer workshops to governance groups in each Faculty in order to support the transition of this new software.

KPU Flex has extended the ePortfolio pilot project to accommodate additional applicants. The team has received feedback from applicants, faculty assessors, and other administrative units, and will be ready to report on the findings of the Pilot project shortly, with considerations for the expansion of this initiative.

## **Academic Integrity Team**

## **Draft Coach**

Draft Coach has been launched to all KPU students alongside other various resources. Draft Coach is an optional tool that students can use to receive feedback on their writing through the similarity check, citation check, and grammar check. The Academic Integrity team has been providing information about Draft Coach across the university through student workshops, tabling on multiple campuses, faculty presentations and presenting to the ACP Faculty Council and ELS Department.

## **Student Supports**

The unit presented on December 6 to all the incoming international students for Spring 2024 as part of the International Live Virtual Orientation. The team participated in Student Resource Fairs at multiple campuses during the January 8-12th First Year Festival to engage first-year students. The student ambassadors also supported some of the WRTG 1100 sections through presentations on academic integrity, and sharing of their student perspective to engage their peers.

On January 26, the team provided an in-person training session to 16 new international peer mentors to help them feel more confident with starting the conversation around academic integrity with their mentees. The Student Ambassadors provided

a training presentation to Spring and Summer 2024 Melville Volunteer Student Mentors, who mentor new Post-Baccalaureate and Graduate students in the Melville School of Business, as well as lower year students who are intending to pursue a BBA or BTech degree. The unit also participated in the March 28<sup>th</sup> Trivia Event hosted by the Faculty of Arts, to continue engaging and educating students around academic integrity and sharing resources.

Alejandra Silvera shared her student perspective as part of a BC Campus FLO Panel on the Ethical and Creative Use of Artificial Intelligence in Post-secondary Education in mid-January.

## **Faculty Resources**

An Academic Integrity Resource Shelf has been developed to bring together into one place the academic integrity resources at KPU, and it was well received by Dean's Offices and faculty. The resource shelf is divided into 4 sections: resources for before a breach has occurred, resources for after a potential breach has been identified, other resources for faculty, and resources to share with students. Updates have also been made to the Academic Integrity SharePoint Reporting Tool with the support of IT to improve existing processes and address pain points.

In collaboration with the Teaching & Learning Commons, a syllabus statement resource on academic integrity and artificial intelligence was created. The document covers considerations for instructors when looking at how to decide on and communicate their expectations around generative artificial intelligence tools in their classes.

Restorative Justice Training for faculty and staff, facilitated by Alana Abramson, was held on March 8 and March 15.

## Other

The team piloted a conference centre exam session in December 2023 in partnership with Scheduling and the Accounting departments where some sections of Accounting exams took place in the conference center alongside other sections to reduce the possibility of academic misconduct. This project continued in the Spring 2024 semester.

The team has experienced some staffing changes while continuing to support KPU's educative approach to academic integrity. Susan Xia has moved into the Interim Manager of Academic Integrity role, Alejandra Silvera has moved into a temporary 6-month Academic Integrity Strategist role, and Ikjyot Rehal's Academic Integrity Liaison role has been made permanent.

## **Continuing Professional Studies Team**

## **CPS Operations**

A review of the financial status of the Continuing and Professional Studies (CPS) overall in the 2023-24 fiscal year shows that it is profitable. This was significantly driven by two factors. First, the Faculty of Health generated substantial revenue because of the increased number of sections and high student demand. This can be attributed to the policy changes with the nursing regulatory body, British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives, which expanded the credentialing agencies, simplified the assessment process, and increased funding for the bursary program for internationally-educated nurses, among others. Second, within CPS, cost-efficiency measures have been initiated to streamline processes and reduce operating costs, all while improving customer service and expanding course offerings.

## **Future Skills Grant**

The CPS team completed its offering of the Future Skills Grant in partnership with the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills. A total of 85 grants were given to students who enrolled in CPS courses. There were 63 students who received funding, including 14 students who availed of multiple grants ranging from two to six. Overall, KPU students had a 99% completion rate.

## **Work Integrated Learning Team**

Building on KPU's Work-Integrated Learning guidebooks, available on the Work-Integrated Learning website, a range of resources are now available for faculty and students taking part in Work-Integrated Learning at KPU. These include Occupational Health and Safety videos, WIL forms specific to the Wilson School of Design, the launch of online photo waivers for Work-Integrated Learning, and an online, non-admission Criminal Record Check process for students who may need this information for Work-Integrated Learning. These emergent offerings from the Office of the Provost accompany the already well established Service Learning Assistants (SLAs) and Practicum meeting group, both running regularly since 2021.

## **Including All Citizens Team**

# Trainings and Events hosted by the Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities

**Highlight:** The Second Annual Anti-Racism Symposium, Surrey Campus (March 21, 2024)

The Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities proudly hosted the Second Annual Anti-Racism Symposium on March 21st, 2024, aligning with the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. Professor of Sociology and Religion and Culture at Wilfrid Laurier University, Dr. Jasmin Zine, delivered a powerful keynote presentation titled "Under Siege: Islamophobia and the 9/11 Generation," based on her book of the same title. Other distinguished guest speakers included the Parliamentary Secretary for Anti-Racism, Mable Elmore, and MLA Hon. Raj Chouhan.

The afternoon session featured an academic panel, showcasing the insightful presentations of both KPU students and employees, fostering an atmosphere of dialogue and learning.

The Symposium garnered significant interest, drawing more than 200 attendees to the Conference Centre on Surrey Campus, exemplifying KPU community's dedication to addressing and combating racial discrimination.





## Anti-racism Training

- Dr. Leland Harper (faculty, Philosophy) has been hosting a "Future of Race in Canada Speaker Series" with OEIC's support (April to June 2024). The series is sponsored by PDEC sponsorship fund.
- OEIC has partnered with Hook or Crook Consulting to provide KPU employees with six online anti-racism workshops (April to December 2024). Two workshops have been offered so far: Unpacking White Supremacy; and Intersectional and Justice Oriented Leadership.

Advancing Accessibility at KPU: Training for Executive Leadership with Untapped Accessibility was completed (March 4, 2024).

OEIC distributed, via SAFA, \$20K in award funding to 13 worthy recipients of the Pride Advocacy Student Award. The awards were coordinated and adjudicated by the Pride Advocacy Group (PAG). A reception is being planned for Pride month (June 2024) to celebrate and connect the award recipients as well as 2SLGBTQIA+ grads and alums.

PAG hosted a design consultation meeting of the Surrey Rainbow Hub—a community group working to establish a 2SLGBTQIA+ community centre in Surrey—at KPU Civic on April 17<sup>th</sup>.

Members of PAG attended various community events across April and early May 2024, including the Surrey Pride "So You Think You Can Drag" Fundraiser on April 13<sup>t</sup>, the Surrey Board of Trade Rainbow Entrepreneur Roundtable on April 19<sup>th</sup>, and a showing of the documentary film "Any Other Way: The Jackie Shane Story" hosted by Pride at Work as part of the Doxa Film Festival.

On May 15<sup>th</sup>, PAG with OEIC's support, hosted an online webinar on "Understanding SOGI: Fear vs. Fiction" featuring panelists Dutch (Regional Manager, Arc Foundation), Annie Ohana (Social Justice teacher, LA Matheson Secondary School), KPU student Destiny Lang, and Dr. Tara Lyons (faculty, Criminology), and moderated by Dr. Romy Kozak. The webinar aimed to dispel common misconceptions of SOGI and had over 90 registrants.

On May 17<sup>th</sup>, PAG representatives participated in the first ever Langley School District GSA day at the Langley Fine Arts School. This event brought together members of Gay-Straight/ Gender-Sexuality Alliances from secondary schools across SD35. Dr. Romy Kozak and FSO staff member Kayla Garvin presented at the event on various KPU initiatives to welcome, support, and celebrate 2SLGBTQIA+ students and employees.



PAG members Dr. Gordon Cobb (faculty, Music), Dr. Romy Kozak (faculty, English), and student Liam Ruel completed final edits on a series of short films featuring 2SLGBTQIA+ students at KPU sharing their perspectives on their experiences at KPU. These films are intended to be used at upcoming presentation and events.

PAG member Dr. Tara Lyons (faculty, Criminology) and her research team are expanding their well-received study on the experiences of 2SLGBTQIA+ students at KPU to include several other teaching-focused post-secondary institutions in the Lower Mainland, namely UFV, CapU, Langara, BCIT, Douglas, and VCC.

- Youth Train in Trades 2024: Once again in 2024, The Learning Centre (TLC) hosted an exciting event for the Youth Train in Trades students. KPU's Youth Train in Trades dual credit program allows high school students, with the support of their high school career counsellor, to attend trades training at KPU. These select students receive credit from their high schools and from KPU for the training they complete. TLC is committed to this initiative and providing support for these students to aid with the challenging transition from a high school learning environment to a post-secondary learning environment. Before class starts, incoming students have the opportunity to attend a transition conference to help them understand the expectations for learning at KPU. Student attend a 4hour training session and engaging in a variety of interactive learning experiences. They have an opportunity to meet some of their peers, learning strategists, and learn about the supports that are available to them at KPU. This year, TLC provided 4 in-person sessions, as well as one online session for students who were unable to attend in person. The team involved in this event included two learning strategists, one learning advisor, one learning assistant as well as 4 peer tutors. We served a total of 103 students.



- Long Night Against Procrastination: In collaboration with the Surrey Campus Library, TLC hosted the Long Night Against Procrastination for the second year in a row on April 11<sup>th</sup>, 2024. We provided 6 Peer Tutors to support students on a drop-in basis for the duration of the evening event. Elizabeth Spalding provided coordination and supervision of the event as well as hosting the 5 therapy dogs in TLC. Students shared that this was a wonderful event to wrap up classes for the term and start their exam preparation.
- On May 7, students enrolled in the English Upgrading program at Tsawwassen First Nation visited the KPU Surrey
  Campus. They visited the Gathering Place, met with Indigenous Services for Students, and were given a tour of the
  Surrey campus by the Future Students Office, who also
  gave an overview of the broad range of programs offered
  at KPU. Lunch was also provided by the ACP Dean's
  Office.

These annual articulation meetings bring together faculty representatives from across British Columbia who teach Adult Upgrading courses at BC's public postsecondaries. Articulation is an important part of ensuring program rigor and relevance, and enables transferability of Adult Upgrading credits across our province. The ABE Articulation Steering Committee approves working groups' reports and course equivalency for each of the Adult Upgrading discipline units in BC: Adult Literacy Fundamental, Computer Studies, Education and Career Planning, English, First Peoples Studies, Mathematics, Science, and Social Sciences.

EACS department instructor and chair, Diane Van der Gucht, presented at ACP Brown Bag lunch series 'The pondering of diversity and inclusion in organizational development through the lens of change management models and interwoven with elements of natural ecosystems' exploring what organizations have in common with elements of a natural ecosystem and these commonalities to learn about how organizations, like natural ecosystems, can shift, change, and adapt to thrive.

EACS instructors Diane Van der Gucht and Simon Driver presented a workshop for visiting students at the Open Doors Open Minds event. The workshop, entitled 'Future Me: Discovering Your Career Interests and Passions,' invited participants to explore and discover their career interests and passions through a series of creative and interactive activities, with the objective of leaving participants inspired and energized to keep thinking about their career and the EACS program as a possible next step to help them to move toward their goals.



On April 11<sup>th</sup> 2024 the **EACS program Entrepreneurship Focus** Cohort hosted a tabling event, showcasing their final entrepreneurial projects. The tabling event (KPU Surrey- Spruce Atrium)

was open to all KPU students, staff and faculty. The event offered a formal overview of the pilot project, a panel conversation with the audience and then moved towards a tabling event where guests had a chance to visit the EACS entrepreneurship students and view their hands-on project presentations. We ran the event twice (10:30am-11:45am & 1pm-2:15pm), with a total attendance of 80 people (not including passersby).

**Options**, had an open house at their Language Assessment & Referral Centre. This was attended by English Language Studies department faculty member, Youngsoo Song. We appreciate the opportunities to connect with our community partners as we seek to increase domestic enrolments in light of the federal government's cap on international students.

## Initiatives/Activities

The ACP Dean's office now has its own ELS Duolingo English Test (DET) Dashboard. This dashboard allows us to purchase "Candidate Coupons" to give to potential students who need to take the DET. The goal of this initiative is to reduce financial barriers to access at KPU. Some of the 2023-2024 remaining ELS budget was used to purchase eighty-four DET candidate coupons. In addition, *Duolingo* offered KPU twenty-five free DET waivers. These coupons and waivers will be distributed by Future Students Office (FSO) and Advising on our behalf. Nicole Poole, from FSO, reported that they have started issuing DET coupons, and that it is an easy process!

EACS Digital Student Learning Community (DSLC) - On April 8<sup>th</sup> 2024 we ran the last Irving K. Barber funded DSLC session. This semester Employment & Community Studies program instructor, Simon Driver, and Student Assistant, Rajvir Muker, hosted 12x virtual DSLC sessions for work experience cohorts across Langley, Richmond and Surrey. Sessions ran for an hour on Mondays covering the following subjects: Interview Preparation, Critical Thinking, PACT Goals, Health Safety and Wellness, and Transferable Skills. We saw between 40-50 students per session.

Anjela Godber and EACS colleagues continue to meet on a weekly basis to discuss potential action plans for the Decolonization & Indigenization project. Diane Van der Gucht led an outdoor class for Social Justice in Action students to explore the connection and importance of natural environments in relation to the students' course projects on social justice issues based on their learning of the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals. Student project topics included mental health and well-

ness, equality for everyone, safety, children and youth in the foster care system, and zero hunger and food distribution. Dr. Lee Beavington, interdisciplinary instructor and learning strategist with Faculty of Educational and Development, and coordinator of KPU Wild Spaces, was able to join the group for this outdoor class exploration in March on the Surrey campus.

EACS faculty completed a strategic revision of the EACS program intake process from an online to an in-person intake interview structure for purposes of strengthening meaningful intake assessment and enriching the introduction to the university learning experience for applicants.

## **Decolonization and Indigenization at the Learning Centres:**

During the Spring 2024 semester, Dr. Lee Beavington and Tanya Burnstad began the work of understanding what steps should be taken to decolonize and Indigenize the Learning Centres at KPU. In collaboration with faculty members from other ACP departments, they worked to review current structures, practices, and resources and set a path toward key action plans that align with xé?el+ KPU Pathway to Systemic Transformation. The work so far has included consultations with Indigenous community members and other KPU staff who are doing this work, as well as engaging with additional resources that support personal journeys of reconciliation, so that we might move forward in honouring Indigenous worldviews in a way that is respectful, responsible, relevant, reciprocal, and student-centered.

## **Surrey TLC Space Renovations Complete:**

The Learning Centre at Surrey was recently renovated to ensure all furniture meet accessibility standards. Additionally, 3 new study pods were installed to allow for group tutoring, noise-reduced learning spaces for students, and added capacity to deliver workshops.

#### TLC hosted Langara and Douglas College Learning Centres.

The Learning Centre team hosted a visit from Langara and Douglas College Learning Centres at the Surrey campus on April 29, 2024. This included 20 attendees, where we had an opportunity to share and collaborate in a collegial discussion around services provided and trends we see in supporting student development. We shared our Levels 1, 2, and 3 Tutor Training Handbooks and Facilitator Guides (Open Educational Resources) to help support their peer tutor training initiatives.

## PD on Empathy Mapping and Generative AI for Learning:

The *Professional Development Committee and Social Committee* put together a highly engaging and informative PD Day on May 3<sup>rd</sup> 2024 at TLC Surrey Centre. Dr. Megan Robertson from Simon Fraser University guided us through the process of empathy mapping, followed by scenarios, and a guided group discussion. Dr. Jovita Vytasek from the TLC team lead a discussion on generative artificial intelligence and the potential to support student learning, including exploration into content-specific chatbot development.

English Upgrading (EU) department faculty members continue to generously support KPU Foundation student awards. Faculty have fully funded and continue to fund an English Upgrading Endowed Award for students. In addition, the EU department will look to award Upgrading students with the following eligible department awards: Academic & Career Preparation Endowed Award (\$1370), Bev Krieger Endowed Memorial Award (\$1000), Dorothy Diotte Award (\$1300), Underwood Family Award (\$1000), and the Vernon Albert Young Endowed Memorial Award (\$895). Such awards are important supplemental supports to recognize the hard work of Upgrading students who are often disproportionally disadvantaged by the costs of returning to learning. The provincial Adult Upgrading Grant (AUG), which was accessed by nearly 2500 students across BC in 2023, can provide support for student fees and required learning tools if students meet a financial need threshold. However, all efforts to eliminate financial barriers for Upgrading students in particular can help secure a place at KPU for students whose growth in literacy skills can have a transformative impact on their lives and future.

Professional Communication for Internationally Educated Nurses (PCIEN) – The English Language Studies department was awarded additional funding for PCIEN by the Ministry of Advanced Education & Future Skills. Thanks goes to Melissa Swanink, Lesley Hemsworth and the Dean's office for working on this proposal. The Dean's Office will create a PCIEN Search Committee to update the qualifications needed to teach PCIEN before beginning the search for qualified instructors.

#### **Alumni Stories**

With the support of KPU's Work Integrated Learning (WIL) offices **EACS** secured a Student Learning Assistant (SLA) for the Spring semester. The student (Dan Sleath) provided in-class support for Career Exploration on the Surrey campus. In addition to in-class contributions, and lectures, the student provided research and community networking support for students working on informational interviews. Dan will also be supporting the EACS Work Experience class in the summer.

#### **Student Success**

<u>Employment and Community Studies (EACS) Program</u> Students in the Career Exploration course have expressed interest in taking further studies at KPU in Psychiatric Nursing, Horticulture, Automotive Service, Brewing, and ENTA.

The Learning Centre Peer Tutor Success Stories: In the Spring Semester, TLC supported 61 tutors in levels 1, 2, 3 Tutor Training and Writing Tutor training. Our network of peer tutors continue to be in high demand as we continue to support: Writing Labs (6 tutors), Tutor Navigator (7 tutors), Accounting Review sessions (7 tutors), Accounting Monopoly Night (7 tutors), Long Night Against Procrastination (6 tutors), Peer-lead workshops (4 tutors), PebblePad basics (2 tutors), Conversation and Connection for English as an Additional Language Learners (1 tutor). 

A group of KPU Nursing students will be traveling to Santa Maria de Jesus in Antigua, Guatemala to provide medical services at a local clinic/school from May 30 – June 15, 2024. They are currently accepting donations for kids clothing from the ages 5 -15. The town does not have a doctor and relies on the clinic for their basic health needs. There is no running water in the town and little access to basic needs. There are approximately 160-200 students ages 5-15.

The purpose of this fund was to engage students across the various faculties such as Trades, Arts, Science and Horticulture. The TLIF funds were indeed used to "expand Nation and Elder led programming with a focus on traditional healing gardens".
- The vison for the project would be to focus on recultivating the gardens and refurnishing the beds at North Otter School with traditional fruits and medicinal plants used by First Nations in the region, originated from an idea shared by the aboriginal support worker, Alicia Hiebert. Alicia, has a vision that she would like to use the gardens as a teaching venue for all students to learn about the history and traditional ways of First Nations regarding health and healing practices.

- Hence, with the support and leadership of Dr. Joan Boyce, Faculty of Health, BSN nursing students, horticulture and trades students embarked on an "Indigenous project" focused on "Design Thinking" in an interdisciplinary, intersectoral, innovative, service learning hands on experience.
- As part of integrating opportunities to collaborate and engage students from across KPU, the BSN program, the following students were very much engaged as part of their community engagement project.
- The actual project was informed by the writings of Robin, W. Kimmerer (2021), in her book, *Braiding Sweetgrass, as she weaves together indigenous wisdom, scientific knowledge, and the teaching of plants,* talks about how most of the students in her philosophy class in university have never heard about the Sky-Woman legend of the Iroquois, the story of the origin of the land in which they were born, and the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers.

### Contract with Squamish First Nation

On March 1, we were happy to share that we signed a contract with the Squamish First Nation to partner on two upcoming intakes: Introduction to Carpentry will be taking place May 13 – July 5, and Carpentry Level One will be taking place July 8 – September 20. These intakes are taught at the Squamish Nation Trades Training Centre in North Vancouver and are taught by KPU carpentry instructor Terry Williams.

#### **Agreement with Fraser Regional Correctional Centre**

We have finalized our agreement with the Fraser Regional Correctional Centre (FRCC). This updated agreement will see us continue to offer welding and metal trades programs to inmates, and has been expanded to include offering introductory carpentry classes. The goal is to upskill prisoners so that they have a decreased chance of recidivism and increased opportunities to help alleviate the skilled trades shortage once they return to the community.

In April, retired Bookstore textbooks and learning materials were sent to the FRCC for inmates' use. The Faculty of Trades and Technology partners with FRCC on Introduction to Welding, Introduction to Metal Trades, and Introduction to Carpentry classes, and these donated resources will support the inmates in their learning.

#### **Electric Vehicle for the Automotive Department**

In March, the KPU Automotive department acquired a new electric vehicle to be used for the EV program and will be used for KPU events by Marketing. The Faculty of Trades and Technology worked with Randall Heidt, Steve Lewarne, and Chervahun Emilien to secure funding for this vehicle to support KPU's electric vehicle program.

#### Program/Policies/Initiatives

### **KPU Social Innovation Incubator**

The incubator, established by the MSB in the Spring of 2023, aims to enrich student learning and foster student innovation by aligning with the UN Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDGs) and cultivating entrepreneurial opportunities within the realm of social innovation. The objective is to empower students to compete and subsequently acquire the skills, com-

petencies, and funding required for a successful launch of either for-profit or non-profit ventures in this innovative domain.

The goals of the incubator are as follows:

- Support KPU students and student-led organizations
  whose objective is to implement one or more and operationally abide by the UNSDG's (United Nations Sustainable
  Development Goals). This support will manifest itself primarily in the form of mentorship and/or financial assistance and follow the Principles for Responsible Management Education (PRME).
- Ensure that all KPU students from all faculties are able to participate in this interdisciplinary effort and would be eligible to enter the first Pitch Event in May 2025.
- Event winners will receive assistance with funding by learning how to effectively accessing potential pools of capital from financial institutions, corporates, foundations, government and individuals.
- The winners will receive further mentorship support regarding networking, strategy, marketing, operations, communications and risk assessment.

During the Spring 2024 term, two students were recruited through TLIF. Alongside their Faculty Lead and Mentor, they collaborated to produce a video that was extensively shared among students. This video aimed to demonstrate the nature of and potential pathways for students interested in participating in the May 2025 event. Additionally, they actively participated in various conferences and events related to the UN Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDGs), as well as conducting classroom visits to provide detailed explanations about the competitive process to students.

During this period, two new ENTR Special Topics courses (ENTR 3900) were introduced, scheduled for the Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 terms respectively. The first course will focus on guiding registrants through a comprehensive Business Analysis and Ideation evaluation phase. Subsequently, in the second course, participants will engage in a Project Development and Presentation phase. These courses are strategically designed to equip students with the necessary skills and knowledge to prepare them for the May 2025 Pitch Event.

Through offering entrepreneurial coaching, access to funding channels, and other support mechanisms, students will be incentivized to participate in impactful ventures that contribute to the community and benefit fellow students.

# THE OFFICE OF RESEARCH SERVICES

#### **INDIGENOUS GATHERING**

The ORS in collaboration with Len Pierre Consulting organized an Indigenous Gathering on March 18, 2024, hosted at the Katzie Nation. The gathering between Indigenous Nations and KPU marked a significant step towards collaboration and understanding. Indigenous Elders and community members shared their experiences, highlighting historical challenges in institutional research practices. Their stories revealed past research missteps and emphasized the need for KPU to conduct research with sensitivity, respect, and an understanding of Indigenous culture and values. The discussions pointed towards the importance of genuine partnerships that prioritize Indigenous perspectives and methodologies, moving away from tokenistic engagement. Advocating for the integration of Indigenous values into research, the participants believed this approach would yield more impactful and meaningful outcomes. This event was pivotal in bridging the gap between Indigenous communities and academic research, establishing a foundation for future collaborations that respect Indigenous knowledge and wisdom.

# EDI IN ETHICS-FIRST LIVE WEBINAR OF ON-DEMAND EDI IN RESEARCH WEBINAR SERIES

On March 25, 2024, ORS in collaboration with Dr. Asma Syed (Vice-President, Equity and Inclusive Communities) launched the "EDI in Research" webinar series, aimed at integrating Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) principles into research practices and work environment. The first webinar of this series "EDI in Ethics", featured presentations by Larissa Wodtke and Dr. Tara Lyons, experts in EDI and research ethics.

Larissa, specializing in EDI in research, highlighted the importance of EDI considerations throughout a project's lifecycle. Dr. Lyons, research focuses on how societal and structural factors impact marginalized communities, underscoring the significance of EDI in ethical research practices. The webinar provided practical tools for applying EDI principles in research, emphasizing the intersection of EDI with research ethics. The session concluded with a Q&A, fostering a dialogue on enhancing research ethics through EDI. This initiative is a step towards more inclusive, equitable, and diverse research practices.

### **CFI-INFRASTRUCTURE OPERATING FUND (IOF)**

Applicants and project leaders Dr. Paul Adams and Dr. Rebecca Harbut have each been granted \$44,000 and \$32,000, respectively, from the Institutional CFI-Infrastructure Operating Fund (IOF). This funding is earmarked for covering the operational and maintenance costs associated with CFI-funded research infrastructure, ensuring its optimal functionality.

In accordance with CFI guidelines, the institution is responsible for allocating the IOF funding among eligible projects. The institution retains the flexibility to distribute its IOF allocation based on the actual operational and maintenance requirements of each project. Consequently, the ORS has devised a set of guiding principles along with an internal application and approval process whereby eligible Project Leaders have the opportunity to submit their IOF applications.

# RESEARCH CREATION WORKSHOP WITH STEPHANIE SPRINGGAY

The ORS and Faculty of Arts jointly organized a Research Creation workshop on May 6. 2024. Dr. Stephanie Springgay, Director of the School of the Arts at McMaster University and a leading scholar of research-creation served as the speaker. During her presentation, she offered her valuable insights into the theoretical framework of research-creation, drawing examples from her extensive work, including her book *Feltness: Re-*

search-Creation, Socially Engaged Art, and Affective Pedagogies (Duke UP, 2022), and research-creation projects <u>WalkingLab</u> and <u>The Pedagogical Impulse</u>. The event took place in person at the Richmond campus and was also livestreamed via Teams. The recording of the event will soon be accessible through the ORS communication channels.





## **POLYTECHNIC CANADA 2024 ANNUAL SHOWCASE**

Dr. Amit Shukla attended the Polytechnic Canada 2024 Annual Showcase held from May 14 to May 16. 2024 at Algonquin College in Ottawa where polytechnic institutions showcase the ways we are tackling global challenges. Dr. Shukla, Andhra Goundrey and Sue Fairburn from the Wilson School of Design, presented "Learning Grounded in Design for Extremes: ALTA – A Portable Hyperbaric Chamber for use in High Altitude."

Based on the results of our November 2023 assessment visit, the <u>Canadian Council on Animal Care</u> (CCAC) sent their formal Assessment Report to Dr. Gupta on April 16, 2024. The next step in the certification process is for KPU to respond to the CCAC by October 18, 2024, with an Implementation Report showing how we addressed each of their recommendations. If the CCAC is satisfied with KPU's response, the animal care and use program will be granted a CCAC <u>Certificate of Good Animal Practice</u>.

#### **PUBLICATIONS**

- Lyndsey Baillie, the AGC Laboratory Coordinator, was featured in the Spring 2024 Western Canadian Dairy News. The news article titled, "A Technical Update on Mycoplasma bovis" was based on the presentation Lyndsey gave at the 2024 Pacific Ag Show in January. M. bovis is a bacterium, intrinsically resistant to many common antibiotics, thought to be responsible for causing significant disease symptoms in cattle. Lyndsey received her Master's degree in Population Genetics from Dalhousie University in 2013.
- The Applied Genomics Centre was featured in a news story on the Norgen Biotek website titled, "Sequence to Discover: the metagenomic context surrounding Mycoplasman bovis infection in cattle". Last year, the AGC was granted \$20,000 towards Norgen products and sequencing services. The article describes how the AGC used these funds to help tackle a cattle disease of major concern on dairy farms.

I learned a lot." This field day is part of an ongoing extension program since Fall 2023 to support drought

resilience farming.

# UPDATES ON WESTON HOME GROWN CHALLENGE PROJECT, CARBON-NEUTRAL, PESTICIDE-FREE GLASS HOUSE BERRY PRODUCTION FOR CANADA

The Weston Home Grown Challenge project had an international strawberry expert from Belgium visiting the ISH team on March 8, 2024. Koen Lavrijsen (Proefcentrum Hoogstraten vzw Voort 71, 2328 Meerle, België – a berry research center) is an international consultant who travels the world advising on greenhouse strawberry production. This visit was made possible by funders, The Weston Family Foundation. On March 25, 2024, ISH also hosted the CSO of Vivent Technologies, plant physiology sensor partner for the Weston project. Dr. Andrzej Kurenda spent most of the day with ISH, discussing the crop and the recordings, and then gave a formal presentation about the Plant Sensor technology and where the company is going with it.

# NEW PROJECT ON PLANT IMPACTS OF MARINE KELP EXTRACTS

A new project began on February 1, 2024, with Cascadia Seaweed and the SFU BC Center for Agri Innovations to explore the various <u>plant impacts of extracts from two species of marine kelp</u>. Cascadia is a B-listed corp., which denotes it is a forprofit company which is certified by a non-profit third party that measures the company's social and environmental performance against impact standards.

This was an inspiring evening for the group that never had an opportunity to celebrate their accomplishments due to the pandemic.



#### 2024 Grad Show

On Thursday April 25, we were pleased to host the WSD Grad Show, "Creatures of Curiosity" on our campus. All our programs showcased their graduating students (over 100 students) throughout the building. Students presented their final projects, capstone work, portfolios and prototypes in an exhibition-style format. Our 4th year Graphic Design for Marketing students produced an engaging campaign for the event and invested extensive time to create a cohesive atmosphere in the building. Over 300 high school students attended earlier in the day and close to 1000 people, from industry, community friends and family attended the afternoon and evening events.

#### **Faculty Receives KPU Chancellor Chair Award**

Product Design Program Co-Chair Victor Martinez, PhD was one of the recipients of the KPU 2024 Chancellor's Chair Award, awarded by The Office of the Provost and VP Academic. This multi-year award will provide funding over a 3-year term commencing April 1, 2024. Victor's research aims to engage diverse community groups using a systems thinking and design thinking methodology developed over 14 years for complex social problem-solving, facilitating the understanding of root causes and the creation of systemic interventions

## Initiatives/Activities

### **Mindful Campus Initiative:**

In an effort to support student wellbeing, the Wilson School of Design rolled out the Mindful Campus Initiative in the Fall of 2023. Led by Ontario-based OCAD University in partnership with the Centre for Mindfulness Studies, Mindful Campus aimed to help students develop skills and techniques to allow emerging creatives to flourish and adapt in a post-pandemic world. Mindful Campus was activated at four post-secondary institutions across Canada, including KPU, where students in design and art, and beyond, were supported in developing coping and resilience skills. ## Office of the Vice President, Students (OVPS)

The following reports from Student Services (Office of the Registrar, Student Affairs and KPU International) outline the key activities undertaken recently by the departments under the Vice President, Students. It is with great appreciation and acknowledgment of the hard work, dedication to student success, and commitment to serving KPU of all employees within this portfolio that the following reports are presented.

### **Global Education Strategy**

An ad hoc KPU Global Task Force was established in 2022 which brought together faculty, administration and students to explore the state of internationalization at KPU and to recommend our next steps, one of which included the establishment of a Global Education Advisory Committee (GEAC). GEAC began its deliberations in January 2024, to identify how our internationalization efforts can be enhanced through the development of a Global Strategy for KPU. Three key themes that GEAC has explored:

- 1. How we bring the world to KPU
- 2. How we take KPU to the world
- 3. How we curate meaningful intercultural engagement opportunities and competencies among the KPU community

The outcome of this work will be a renewed Global Strategy for KPU that will:

- Create a stronger shared understanding of the current state of global education at KPU
- Identify strategic priorities for internationalization at KPU
- Recommend actionable next steps

The work of GEAC envisions the institution that KPU will become because of and in pursuit of internationalization and global education. Equity, anti-racism, and decolonization have been underlying principles of the recommendations of this committee, as part of our commitment to social justice outlined in VISION 2026. KPU's draft Global Strategy is forthcoming, at which point broader university consultation will commence.

#### **Student Housing**

In support of KPU's student housing business case for an oncampus student housing project at the KPU Surrey campus, the VP Students and AVP Student Affairs have been actively engaged in the establishment of the associated operations plan as KPU pursues the Student Housing Program Funding from the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills.

The Career Development Centre shows 663 new students registered on KPU's student job board, Career Connection, along with 85 new employers. A remarkable 1,930 employment opportunities were posted, with students assisted through 71 career advising appointments and 150 resume reviews.

Co-operative education summer job postings saw a 9% increase from this time last year with 412 postings, while student job applications to co-op positions more the doubled from last summer, rising from 742 to 1,492!

### **Career Development Centre (CDC) Pioneers New Events**

The CDC launched their first ever 'Employer Group Informational Interview' event for matched job-seeking co-op students, which included two interview preparation workshops. They also saw the first Co-op Student Awards Celebration, honouring 14 2024 Co-op award recipients at the Gathering Place.

Career Day, held at Richmond and Surrey campuses this year, saw 60 employers, 484 registered students, and more than 200 student participants in job-readiness webinars.

#### **Growth in Assessment and Testing Services**

The Assessment & Testing Services (ATS) department has seen significant growth this past spring semester, especially for students who have exam accommodations. There has also been an increase in the need for private rooms for the needs of accessibility student exams.

ATS also made good use of its two recently installed Teknion distraction-reduced pods for this semester's accommodated exams. The pods have been a welcome addition to KPU Surrey.

### **Advising Workshops**

The Central Advising team had a busy spring seeing an increase in appointments while facilitating course planning workshops for more than 30 new students.

KPU's various academic advising teams are also currently testing and training their new software, Ellucian CRM Advise, to better support student success.

#### **Sport and Recreation Intercampus Championship**

KPU Sport and Recreation participated in the first-ever Intercampus Championship at BCIT, with intramural champions from BCIT, SFU and KPU. The event was a great success with 26 players representing KPU and several spectators coming out to support the school.



Sport and Recreation also partnered up with the Employment and Community Studies program to host three accessible sport workshops, facilitated by both student leaders and *BlindSport BC*. All workshops had more than 25 students attend and were very well received.

#### **Nutrition Month and Food Security Grant**

Student Health Promotion led the first-ever Nutrition Month campaign at KPU throughout March. Utilizing a multi-faceted approach, the campaign included education and awareness events focusing on alleviating challenges and barriers students face while being food insecure.

With generous funding provided by KPU, 3,000 students re-

ceived free grab-and-go breakfast and nearly 2,400 students received much-needed financial support care of the \$500,000 KPU Food Security Grant. The department also hosted a food skill workshop on every campus to educate students about important food skills and launched a <a href="Nutrition & Food Security webpage">Nutrition & Food Security webpage</a> that will serve as an ongoing resource for students to access.

#### **Stress Buster Sessions**

The Multi-Faith Centre chaplains hosted Stress Buster sessions at the Richmond and Surrey campuses during the spring exam period. The chaplains engaged students with colouring books, fidget toys, and meaningful conversation to help ease their stress and anxiety during this time.

#### **Welcoming New Students this Summer**

Summer KPU Welcomes You – the on-campus component of new-student orientation – hosted over 400 new students across four campuses with the help of no fewer than 50 student leaders and a wealth of KPU employee supporters. Students learned about the different supports and resources KPU has to offer through tours, a service panel, and a student resource fair.

The <u>KPU Collective</u> peer mentors hosted an end-of-spring semester event. In partnership with the Career Development Centre, Learning Centre, and Peer Wellness, they saw approximately 200 students engage with students and staff.

### **Sharing the Wealth in Support of Food Security**

During Nutrition Month in March, the Student Awards and Financial Assistance (SAFA) team distributed \$500,000 to students in need through the first-ever KPU Food Security Grant. This initiative supported 1,429 domestic and 960 international students.

Meanwhile, KPU's regular full-time bursary program received 880 student applications. With available funding, SAFA disbursed \$800,000 to support 400 students in high financial need.

#### Jane Piper and Restorative Justice

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office (SRRO) and KPU instructor Alana Abramson co-hosted a guest speaker event featuring Jane Piper, who came to speak about her personal experience with restorative justice as a healing response to sexual violence. Uniquely, Jane did not go through a traditional restorative justice process of meeting directly with her attacker; rather, she engaged in surrogate restorative justice. This demonstrated to the KPU community the range of possibilities as to what restorative justice can look like.

Several Student Affairs representatives joined over 6,000 colleagues from across North America at the NASPA 2024 Conference in Seattle, WA. NASPA is the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, a professional association dedicated to advancing the field of student affairs and higher education administration. The 2024 conference emphasized inclusion and diversity, with sessions dedicated to exploring topics such as equity in education, campus climate, and social justice. Attendees had the opportunity to connect with colleagues from a broad range of post-secondary institutions, fostering collaboration and idea exchanges related to emerging trends in student wellness, technology and engagement.

#### **Preparing for CRM Advise**

Student Affairs representatives, Theresa Voorsluys, Manager of Academic Advising; Lisa Higashi, Director of Student Success; and, Joshua Mitchell, AVP, Student Affairs, joined a broader contingent of KPU representatives at the annual Ellucian E-Live conference in San Antonio, TX. Attendance was in support of KPU's Ellucian Advise CRM platform which goes into production this summer. A key theme of the event was the importance of leveraging technology to enhance student outcomes and institutional effectiveness. The conference featured a full slate of sessions dedicated to the implementation of Advise CRM and best practices for its development.

### **Student Affairs Appointments**

Assessment and Testing Services welcomed Donna Corcoran as the Manager, Assessment and Testing Services effective May 13. Donna comes to KPU with significant leadership experience managing and supervising teams in municipal administrations and brings recent testing experience from positions at Paragon Testing Services and the BC Public Service Agency. Donna holds a BA in History (Dalhousie University), a Post-Baccalaureate Diploma of Education for Adult Learners (UBC), and a Certificate in Leadership (BCIT).

Sport and Recreation welcomed Kevin Seymour as Manager, Sport and Recreation, effective May 13. Kevin has an extensive background in Sport and Fitness programming and is no

stranger to the post-secondary environment having worked at Douglas College and BCIT before joining KPU as the Sport and Recreation Programs Coordinator in 2022. He has been instrumental in enhancing and expanding the Sport and Recreation Intramural program. Kevin has a Bachelor's degree in Community Recreation and Leisure Studies from Brock University and certifications in Leadership, Human Resource Management, Sport and Fitness.

#### Dr. Catherine Siermacheski's Retirement

KPU and the Assessment and Testing Services (ATS) department wished Dr. Catherine Siermacheski well as she retired from her role as Manager, Assessment and Testing Services this April. Catherine joined KPU in 2017 following academic and administrative positions in higher education. Catherine's leadership was felt throughout her tenure, but never more than during COVID where admission testing, accommodated exams, and external testing contracts were adapted and maintained to meet new virtual and in-person testing requirements. Her leadership will be missed, but her positive impact will endure as we all wish her the very best on her next journey.

### Office of the Registrar

### **BCARMA Spring Meeting**

Melinda Schram and Krista Gerlich-Fitzgerald attended the BC Associate Registrars and Managers Association (BCARMA) Spring meeting, hosted at BCIT's Burnaby campus. Over 40 Associate Registrars attended from post-secondary institutions across BC and had an opportunity to receive an update from the Minister of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills, Hon. Lisa Beare.

#### **Ellucian Live 2024**

Nadia Henwood, Alexy Grewal, Kiren Gill, and Catherine Lai attended the annual Ellucian Live Conference in San Antonio, TX. Supporting KPU's student information system (Banner), this conference provided insights on current features offered, enhancements in the works, and the future direction of products being developed by Ellucian and their vendor partners. The conference provided the opportunity to learn best practices from Ellucian developers, consultants, and other Banner users. It was attended by over 8,000 individuals representing nearly 1,400 institutions from 42 countries.

#### **BCRA Spring Meeting**

Nadia Henwood attended the bi-annual Spring BC Registrar's Association meeting hosted at Capilano University's Shipyard campus. Registrars from across BC met with key partners from EPBC and BCCAT as well as six members from the BC Ministry

of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills. Topics discussed included badging, the PAL Ministry System, Digital Services/Learning Strategy, financial aid updates, future skills grant updates, and dual credit.

#### **Open Doors, Open Minds**

In collaboration with the Indigenous Student Services, the Future Students' Office hosted the Open Doors, Open Minds event. Indigenous high school students were warmly welcomed to the campus for an engaging experience. Students attended mock classes hosted by faculty, providing a glimpse into various KPU programs and experiencing the academic environment firsthand. Participants had the chance to win prizes, have lunch, and were also treated to a hoop dancer performance. Madelaine McCallum, a renowned dancer and motivational speaker, brought her inspiring presence to the event as the keynote speaker, adding to its significance.





#### **JABC TechWorks**

The Future Students' Office collaborated with Junior Achievement British Columbia (JABC) to host the eighth annual TechWorks convention at the Surrey campus, a work-readiness program for high school students exploring tech-related careers. JABC TechWorks provides insights into the education, skills, and mindset required for future tech jobs. Over 300 grade 10-12 students participated in 10 workshops put on by sponsors and industry leaders in tech, including a workshop put on by the Entertainment Arts department. Future Students' Office also hosted an outdoor BBQ lunch with fun backyard games.



# Skills Canada BC

The Future Students' Office partnered with Skills Canada BC's to host regional competitions, held at KPU Richmond. Over 100 students attended to compete in various events such as spaghetti bridge building, graphic design, photography, and video production. FSO had the chance to share promotional information and showcase programs. These competitions offered students firsthand exposure to careers in skilled trades and technology sectors through live competitions and try-atrade activities.

### Career Life Explorations at the High Schools

Recruitment coordinator Melanie Kumar fostered community engagement and promoted post-secondary education through CLE presentations held at Richmond Secondary, Clayton Heights, and Kwantlen Park Secondary. These sessions were met with enthusiasm and participation from students, presentations feature university lingo and interactive group activities.

#### **High School Visits and Tours**

Recruitment coordinator Kathleen Briones continued to strengthen our connections and relationships with key high schools, in particular Lord Tweedsmuir Secondary, Fleetwood Secondary, and Langley Education Center. Kathleen educated students about the post-secondary setting, its importance, and what KPU offers in their Career Life Education and Career Life Connection classes.

#### Whitehorse Tour

Recruitment coordinator Melanie Kumar and student ambassadors hosted Whitehorse high school students for an immersive tour of the Wilson School of Design. Students gained firsthand insights into Design programs. Lab Coordinator, Leisha Zeron, led a hands-on workshop using watercolors to stain personalized tote bags.





#### **Campus Tour for Tsawwassen First Nation Students**

Recruitment coordinator Diane Baylis organized a campus tour for Tsawwassen First Nation students in KPU's English upgrading program. This tour promoted educational opportunities and acclimated students to campus life. The tour included exploring facilities, discussing educational goals, and visiting the Gathering Place.

### **Information Sessions for Limited Intake Programs**

Over 80 information sessions have been held for this reporting period, with some being hosted in a hybrid format using <u>Owl</u> <u>technology</u>.

### **LA Matheson Secondary Campus Tour**

Continuing our connection with LA Matheson Secondary, 85 students and 6 staff members visited and toured our Surrey campus. We have received great feedback that many of their students plan to attend KPU after high school.









#### **Wrap-Up Parties for Strive Students**

Erin Lee, a prospective student support specialist in the domestic recruitment team, organized wrap-up parties for 65 Strive dual credit program high school students. Parties commemorate course completion and disseminate information about the KPU admission process. They focused on facilitating students' continuation of studies at KPU with active participation from Surrey, Richmond, and Langley districts, with orientations scheduled for each district in June. With the Strive programming receiving ample positive feedback, representatives from KPU and Scotia Bank will convene for discussions on the future of the Strive program.

## **Future Students' Office Recruitment Season**

The FSO has been busy partnering and collaborating with various faculties this season.

#### Future Business Leaders' Conference

Partnered with the Melville School of Business, Future Students' Office hosted the Future Business Leaders' Conference, welcoming grade 11/12 high school students to the Surrey Campus to participate in business competitions

alongside YELL Canada. Students had the opportunity to receive mentorship from Melville School of Business faculty, gain university-level business skills, and network with industry professionals. Winners received an Entrance Scholarship to KPU's Melville School of Business and the title of "Future Business Leaders of 2024".

- Faculty of Science CRM Campaign Automation
  - Partnering with the Faculty of Science and Marketing, Future Students' Office has worked extensively to pilot a Campaign Automation in Microsoft Dynamics CRM, targeting Science prospects. Prospect leads are generated through our various web forms on the KPU website. These automated communications are specifically catered to science-interested prospects and help to develop a working relationship. Topics included: booking an appointment with the Future Students' Office, applying to KPU, learning more about our program requirements, joining us for a campus tour, dates & deadlines, meeting our faculty members, and many more. This campaign automation has an approximate duration of over three weeks aimed at continually engaging the prospective student.
- WSD Grad Show

Partnering with the Wilson School of Design, Melanie Kumar and student ambassadors played a crucial role in planning the recruitment events and organizing high school visits for the Grad Show on April 25, with immersive experiences with tours, raffles, games, and activities.

### **KPU International**

#### Office of Recruitment, Admissions and Articulation

Following the January 22, 2024 announcement by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, Canada (IRCC) regarding the cap on international student applications for study permits, KPU received its allocation of 3,537 Provincial Attestation Letters (PALs) for 2024. The system for PALs was launched on March 4th. Since then, KPU International issued 619 Provincial Attestation Letters (PALs) to accompany each applicant's Letter of Acceptance (LOA) for Summer 2024, Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 semesters. Since the announcement, KPU has seen a significant decrease in applications. The recruitment team has responded by implementing the following:

- Doubled our social media posts
- Daily meetings with agents
- Field reps called every applicant

- Additional agent events
- Additional recruitment events
- Increased field reps' efforts
- Shifting to the high school market abroad
- Increased attendance at recruitment fairs
- Application waiver incentives
- Local high school agreements
- New supports for student housing

#### **Mainland China**

- KPU International participated in agency fairs across Wuhan, Dalian, Hohhot, and Shenyang, focusing on partnership building.
- Recruitment and admissions training were conducted for agencies and secondary schools, such as IDP Maple Leaf School Graduation Center and Shenyang No.2 High School.
- KPU's presence at International School Fairs in Shanghai and Kunming highlights the institution's commitment to diverse student recruitment.

### Hong Kong, Mongolia, and Local Chinese Market

- KPU International is actively pursuing opportunities in Mongolia, including follow-up with 466 high school students interested in studying abroad to establish KPU's presence and meet the rising demand for international education opportunities.
- Recruitment efforts continue in Hong Kong, Mongolia, and local Chinese regions through agency training sessions.
- Work is being done to increase digital marketing efforts, including testimonials and stories from current students, alumni, and staff to give a complete picture of KPU life.
- There has been an increased effort to gather feedback from agencies, students, and job market data to pinpoint popular programs for Chinese students, including Health Care Assistant Program, Traditional Chinese Medicine - Acupuncture, and Horticulture

#### **South Korea and Taiwan**

KPU International participated in the inbound trade mission that took place in Victoria, BC, to foster connections with agent delegations from South Korea and Taiwan. The agents visited KPU's Richmond campus on their way back to South Korea and Taiwan for information sessions and campus tours. A strong emphasis was placed on strategic partnership cultivation in both regions to strengthen collaboration and enhance outreach efforts.

#### South America - CI Tour in Brazil

Events attended by KPU's field representative, Marina Costa, in Brazil were incredibly successful. Marina participated in CI's events in São Paulo, São Jose do Rio Preto, Londrina, Curitiba, Rio de Janeiro, and Salvador. Her engagement and discussions resonated well with the attendees, showcasing KPU's commitment to positively impacting Canada's international education landscape. By highlighting the benefits of KPU's initiatives, Marina conveyed the university's dedication to providing high-quality education opportunities to students worldwide. These efforts demonstrate KPU's proactive approach to global outreach and mission to contribute meaningfully to the international education sector.

Alessandra Gava, International Recruitment and Admissions Coordinator, visited several high schools in El Salvador to promote KPU. Her efforts were successful as she engaged with students and educators, effectively conveying the benefits and opportunities available at KPU. #### **North America**

Lukas's warm reception and informative sessions, along with the Future Students Office, were well-received by the visitors, showcasing KPU's commitment to fostering relationships with local schools and communities. The engaging experience provided valuable insights into KPU's programs and facilities, highlighting the university's dedication to supporting students' educational journeys. This visit exemplifies KPU's ongoing efforts to connect with schools and create meaningful partnerships within the local community.

## **Southeast Asia**

During the Spring 2024 Southeast Asia recruitment trip, KPU attended 6 events, 21 agent visits, and training in Bangkok, Jakarta, Hanoi, and Ho Chi Minh City. KPU has gradually cemented a foothold in Southeast Asian countries as an affordable, hands-on university with many unique program offerings.

KPU also visited 12 international schools, speaking directly to students and, more importantly, raising the university's brand

awareness among the school counsellors who will introduce KPU to their students when they apply for university. KPU was also able to successfully partner with some of the university's largest aggregators such as ApplyBoard, Adventus and AECC Global to organize group agent training for a total of over 75 agents who are not contracted with KPU yet but have the potential to recruit students for KPU.

#### India

Recent IRCC changes have had a major impact on recruitment

numbers from India. Application numbers have declined sharply because of the recent IRCC policy changes and some other challenges as follows:

- India-Canada political tensions and negative media coverage in India regarding the safety of international students abroad.
- Cost-of-living financial requirement raised from \$10,000 to \$20,635.
- Confusion around Post Graduate Work Permit (PGWP) eligibility for public and private sector students.
- Job availability and restrictions regarding maximum offcampus hours (reduced from 40 to 20 hours per week).
- Challenges in finding accommodation.
- Confusion around the PAL requirement for students applying for a study permit after January 22nd, 2024.

To minimize the impact of these challenges, the following solutions have been implemented:

- Strengthening relations with existing and new agent partners via conferences and agent visits.
- Conducting agent training to clarify the recent IRCC changes and confirm that KPU is open and welcoming new international student applications.
- Attending agent fairs and events to promote KPU programs and meet with prospective students.
- Email communication with agents to provide clarity on the PAL process.
- Personalized follow-up with each applicant to focus on higher conversion rates.
- Program-specific marketing in developing regions to promote Entertainment Arts programs (ENTA), Post-Baccalaureate in Operations and Supply Chain Management, etc.

# Nepal

- Market presence, strategic partnerships, and strong relations with agent partners have helped grow the Nepal market significantly.
- 234% YoY growth in application numbers from Nepal so far [41 applications (Fall 2023) vs 137 applications (Fall 2024)].
- 210% YoY growth in admitted students from Nepal so far [30 students (Fall 2023) vs 93 students (Fall 2024)].

- Meet & Greet welcome event held on January 27th, 2024, for newly admitted students, giving them an opportunity to network and make new friends. This event led to a group of students from Nepal <u>creating a new club</u> on campus - the Kwantlen Nepalese Student Association.
- 4 students from Nepal won the Spring 2024 Regional Entrance Scholarships.

#### Sri Lanka

- Application growth from Sri Lanka has also slowed down.
- Recent IRCC changes (especially the spousal open work permit changes) have had a major impact on the Sri Lankan market.
- Most prospective students are inquiring about Masters level programs.

During his role as a Student Assistant, James made significant contributions to our online and in-person dropins, registration support, and advising newsletter project.

# Asia Pacific Association for International Education (APAIE) Conference

Vice President, Students Zena Mitchell, and Special Advisory — UN SDG Maryanne Eva joined Ada Lee, Manager, Global Learning & Partnerships, at the APAIE Conference in Perth, Australia. In addition to attending the conference, they had the opportunity to join various sessions and engage with current and prospective partners. Amidst the vibrant atmosphere of the conference, they collaborated with CICAN and Edith Cowan University to present on the Global Indigenous Learning Experience program, sharing insights and fostering dialogue on this important topic.

Many of these partnerships are aligned with the Canada-ASEAN Scholarships and Educational Exchanges for Development (SEED) program, aimed at fostering educational cooperation between Canada and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN). The SEED program offers scholarships to students, researchers, and professionals from ASEAN member states to pursue studies and research in Canadian institutions, promoting mutual understanding and capacity-building in areas of priority for ASEAN. This initiative exemplifies KPU's commitment to global education and sustainable development, enriching cross-cultural learning experiences and promoting innovation and excellence in education.

#### **Faculty Mobility**

Webinars were tailored for KPU faculty members. A total of 16 participants attended these sessions. The primary objective of these webinars was to raise awareness about two faculty mobility funds offered by KPU International: Guard.me MIF, and KPU's Global SDGs Fund. Additionally, the webinars aimed to acquaint faculty members with the latest updates to the funding guidelines for both internal funds.



# Proposal Selection for Short-Term Program for Mexican Students

The proposal submitted by KPU International for a short-term program catering to Mexican students was selected for funding by the State of Mexico. Through this program, KPU anticipates hosting 60 Mexican students on campus for a four-week intensive English language program from September to November 2024.

- KPU International responded to the call for proposals with a comprehensive offering that aligns with the outlined requirements. The KPU proposal included:
- A range of ESL courses catering to the needs of undergraduate students with varying proficiency levels.
- Description of the academic course structure, extracurricular activities, and campus engagement opportunities.
- Total cost breakdown encompassing tuition, educational fees, housing, meals, medical insurance, transportation, and additional student services.
- Availability to receive students during the proposed dates outlined by the State of Mexico.

KPU International is thrilled to have been selected for this collaborative endeavour with the State of Mexico. This partnership is a testament to the institution's global reputation and dedication to promoting cross-cultural exchanges. KPU looks forward to welcoming Mexican students to the campus and providing them with a transformative educational experience.

### **Campus Tours & Policy Meetings: Elected Officials**

The government relations team arranged/attend various campus visits and meetings with elected officials from both the Federal and Provincial government;

- -On April 18<sup>th</sup>, we had the *Minister of Agriculture Pam Alexis (Abbotsford-Mission)* visit our KPU Langley campus (photo) to tour the Institute for Sustainable Horticulture (ISH) Research Greenhouse and learn all about our geothermal and greenhouse energy related projects via Weston Project funding.
- -On April 19<sup>th</sup>, we had newly appointed *Parliamentary Secretary for International Credentials Ravi Parmar* visit our Surrey-Main campus to discuss the ways KPU supports international students on their educational journey.

### **SDG Week**

As part of KPU's Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Week Canada from March 4th to March 8th, 2024, Campus and Community Planning co-led several SDG and sustainability related events intended to promote awareness and action with regards to the United Nation's 17 SDGs. A "SDG Fair" at Surrey Campus connected students with on-campus resources, including a KPU Model UN, Climate+ Challenge, and the Study Abroad Department, facilitating discussions and games around the SDGs. Also, at the Richmond Campus, the "Fire, Climate, and Community Panel", co-hosted by the Teaching and Learning Department, featured experts discussing the links between fire, climate change, and community impact. The "Breakfast of Champions" event at Surrey invited faculty members to showcase their SDG integration projects, fostering interdepartmental connections. Additionally, a number of projects were showcased to highlight the SDGs in Action: a KPU Richmond Farm Tour highlighted sustainable agricultural practices, and a "Go SDG Go" event organized by Green Business Management and Sustainability students facilitated student-focused exploration of the SDGs through interactive activities like 'wishing tree' goals sharing and SDG-themed games. Collectively, these events aimed to foster improved understanding and commitment towards achieving the SDGs within the KPU community.

### **Student Housing**

CCP has continued to host in-person pop-up engagements across KPU's campuses to inform the development of KPU's student housing strategy and the preparation of a draft business case for the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills. Regarding the business case, KPU submitted a business case for a student housing project on the Surrey campus in early May towards taking the steps needed to address the urgent demand for student housing at KPU's Surrey campus. As part of the submission, KPU put forth a 252-bed mass timber building option as it aims to optimize construction and operational efficiencies, while offering private sleeping and studying options for students. Ongoing discussions with Ministry staff are expected as the business case is reviewed.

#### **Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Strategy**

CCP, in collaboration with Watt Consulting, have completed an engagement and planning process to create KPU's first Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Strategy. Through iterative discussions with a KPU working group and broader on-

campus conversations with the KPU community, the project team collected input, shared best practices, and proposed key strategies (big moves) that aim to reduce drive-alone commuting trips, greenhouse gas emissions, and parking demand. While further refinement of the strategy is expected, the top five big moves could include enhanced bicycle parking, subsidized transit for employees, financial support for e-bikes, improved shuttle services, and parking pricing adjustments. These strategies aim to diversify commuting options, enhance sustainability, and manage parking effectively. Further community feedback and Executive input is anticipated as the TDM Strategy is finalized for approval later in June 2024.

#### **Surrey Child Care and ECCE Facility**

CCP, in collaboration with PUBLIC Design and Ross Templeton and Associates, have completed a comprehensive value engineering exercise for the design development phase of the Surrey Child Care and ECCE project, with the objective of minimizing the project's overall costs and meeting the project's budget. The project team is currently in the process of responding to City of Surrey's rezoning comments, which expect to be resubmitted to the City by the end of May 2024. A City of Surrey Public Hearing for the project is anticipated in June or July 2024, depending on the City's referral date.

### **KPU's Annual Sustainability Survey (2024)**

The Office of Sustainability, within Campus and Community Planning, launched KPU's first Annual Sustainability Survey in February, 2024, with the support of the Office of Planning and Accountability. This survey aimed to assess the KPU community's understanding of sustainability, including the role of sustainability in everyday decision-making; the use of specific services at KPU; and the community's transportation choices to, from, and between campuses. A sustainability guiz was also administered to understand the level of awareness of sustainability topics at KPU and within Metro Vancouver, including climate change, responsible production and consumption, and society and economy. Overall, 531 employees (27%) and 1,425 students (20%\*) participated. The information shared in the survey will help guide KPU's sustainability commitments, including future sustainability projects and initiatives (including our pending STARs sustainability rating system application), and strategic transportation decision-making.

\*Half of the student population enrolled at KPU in Spring 2024 were sent the Sustainability Survey and half were sent a survey related to KPU's libraries.

#### **FACILITIES SERVICES**

### **UNIVERSITY SPACE, DESIGN & CAPITAL PROJECTS**

Rick Hansen Foundation Accessibility Certifications: The Rick Hansen Foundation completed an accessibility audit of all buildings at all five campuses resulting in RHFAC certification for each building, with WSOD achieving a gold standard. The findings from these audits are very detailed and provide the necessary information to develop an action plan to improve accessibility for the KPU Community. Development of this action plan is a shared goal for the Facilities Senior Management team this year.

**Physics Cloud Lab Renovation:** An underutilized study space on the third floor of the Richmond Main building was converted into the Physics Cloud Lab. The renovation scope included new cabinets and workbench, shelving to display Cloud Lab experiments and a new ceiling with acoustical baffles and LED lighting.

**Richmond Room 1690:** Teaching and Learning transformed a 26-seat general-purpose classroom in the Faculty of Science (FSH) scheduling region into a tech-enhanced room by installing an auto-tracking camera and related technology. When not being used by the FSH, the room will be available for others interested in using it.

Langley Library: The design team replaced the Library service desk with new furniture that meets accessibility criteria in line with the Rick Hansen Accessibility Guidelines. The new desk includes five height-adjustable desks, new storage drawers for equipment, and a new bookshelf. The renovation also included constructing an audio-visual storage area with millwork for laptop storage.

#### **MAINTENANCE & OPERATIONS**

<u>Tech Campus HVAC for Construction Shops:</u> A new third-story work platform was added to the sawdust collection system to provide safe preventative maintenance access to the system's motor and ductwork.





Langley Accessibility Enhancements: Wave and toe-activated door operators were added to the second-floor and Horticulture Center washrooms.



Langley Campus Major Repairs to Failing Concrete Sidewalks:

The repairs were conducted to ensure the safe use of the sidewalks and entrances to the buildings. The sidewalk replacement along the south end of parking L1 ensures proper lot drainage and will eliminate seepage from nearby Logan Creek.





Parking Lot Improvements and Maintenance: At the Surrey Campus, additional speed bumps, curbing, and delineators were installed to slow traffic cutting through the parking lot. Parking lot L1 at the Langley Campus was repaved, and lines painted.





**Campus Painting:** During this reporting period, numerous locations on campuses were painted, such as Langley's first and second-floor hallways, nursing labs, various classrooms at Surrey and Richmond, and Surrey library study rooms.





**Bottle Fillers:** Bottle fillers were installed on the Surrey Campus Main Building's second and third floors; this is a continuation of a previous project providing more locations for the KPU community to refill reusable water bottles, further promoting KPU's commitment to sustainability. Bottle fillers were installed at heights that follow ACA accessibility standards.



Seasonal Maintenance and Landscaping: To get a head start on the expected drought and water restrictions, seasonal maintenance has started. The common areas at Langley and Surrey have been pressure washed, and Surrey's water feature has been drained and thoroughly cleaned. Spring landscaping activities have started back up at all campuses, including garden bed maintenance, replanting, lawn cutting, and tree pruning. Also, brush and blackberries were cut back along Logan Creek Langley Campus.





#### **ANCILLARY SERVICES**

**KPU Campus Stores:** Indigenous Artist Rain Pierre's artwork has been completed and installed on three bulkheads and two windows within the Surrey Campus Store.











**KPU Campus Stores – Awnings & Signage:** The awnings outside the Surrey Campus Store and the signage for Richmond have been changed to Campus Store to better reflect the changing needs of the KPU campuses. Smaller identification signs are also being reviewed and updated for cohesiveness.







Food Services: Dana Hospitality has been awarded the retail food services contract beginning June 1, 2024. Current food options on campus will remain open and available throughout the transition. Dana is a Canadian owned company that specializes in scratch cooking utilizing local ingredients. They will be seeking feedback from the campus community to develop healthy menu options that meet our diverse dietary needs. Beginning in June, we will open a micro-market on the Langley campus, which will have a variety of healthy grab-and-go as well as heat-and-serve items. A variety of hot and cold beverages will also be available.

**Print Shop, Mailroom, & Receiving:** Funding was received for an upgraded Mailroom postage machine and an envelope folder/stuffer machine for the Print Shop. This will increase the productivity of all the mailouts produced and sent to students for Admissions, Marketing, Faculties, and the rest of KPU.





**Print Shop—New Printers:** The Print Shop was allocated a budget in fiscal 24/25 to purchase new printers, which will reduce costs by allowing us to keep the work in-house that is currently being outsourced through our external vendors for KPU signage, student projects, and external customers.





#### IT INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES

#### **Entertainment Arts Program**

All AV hardware has arrived onsite and has been installed in the multi-purpose room. As this is the last room within the ENTA project, the project is now complete.

#### **Tenant Merger Project**

Information Barriers version 2 for Microsoft Teams has been implemented under KPU's single tenant. This completes the project. Information Barriers are a series of network access policies that allow us to manage students and employees in a single directory with different levels of access control.

#### **Non-Banner Cloud Project**

Palo Alto Firewalls and the VMWare Cloud environments have been setup. A secure network zone is currently being setup for systems with external facing service requirements. Planning activities are currently in progress to set up a landing zone in the AWS western region. Approximately 20% of all targeted systems have been migrated to the cloud with the remaining planned throughout the spring, summer and fall.

# Curriculum Information Management System (Program phase) Project

The project team is completing the final phase of the Course Curriculum project. This phase completes the implementation stage by adding Faculty Program management to the Curriculum workflows. This will complete the automation from the

Faculty Program, to Course Curriculum, and finally to Calendar. The targeted go-live is June 2024.

### **Ellucian Student Portal (MyKPU)**

The Student Portal team and the ERP Steering Committee is completing its configuration for setting up the MyKPU portal to replace the out-of-date Online Self Service (OSS) portal. This new portal will leverage modern web technologies and services including a new mobile platform. The target rollout is planned for August 2024.

## Ellucian Customer Relationship Management (CRM) Advise

The Ellucian Customer Relationship Management (CRM) Advise project's goal is to implement a new advising solution for KPU. The project team is in the implementation phase with Ellucian, and the goal for soft go-live for staff advising is June 2024.

BANNER Document Management System (BDMS) for Finance Currently, Student and HR/Payroll leverage the BDMS application to take advantage of a paperless model for document management. Finance is in the process of transitioning their

Faculty fiscal campaigns for 2023-2024 have wrapped up and the creative and strategic briefing process for our 2024-2025 fiscal campaign process has begun.

Key strategic advertising opportunities included:

- Georgia Straight sponsorship of "The Breakouts" promoting Entertainment Arts and their Side Quest activity/ event.
- 3. Transit Shelter Ads at strategic locations in the communities near our campuses (millions of local impressions)
- Internationally educated nurses conference program advertisement

### **Brand Awareness Campaigns**

- Large wall murals at Guildford Town Centre to promote KPU
- 2. Digital billboards in our communities
- 3. Transit Shelter Ads across our regions



The above tactics acquired millions of impressions throughout our local communities.

Additional advertisements were created to support various external affairs initiatives and partnerships such as the Surrey Board of Trade Women in Business Awards, City of Surrey SAS-SY Awards, Langley Chamber of Commerce Women's Leadership Lunch and the Vancouver Football Club.

KPU was also featured in advertising in both print and digital mediums:

In addition, there were a number large projects that required multiple sets of creative assets including KDocs: A Social Justice Film Festival and the February Convocation ceremonies.

#### Social Media

We continue to see increases in key social media metrics such as impressions (up 8% on Facebook and 39% on Instagram) as we engage with all our audience segments, which include current students, alumni, faculty, prospective students and staff.

#### CRM

Marketing has established a new role working within our Customer Relationship Management System (CRM). This role, CRM Specialist, manages all the technical aspects, customizations and creating email automations for the system. When prospective student data is entered, emails will be automatically sent, providing promotional information, program information and institutional information to nurture them through the application funnel.

The Web Team within the Marketing department completed a migration of moving all public-facing event registration forms to our CRM. This ensures that all prospective students and other key members of the public are added to our e-mail database.

KPU's first email marketing automations have been developed and piloted sending automatic marketing emails. Marketing is currently reviewing data and creating a strategic plan to roll out more email marketing workflows to prospective students.

#### **Alumni Perks Campaign**





A new, digitally activated alumni-perks campaign achieved over 8 million impressions across British Columbia with over 184,000 clicks on our advertisements. The campaign generated over 100 direct conversions (sign ups on the alumni website) and 40 other forms were submitted throughout the website.

A new strategy was proposed by Marketing this year to target digital ads to KPU Alumni who may have not realized that they are missing out on perks and benefits of being registered. <u>It</u> definitely proved to be successful.

### **Brand Awareness - Google Search Advertisements**

Our Google Search campaigns continue to be optimized for better performance and we continued to see an increase in forms submitted on our website, generally getting people in touch with our Future Students office or registering for an event. We saw 191 conversions for general brand awareness, and our Faculty of Health campaign had 197 conversions.

Note: A conversion in the context of digital advertising means that someone clicked on an ad, and then committed an action on our website. Our most common conversion points on the website are event registration forms and Future Student Office contact forms.

## **Convocation Activation and Campaign**

At the February convocation, we create a compelling Convocation video. We captured graduates at their convocation ceremonies speaking about their journey at KPU and how they felt about their achievements. We then utilized the video as a part of our digital advertising mix, pre-rolling it (promoting it) to prospective students on YouTube.

In just 3 weeks the video acquired 5,300 views on YouTube with a total watch time of 136 hours.

#### **Website Analytics**

www.kpu.ca received 631,056 users, with 611,351 of those users being new to the site (not having visited the site in over 30 days). We saw a total of 22,953 actions taken on the site (form submissions, apply now clicks and Future Students Office contact form submissions) with 1.3 total web sessions.


#### Office of Communications

During this reporting period, which covers February 1 to April 30, 2024, KPU received many favourable media mentions via television, radio, newspapers and websites as a result of news releases and strategic story pitches from the Office of Communications. A news release highlighting the Faculty of Arts' Inside Out program garnered significant coverage in this period with numerous stories appearing in local and national broadcast and print media. Other positive stories also appeared in major outlets such as Global News, CBC Radio, CKNW and Business in Vancouver, along with specialty and regional publications, including Drishti Magazine, Winnipeg Free Press and Cabin Radio, that reach a range of audiences. KPU also drew positive attention from media outlets that report in languages other than English, such as Omni TV, Le Droit and Fairchild Radio.

The Office of Communications created compelling news releases publicizing important university information, such as KPU's distinction of again being named one of B.C.'s top employers, the awarding of honorary degrees to Francois Paulette and Denise Amyot, and the appointment of the university's first Indigenous Designer in Residence. Other news releases highlighted valuable KPU research, including the Institute for Sustainable Horticulture's study of growing basil through aeroponics and the ORGASM Research Lab exploring marginalization based on body type. Further stories showcased faculty achievements and spotlighted student and alumni success.

We continued to promote KPU's faculty members as experts. From our instructors, reporters gained informed perspectives on everything from cellphones in schools and the collapse of a high-profile drug case to video game trends and the importance of local food systems.

From February 1, 2024, to April 30, 2024, the Office of Communications helped KPU gain 2,110 media mentions with a potential reach of almost 846.3 million readers, listeners or viewers (source: Meltwater). Of those mentions, 1,726 were positive and 384 were neutral. In addition, stories and news releases from the Office of Communications attracted nearly 145,000 impressions on the KPU LinkedIn and the KPU News X (formerly Twitter) accounts combined.

The office supported the university as it continued to navigate the impact of the international student study permit cap and a variety of other issues. We provided research (competitive, audience, keyword, etc.) and writing support to enhance or create webpages for Student Rights and Responsibilities, Scheduling and Registration, ENTA, the Faculty of Science, the Biology department, the Biology program and more.

Internally, there were 43 stories published on the SharePoint employee portal, including two of the highest viewed stories since recording started. The portal saw new records for monthly traffic, setting new highs for views, number of visitors, and time spent on page.

A second Today@ training and best practices seminar was held in February, attracting 43 attendees. These sessions are elevating effective use of this internal distribution channel. Embedded videos have been implemented for Today@ and Share-Point stories via Microsoft Stream to help diversify content. We also worked directly to support internal communications and promotion for UNSDG Week, Climate+, the Office of Research's EDI in Research training initiative, and KPU Day.
