Office of the President and Vice Chancellor

In addition to my routine governance and administrative meetings, the following activities during the last few months are of note.

In December, the KPU Holiday Socials were held across the campuses and I was pleased to be able to attend those held in Richmond, Surrey and KPU Tech.

On December 13th I attended the virtual meetings of the AGB Council of Presidents and the CAEL Advisory Board. There have been numerous calls during this period with Universities Canada, Polytechnics Canada, and College and Institutes Canada, as well as with provincial groups mand PSFS, to determine the impact of the federal IRCC regulations and caps. A lot of good local work has been done with MLAs and MPs to make sure they understand KPU's endeavors and successes in supporting international students, and what the impact of unreasonable caps might be on our communities. I plan to keep the university community fully updated as we manage our way through these unexpected constraints.

The first KPU New Moon Gala was held on January 11th and was a huge success. A lot of thanks to Gayle Bedard and her team and to Kim McGill and her team in Major Events. The event raised funds for Indigenous student scholarships. The gala welcomed B.C. Lieutenant Governor and recently appointed Office of the Order of Canada the Honourable Steven Point, as the guest speaker. Guests witnessed the celebration of culture with three performances, a silent auction and a catered dinner.





On January 15th we hosted Dr. Don Wright at a President's Dialogue on the future of higher education in BC. Form January 16 to 20th, a group from KPU visited Southern New Hampshire University and met with key leaders and with the President Dr. Paul LeBlanc. SNHU is one of the most innovative and successful institutions in North America, and we came away with some key ideas to consider for KPU.

On January 29th I attended a press announcement by Ministers Rachna Singh and Selina Robinson and MLA Henry Yao on changes that Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills (PSFS) will be making to the regulation of international education. Part of the presentation included a great contribution from Arjun Taneja, a current student who described the outstanding experience he is having at KPU.

Representatives of the New Westminster and Coquitlam school districts met with KPU leaders on January 31st, and on February 2nd I enjoyed meeting with an old friend and major donor to KPU, Dr. Sherman Jen.

On February 5 -7 I attended Accelerate, the Universities Canada event that looks at major trends, including the pivotal role of generative AI, the future of Canadian health care, the housing crisis, and the political climate for universities.

On February 12th I was joined by VP Students Zena Mitchell and Provost Diane Purvey as we presented to the PSFS Deputy Minister Bobbi Plecas on the state of international education at KPU. We had a robust discussion with the DM and her staff on the impacts of BC's new regulations, but more immediately, those of the federal government on student visas.

I attended the virtual Council for Adult and Experiential Learning Advisory Council meeting on February 15, followed by the State of the City address by Mayor Brenda Lock, Mayor of the City of Surrey. That evening I was very pleased to attend the latest KPU session at Science World, featuring Dr. Dr. Paul Adams.

KDocs held its annual film festival on February 21 to 25, and I was fortunate to attend the opening events and introduce one of the movies and presenters.

On February 24th I joined in the Coldest Night of the Year walk at the Cloverdale Community Kitchen and February 26 to March 1 was of course the Spring Convocation, which was a remarkable success and we honored distinguished awardees and honorary degree recipients Denise Amyot and Francois Paulette:



I joined my colleagues at an Advancing Accessibility workshop, organized by KPU's Accessibility Committee on March 4, and had an introductory call with the new PSFS Minister Lisa Beare that afternoon.

March 19 saw the annual Research Showcase, which I was able to pop in and out of, and on the 21st KPU hosted its annual Antiracism symposium. The BCAIU presidents met in Vancouver on March 22.

On March 26 I was able to attend the Association of Governing Boards Council of Presidents meeting in Boston.


OFFICE OF COMMUNICATIONS

Media specialist Inna Davydenko joined the Office of Communications in December. Her experience locating and pitching new media contacts will help as the team seeks new avenues to earn coverage for KPU in a diminishing traditional media market. Her early successes include securing coverage of the KDocs Film Festival on Global News and in the Tyee, while the New Moon Gala was covered by the Surrey Now Leader.

KPU garnered many positive mentions in major media outlets as a result of our news releases, targeted pitches and efficient responses to inquiries from reporters. Global News, CBC Radio, CTV News, Business in Vancouver, and Postmedia and Black Press newspapers all favourably showcased university people and programs in numerous stories.

Our news releases underscored student success, such as undergraduate research at the Applied Genomics Centre and Wilson School of Design's partnership with Museum of Vancouver, and told important stories of faculty achievements, from the successful Indigenous languages and cultures conference and Science Jam competition, to research on fast fashion from Dr. Yunzhijun Yu and instructors involved in the inaugural Agricultural Summit. Other stories promoted KPU's commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, charitable efforts of Giving Tuesday and the timely conversations of the President's Dialogue Series.

During this reporting period from November 1, 2023, to January 31, 2024, the Office of Communications helped KPU gain 646 media mentions with a potential reach of almost 593 million readers, listeners or viewers (source: Meltwater). Of those mentions, 495 were positive and two were negative (one excluded KPU's response and the other did not give KPU an opportunity to respond). In addition, stories and news releases from the Office of Communications attracted almost 140,000 impressions on the KPU LinkedIn and the KPU News X



(formerly Twitter) accounts combined.

Efforts to further enhance communications included regular reporting of media mentions, media training of experts and updating our style guide for university communicators. The weekly round up of media mentions was also revamped and relaunched into a more presentable and digestible format.

The communications team provided research and writing support to enhance or create webpages for the Career Development Centre, Indigenous Hub, student food security, a student wellness initiative, and sustainable agriculture. The team worked with Marketing on a LinkedIn social media project. Communications also provided advice and guidance to senior leadership on a number of issues, including the impact of the federal government's cap on new international student study permits.

During this reporting period, 38 stories were published on the SharePoint employee portal, 21 external and 17 internal stories. We experimented with some user-generated posts, specifically for content around the holiday season. That content was generally well-received but also provided lessons for the future. Processes for improving the accessibility of our Share-Point content were developed and launched in late January, specifically addressing screen-reader concerns for all content on SharePoint.

Today@KPU submissions continue to increase, showcasing more adoption of the platform by official and unofficial communicators. An audit of SharePoint analytics was conducted that provided us with more detailed insights on how staff and faculty are using the platform and what content is effective for communicating with specific audiences. This will help inform our communication strategies on SharePoint as we continue to track and measure user data and feedback.

EXPERIENCE

Student Experience

- Student Satisfaction Survey: This survey collects a range of information from students on their KPU experience to identify areas for improvement. The 2023 survey was launched on October 23, 2023 and closed on December 3, 2023. Reporting thus far has covered the following:
 - Slides of key findings on demographics, overall satisfaction, and perceptions of being treated fairly at KPU.
 - Needs and preferences regarding on-campus food services to support procurement of a new on-campus food services provider;
 - Registration and scheduling preferences for Trades Apprenticeship students to support decision-making on registration process;
 - Student perceptions of safety and use of the KPU Safe app to support campus security; and
 - Interest, needs, and preferences for on-campus student housing to support next steps in KPU's development of student housing.
- Held several consultation sessions with a range of KPU faculty and staff on OPA's inaugural 2022 Student Satisfaction Survey dashboard, which was published August 2023. The purpose of the sessions was to orient KPU community members to the dashboard and its functionalities and to elicit feedback to ensure the dashboard meets staff and faculty needs. Several dashboard changes were implemented due to the feedback received to improve reporting effectiveness.
- Supported KPU International's scholarship programming by providing them with a list of International students who are eligible for the *International Student Merit Scholarship*, as defined by their criteria.

Employee Experience

• Developed a comprehensive report of employee feedback on internationalization at KPU. The report consists of two parts: the main body and an appendix. The main body contains graphs of the survey results for each rated question and the results of the thematic analysis of the openended comments. The appendix contains the detailed results for the rated questions. For each question, a breakdown of responses is provided by the three employee groups: faculty, administrators, and staff. Thematic analysis was conducted on the responses to the open-ended questions to provide clear and organized results. This report was released to the KPU community in January 2024.

Student and Employee Health and Wellness

Mindful Campus Initiative Surveys: The Mindful Campus

Initiative (MCI) is a federally funded program led by Ontario-based OCAD University. The program consists of a series of courses on mindfulness and resilience strategies to improve well-being of staff, students, and faculty on postsecondary campuses across Canada. The program was rolled out at the Wilson School of Design September 2023 and OPA has been supporting administration of surveys as part of the program's evaluation. Pre-course surveys measuring current levels of resilience and mental wellbeing of the initiative's registered students and employees were conducted in the Fall 2023 and Spring 2024 terms. A post-course survey was also administered for registered employees to measure changes in resilience and wellbeing over time. During this reporting period, student precourse survey results were provided to the Faculty of Design Dean's Office, and survey results were provided to the MCI program coordinators located at the OCAD University in Toronto. A survey for the program's peer facilitators at KPU was also run to collect feedback on the program and information about potential benefits of participation. These results were also provided to OCAD University.

SUSTAINABILITY

Integrated Planning

- In coordination with the Office of the Provost and the Faculty of Arts, provided enrolment information so software licenses can be assigned to ENTA students in time for the start of the Spring 2024 term.
- Developed enrolment projections for Spring 2025 and updated the projections for Summer 2024 and Fall 2024 as of Spring 2024 Stable Enrolment Date. This information was used to develop International student enrolment targets and caps for Spring 2025.
- Developed several scenarios of the possible impacts of the reduction in international study permits announced by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) on January 22, 2024.
- Provided the Provost with data to inform institutional planning in relation to the anticipated impact of announced IRCC changes on International student numbers for Summer 2024.
- Provided tentative enrolment projections to 2030 for the Campus and Community Planning Office.
- Assisted the Faculty of Health in their efforts to lay out the process for offering a variation in their Bachelor of Science of Nursing Program. This variation is through special funding and support from the BC Nurses' Union and Fraser Health. OPA provided support in the calculation of potential FTEs and the mechanism to ensure that the FTEs generated by the students are assigned properly.

Office of Associate Vice President, Planning & Accountability cont'd

 Provided data and projections to the School of Business to inform their departmental planning in preparation for converting CISY and INFO programs from Open Intake to Limited Intake programs.

Enrolment Planning

- Developed and distributed an infographic fact sheet that provides an overview of enrolment (e.g., headcounts, FTEs, and international student seat utilization) for the most recent semester and academic year for KPU decision -makers. In this reporting period, a fact sheet was produced for Spring 2024. Fact sheets are produced each term following the stable enrolment date and are published on OPA's new SharePoint site.
- Supported the delivery of a survey to applicants to KPU nursing programs in 2022 and 2023 who either declined their offer or accepted but did not end up attending. The survey was in support of research being conducted by Education Planner BC (EPBC) to understand the reasons for declining nursing program enrolments at BC postsecondary institutions.
- Provided historical enrolment data on KPU's Diploma in Mechatronics and Advanced Manufacturing Technology program, as well as enrolment statistics and program descriptions (curriculum overview, tuition costs, admission and credit requirements) for comparable programs at other BC institutions, to the program's leadership to support enrolment planning in that program.
- Created the Stable Enrolment report for Spring 2024 as of January 19, 2024 in the PowerBI Enrolment Tracking Dashboard.
- Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Summer 2024, Fall 2024, and Spring 2025, are currently running and dashboards are updated weekly. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted, and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of international applicants.
- Ongoing enhancements and updates of OPA Power BI dashboards: Academic Standing, Grade Distribution, Credential, Applicant Funnel, Enrolment Tracking, Current Enrolment, Over-Enrolment, Seats, Employee, Retention Overview, Limited-Intake Retention, and others.
- Applicant Tracking Reports: Provides weekly updates during the final six months of the applicant cycle on expected conversions of applicants to admitted, and admitted to enrolled. Once registration begins, the report also includes the number of admitted who actually registered in courses. The weekly updates for Summer and Fall 2024 are ongoing.

JUSTICE

Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Accessibility

 Provided analysis of aggregate student demographic data from the Student Satisfaction Survey to the Journalism department. The data is being used to support its action plan on diversity, which aims to address the representation of people of different demographic groups in the program.

QUALITY

Quality Assurance

- Program Review: OPA's Quality Assurance Team supports the Program Review process, from planning to data collection to coordination with the Senate Standing Committee on Program Review (SSCPR).
- Kick-off meetings were held for five programs that started the program review process in January 2024:

 - Computer Aided Design and Drafting

- QA team drafted student, alumni, faculty, and discipline/ sector surveys for Bachelor of Nursing and Computer Aided Design and Drafting.

- Course Feedback: Course Feedback surveys for Fall 2023 were conducted for 1,845 sections. The Quality Assurance Team prepared and delivered 1,129 reports to instructors. Deans received the reports for probationary instructors and aggregate reports for post-probationary instructors. In Fall 2023, we used social media and incentives (two \$100 gift cards) for the second time to promote the course feedback surveys and increase response rates. At the start of the pandemic, response rates declined considerably. The overall course feedback response rate returned to its pre-pandemic level in Fall of 2023.

- Completed the IRCC Compliance Report by providing the status of 7828 International students as of Fall 2023.
- Supported research being conducted by BC Council on Admissions & Transfer (BCCAT) profiling transfer students and their performance in the BC system by providing anonymized KPU academic data on transfer students.
- Supported the library by providing data on KPU headcounts and FTEs for the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL).
- Provided data on the number of students in the City Centre area to the City of Surrey to support research related to urban planning.



- Completed the annual submission to Statistics Canada's Full Time: University and College Academic Staff System (FT-UCASS).

ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

BC's Top Employer Competition

KPU has been named one of BC's Top Employers for the fourth year in a row. The annual competition recognized KPU for celebrating employee achievements, family-friendly benefits, and campus environment. This special designation recognizes B.C. employers that lead their industries in offering exceptional places to work.

Employee Workshops

Human Resources offered several professional development workshops and webinars to KPU employees which included: Excelling in a Hybrid Workplace (Individual Contributors); Managing Hybrid Teams Successfully (People Leaders); The Working Mind (Managers); Having the Courage: Difficult Conversations Level 1; Having the Courage: Difficult Conversations Level 2; Masterful Meetings; Essential Skills for Managers; Mental Health First Aid; and True Colors.

Onboarding and Orientation

KPU held a virtual New Employee Orientation on January 26th. Approximately 49 new employees registered to attend the online event. HR also ran its third New Employee Meet and Greet event on February 12th, the purpose of which is to provide an opportunity for new employees to informally socialize and network in-person and meet the executive leadership team.

PEOPLE SERVICES

Health and Benefits

Following the ratification of the collective agreements, the Health and Benefits team has worked diligently with third party benefit providers to incorporate the negotiated enhancements to the group benefit plan/policy. Benefit enhancements included the development and implementation of a new one-time Wellness Account for all employee groups.

Human Resources Information Systems (HRIS)

HRIS has successfully completed the annual vacation upload for BCGEU and excluded employees, and new salary grids, as defined during bargaining for GEU and Faculty, have been uploaded and implemented in Banner.

Payroll

The Payroll team completed has completed retroactive payments for BCGEU employees as a result of the newly bargained collective agreement. Work related to retroactive payments for faculty has begun. Payroll has also completed year end reporting for pension and T4 adjustments.

In partnership with Marketing, the Talent Acquisition team has initiated the use of the main KPU LinkedIn page to promote specific leadership and other general career opportunities at KPU. This, in conjunction with work being done to encourage widespread ownership in attracting talent to KPU, helps increase awareness of KPU as an employer of choice.

Labour Relations Update

On January 5th, 2024, a new KPU-BCGEU Collective Agreement was officially ratified. Work has begun on implementing the new changes to the collective agreement.

The University reached a settlement agreement with the KFA on February 22, 2024, on the outstanding matters concerning the definition of Continuing and Professional Studies (CPS) work that may be assigned to non-bargaining unit CPS faculty. This settlement will provide the University with more clarity and direction for the development of future CPS offerings.

RISK AND SECURITY

Emergency Planning

KPU participated in a province-wide emergency response tabletop exercise within BC's post-secondary sector. Throughout the day, the KPU's Emergency Operations Centre Team and the Executive Team were mobilized and actively engaged in the scheduled activities throughout the day.

Installation of blackout blinds was completed at the Surrey campus. These blinds are installed in various classrooms and offices as protective measures to be utilized during security threats.

Occupational Health & Safety

Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) expanded the Monthly Safety Focus (MSF) Program with six new safety topics, aiming to enhance health and safety awareness across the KPU community. These topics, selected based on Joint Occupational Health and Safety Committee feedback and OHS department trends, are shared through Today @KPU communications and accessible on the OHS SharePoint site.

The OHS team published the OHS at a Glance Report, covering safety metrics from September 2023 to December 2023. This tri-annual report, available on the OHS SharePoint site, undergoes review by our Joint Occupational Health and Safety committees.

OH&S successfully organized and conducted its annual training event for Joint Occupational Health and Safety Committee members, focusing on office ergonomics.

Risk Management

Risk continues to support KPU with various ongoing engagements including the cyber insurance renewal process and renewal of the fleet insurance program. The team is creating and implementing a new KPU driver policy in collaboration with numerous different partners across the institution. In addition, the Risk department met with functional leads across the university as part of the annual risk review process resulting in an updated consolidated risk register.

Security Operations

Throughout this reporting period, Security responded to various concerns including alarms, property crime, suspicious activity, trespassing, and instances of aggressive behavior. In addition, the transition to the new Security Incident Reporting System was completed successfully.

The Security team recently collaborated with the Surrey Police Service to deliver a presentation on personal safety in an effort to educate and empower individuals about their own safety.



Office of the Chief Financial Officer

OFFICE OF THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer ("CFO") would like to highlight the approval of the Fiscal 2024-25 Budget by the Board of Governors on January 31, 2024. This success is a result of hard work across the University, including the Budget and Planning team, who work on the budget development process year-round with a view to continuous improvement, the Executive team, senior leadership and key consultative groups, who contribute to both the current process and future enhancements. Approval of the budget in advance of fiscal year-end is a considerable accomplishment as it allows budget holders to begin their planning and recruiting efforts before the new fiscal year begins.

The Office of the CFO enthusiastically welcomed two new team members: <u>Tracy Germaine</u>, <u>Associate Vice President</u>, <u>Finance</u> and Zuleika Bhamji, Executive Assistant to the CFO. The team continues to build on its foundation to provide a well-rounded financial support system for KPU. Welcome Tracy and Zuleika!

The department is actively recruiting for positions to support its functions pursuing operational excellence. Positions include Director, Financial Services (Reporting and Budget), Director, Financial Services (Accounting and Systems), and Director, Internal Audit.

PROCUREMENT SERVICES

In November 2023, all members of the Procurement Services team attended the BCNET Procurement Services Member Forum. These forums provide an opportunity for BCNET members to share knowledge, network and discuss new trends in procurement. Among the many topics discussed was the new Bill S-211 (Act on Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains) and its implications for the post-secondary sector.

Also, in November 2023, the procurement team held a full-day joint session with the University of Fraser Valley's procurement team. The aim was to share unique experiences, lessons learned, as well as trends for public procurement practice in the Fraser Valley Region. Potential opportunities to enhance efficiency through economies of scale were identified for joint procurement including Request for Qualification for Construction Project Managers and Procurement Consultant.

Strategic Projects in the Procurement Cycle:

- The Richmond Plaza Renovation tender closed and the contract was awarded in December 2023.
- The Project Management Services for Surrey Daycare Building solicitation was completed and the contract awarded in January 2024.
- The Child Care Operator for the Surrey Daycare competition was posted and closed in early February 2024.

ACADEMIC INITIATIVES

New International Students

The Provost's Office is responding to the federal government's move to cap new international student study permits by mitigating the potential effects of a significant drop in new international student enrolment. Of primary concern among these impacts is the logistical challenge we would face from fewer students in classrooms. For both Summer and Fall 2024, our mitigation efforts may involve consolidating multiple sections of the same class, and reassigning instructors to projects or, where there is alignment with their expertise, another class. Unfortunately, in some areas, we may have to cancel job postings.

This also presents an opportunity to retool the university for future growth through new curriculum opportunities and an expansion of Continuing and Professional Studies.

The Academic Plan

Last fall we began the process of developing the new academic plan to align with Vision 2026 throughout our academic programs. The new plan aims to build on the potential revealed by the covid-19 pandemic, while addressing several continuing structural institutional challenges.

In the first, fall phase of developing Academic Plan 2027, plan coordinator **Dr. Tracey Kinney** met with faculty, staff and administrators to hear concerns, ideas, and recommendations. We are grateful to all those who offered their insights and perspectives.

As a result of those conversations, we have identified four main goals, and 22 actions that will enable us to:

- improve student success and engagement,
- improve faculty, staff and administrative success and engagement,
- expand and promote experiential learning and scholarship, and
- update and futureproof the curriculum.

Now, in phase two, we are seeking broader feedback from faculty, staff and administrators across the university to ensure the new plan is credible, effective, and feasible. A survey has been sent to all employees to ask about the main goals, and the actions we believe will achieve those goals. The academic plan survey, which will be anonymous, will be open from Monday, February 26, to Sunday, March 10, 2024.

Policy and Academic Affairs Unit

Proposal to Establish a Faculty of Graduate Studies (FoGS) at

<u>KPU</u>

The FoGS Full Written Proposal Task Force met on January 15, 2024, and reviewed the draft full written proposal to establish the FoGS at KPU. The Task Force endorsed the draft full written proposal for university-wide consultation, which was available on the Policy Consultation Engine for feedback until February 9, 2024. In mid-January, the team sent a communication to the Deans, Vice Chair of Senate, and Faculty Council Chairs and Vice-Chairs, and hosted six drop-in Teams meetings over three weeks between January and February to solicit feedback from the university community. In February, the unit reviewed and considered all feedback received, and revised the draft full written proposal where appropriate. The final draft proposal will be sent to the Task Force in mid-March for consideration, and to Senate for recommendation to the Board of Governors for final approval in late spring 2024.

Proposed Policy AC5 Graduate Degree Studies, Omnibus Policy Revision

The unit conducted a university-wide preliminary consultation process between November 2023 and February 2024. The unit subsequently reviewed all feedback received to date and prepared the next set of drafts for a 3-week Phase Two Posting on the KPU Policy Blog in mid-February, where the university community was invited to provide feedback. The unit anticipates finalizing the next set of drafts for Senate's approval in late spring 2024.

Other Policies for Consultation

Draft Policy and Procedure ER2 Naming of University Assets (amalgamation of AC12 Naming, Academic Units and ER8 Asset Naming Opportunities) were made available on the Policy Consultation Engine in February as part of the university-wide preliminary consultation process. The unit, along with members of the policy writing team, subsequently reviewed feedback received during the preliminary consultation process. It is anticipated that the next set of drafts will be posted on the KPU Policy Blog for a 3-week Phase Two Posting in March, and to Senate in late spring for recommendation to the Board for final approval in early fall 2024.

Draft Policy and Procedure IM7 *Management of Surveys* have completed the Phase Two Posting on the KPU Policy Blog as of February 6. The policy developer reviewed feedback received, and is working on finalizing the drafts for the President's approval in March/April.

Curriculum Unit

The launch of the newest module of curricular software, CIM Programs, is scheduled for summer, 2024. The project team is currently finalizing testing of the software and developing training for faculty members and staff. A member of the Curricular Support team will attend the software vendor's annual user conference and return with information about additional software features that may be of interest to include as well as the planned upgrade for the software that support the university calendar and course outlines.

The Curricular Support team has launched the "Curriculum Hub", a single location to house materials and resources related to curriculum development. This site will contain links to materials produced by several administrative units so that faculty members and staff can easily access training and information related to curricular processes at the university all in one place.

KPU Flex is receiving and processing applications for its pilot project in ePortfolio assessment for recognition of prior learning. This pilot project will help define how similar competency-based assessments could be used by other programs and identify new populations of applicants.

Academic Integrity Unit

The Academic Integrity Unit is excited to announce that Draft Coach has been launched to all KPU students alongside various online resources. Draft Coach is an optional tool that students can use to receive feedback on their writing through the similarity check, citation check, and grammar guide. The unit has also been providing information about Draft Coach across the university through student workshops, tabling on the Surrey and Civic Plaza campuses, faculty presentations and presenting to the ACP Faculty Council and ELS Department.

The Academic Integrity Unit has participated in various student events to promote and increase awareness around academic integrity and the available resources. This includes the Long Night Against Procrastination events hosted by the Library in November on the Surrey and Richmond campuses, the International Live Virtual Orientation in December for all new international students, the Student Resource Fairs during First Year Festival in early January, and in-person training for new International Peer mentors in mid-January. Our student ambassadors have also been supporting some of the WRTG 1100 clas-

ses by attending classes and presenting on academic integrity and, sharing their student perspective to engage their peers.

In mid-January, Academic Integrity Student Ambassador Alejandra Silvera shared her student perspective as part of a BC Campus FLO Panel on the Ethical and Creative Use of Artificial Intelligence in Post-secondary Education, sparking discussion on how artificial intelligence and academic integrity can interact.

The team piloted a conference centre exam session in December in partnership with Scheduling and the Accounting departments where some sections of Accounting exams took place in the conference centre alongside other sections to reduce the possibility of academic misconduct.

A pilot for the Restorative Responses to Academic Integrity Breaches Moodle Course that Dr. Alana Abramson has been working on was also launched. Once the feedback is received, the moodle course will be updated accordingly and will be available for all KPU employees.

Continuing Professional Studies Unit

Strategic meetings with Faculty units are being conducted in the first quarter of 2024 to discuss the strategic direction of CPS and, provide an update on the new language in the LOU#3 and LOU#4 of the KPU-KFA Collective Agreement.

CPS Central will proceed with the first offering of the Teaching Children to Read course from February 8 to March 7, 2024.

Two new CPS courses will be offered this year: (1) Small Batch Brewing Basics for Hobbyists (Faculty of Science), and (2) Decoding Company Financial Statements for Non-Accountants (Melville School of Business). Additional courses are anticipated to be offered this year as Faculty units are exploring more community and industry partnerships.

Work Integrated Learning Unit

The Fall and Spring terms have brought Work-Integrated Learning information to a wide range of faculty members. The following departments have arranged to receive a twenty-minute presentation on Work-Integrated Learning from Dr. Larissa Petrillo (Lead Advisor, Work-Integrated Learning) and Zakiya Housil (Academic Project Coordinator):

Accounting, Biology, BSN A-E, Creative Writing, Criminology, EACS, Educational Studies, English, Fashion Design, Fine Arts, Horticulture, Interdisciplinary Expressive Arts (IDEA), Journalism, Language and Cultures, Music, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Traditional Chinese Medicine, the ACP Faculty

Council, Trades and Technology Faculty Council, and the Faculty of Science Faculty Council.

This has meant that over 250 faculty members have had a chance to hear about, and discuss, KPU's latest information on Work-Integrated Learning, including WIL learning outcomes, new WIL guidebooks, available supports, and ways of expanding their offerings in this area. Meetings are ongoing this spring.

The <u>Service Learning Assistants</u>, for the Spring, 2024 term, are held in Biology, Fashion Marketing, Public Relations, Employment and Community Studies, Political Science, Operations and Supply Chain Management, specific language courses, and the inaugural year of <u>KPU's Museum Lab</u>. Service Learning Assistants (SLAs) are paid student leaders who help coordinate and support Work-Integrated Learning courses at KPU.

Including All Citizens Unit

Conversations & Connections: Group Discussion Skills for Multilingual Speakers

English Language Studies instructor, Melissa Swanink, began offering weekly lunch-time events in collaboration with The Learning Centre, to offer ELS students an opportunity to practice their spoken English in a relaxed and supportive environment. Every Thursday on the Surrey campus they take the opportunity to discuss topics from the new or share their personal interests.

PUBLICATIONS/SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

English Upgrading (EU) instructors have been actively working on scholarship related to recent developments in artificial intelligence (AI) and the potential pedagogical impact of large language models (LLMs) on program curriculum and future skills. EU courses are particularly skill-based so critical thinking, critical reading, and writing skills continue to be integral to our programming, but the landscape of future skills is shifting with AI evolution, and pedagogical practices, are subsequently shifting. Recently, EU instructors have been including statements on appropriate AI usage in their course syllabi as a way of opening up conversations about AI in their classes. Additionally, the English Upgrading department is presently in the process of adopting a shared policy statement on appropriate AI usage for ENGQ (English Qualifying) exams.

PRESENTATIONS / COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

In October 2023, Dr. Jovita Vytasek served as a panelist on the *Teaching and Learning Spotlight* series – Panel of ePortfolio champions, on behalf of *The Learning Centre*.

English Upgrading instructor and Chair, Chris Traynor, continues to work with English Language Studies Chair, Kathy McPherson, and Future Students' Office Student Recruitment Coordinator (and English Upgrading alumnus) Brooks Lewis to host regular online information sessions for prospective students. These twice-monthly information sessions are an opportunity for people to learn about both the English Upgrading and English Language Studies programs so prospective can choose the appropriate Pathway for their KPU careers.

INITIATIVES/ACTIVITIES

English Upgrading instructors, Sue Lee, Laken Randhawa, and Chris Traynor, collaborated with KPU's Academic Integrity Team in Fall 2023 on a pilot project to embed student Academic Integrity Ambassadors within sections of Writing (WRTG) 1100. WRTG 1100, which is a shared course between English Upgrading (EU) Department and the English Department. This course was specifically chosen as it is an Undergraduate elective writing-intensive course that new students are encouraged to take early in their KPU career, usually prior to English (ENGL) 1100 which is a required course for many KPU credentials. As such, WRTG 1100 students are often navigating academic expectations for the first time and so a more intrusive peer support program was seen as particularly helpful. The Academic Integrity Ambassador pilot was coordinated by Susan Xia, KPU's Interim Manager of Academic Integrity. The initiative connected student ambassadors Sehajpreet Kaur and Alejandra Silvera Calvo with five sections of WRTG 1100. The Academic Integrity Ambassadors gave in-class presentations on KPU's academic integrity values, created online introductory videos and tutorials, supported student research by connecting students to citation resources, and met with students individually to offer guidance on navigating academic integrity issues and scholarly expectations. All parties agreed that the pilot project was helpful for student success, and the project has continued during the Spring 2024 semester with WRTG 1100 sections taught by Sue Lee and Janice Morris. EU looks forward to continued collaborations and future innovative projects, such as this one, aimed to better support student learning.

The English Upgrading (EU) Department is continuing its partnership with Tsawwassen First Nation (TFN) to offer Adult Upgrading classes on TFN territory, and the program has seen recent increases in enrollment. The program serves a wide variety of students: those needing to complete their high school diploma, those wanting to build relevant employment skills, general

interest students interested in improving their reading and writing skills, or those interested in pursuing higher education at KPU or other institutions. The students in this program will be visiting the KPU Surrey Campus later this semester to visit the Gathering Place, meet with Indigenous Services for Students, and get a tour of the KPU campus.

The Learning Centres (TLC)

KPU100-Melville (Post-Bacc)

The Learning Centre has developed a 'Introduction to KPU' series for upcoming Post-Bacc students in the Melville School of Business. Learning Strategists worked with faculty, administration, and support staff to develop and redesign KPU100 content to align with the needs of students joining this program. Faculty reported a growing international population among Melville Post Bacc. students and wanted to incorporate content that would support these students.

- This included the addition of:
 - An introduction to Canadian business culture
 - KPU support available for international students
 - English communication skills for multi-lingual students.

The first two cohorts of KPU100-Melville were delivered online in December with an in-person cohort held for January 2024.

KPU100-Pathways

The Learning Centre has also created a KPU100 Pathways Introduction to University short program specifically targeted at new Pathway students. The new version of KPU100 was designed to be more accessible, as in-person sessions occurring in the computer lab space. Sessions were designed with additional time so that students could work through activities with the support of a learning strategist. This provides a more hands-on KPU100 experience, with the space to address specific learner needs. To develop this program, Marti Alger (Learning Strategist), and Melissa Swanink (ELST Instructor in English Language Studies) worked together to update the program to reflect the needs of incoming Pathways students. Dr. Alice Macpherson delivered this first offering at the Surrey campus in December.

Tutor Training

Going into the Fall term we saw a large number of our senior tutors graduate and so we have been focused on recruitment for new peer- tutors in a variety of areas. As part of our ongoing training and support, we onboarded 24 new level 1 tutors, and trained 15 level 2 tutors, and 6 level 3 tutors. We also add-

ed 6 new writing tutors. In the Fall, we had a total of 60 peer tutors employed.

English Language Support Workshops

Ten workshops are being offered on a range of topics, for example, sentence structure, writing concisely, pronunciation, paraphrasing, summarizing and responding to texts, and presentation skills. Workshops targeted at specific classes are also on offer.

Record Enrollment for Returning Students Support and Development Program for International Students

In collaboration with *International Academic Advising*, the Returning Students Support and Development program was completed with *The Learning Center's* largest cohort to date.

- 34 students enrolled (an increase from 24 students last semester)
- 74% completion rate, which includes 2 live sessions and a one-on-one appointment with a Learning Strategists for custom strategy support.
- Sessions took place in October 2023, to support students returning in Spring 2024.

KPU101 Thriving in Action

In Fall 2023, *The Learning Centres* collaborated with counselling to provide a revised, blended version of the six-week program. Twenty students amended. EACS Entrepreneurial Focus (Summer Semester) Curriculum Development

- Through an EACS faculty time release, and an established partnership with the Melville School of Business (ENTR), Simon Driver successfully adapted three EACS courses to align with an entrepreneurial/intrapreneurial focus. Simon met with ENTR faculty (Brad Anderson and Amanda Bickell) weekly between May 2023 Aug 2023 to develop the SLOs/PLOs (Student/Program Learning Outcomes) for the courses.
- Between June and August Simon promoted and interviewed candidates for the 2023/24 ENT cohort, closing the interview process early August with a full cohort of 12 students
- Course content and approaches to teaching and learning embrace Universally Deigned Learning (UDL). Course assignments and reflections were created through Eportfolio (PebblePad) and will exist, in perpetuity, as a virtual archive of student's work.

EACS Entrepreneurial Focus (Fall Semester)

- Student mentors were secured in the Melville School of Business. Community Partnerships were secured with Community Futures Inc, KDOCS Film Festival, and Milieu Family Services.
- KPU project partners included the following KPU departments and student groups: Dept of Sports and Recreation, KPU IT (Information Technology), and KPU's Muslim Students Association. *partnerships were based on the student's entrepreneurial objectives.
- Students began exploring their entrepreneurial values and their relationship with global sustainability through the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.
- Students learned about critical thinking, project management/ collaboration, and idea sharing. Students were partnered with a mentor from the Melville School of Business to develop a project pitch event.

The <u>Project Pitch Night</u> was an event held on the KPU Surrey campus on November 23rd. With a panel of 15 invited guests (faculty, community members, and KPU staff) students "pitched" their business plans. The attendees provided feedback and the panelists answered questions. CWB funds were allocated to support Phase 1 of these unique plans in the Spring semester of 2024.

Academic Integrity Initiatives

In collaboration with KPU's **Academic Integrity Team**, **The Learning Centres** are incorporating updated initiatives into our current support models.

- Providing ongoing information in Tutor Training Community of Practice meetings with a focus on Academic Integrity and ways to support tutees.

- Streamlining the process of student appointments with Learning Strategists in response to an Academic Integrity breach.
- Embedding KPU's Academic Integrity Resource links into KPU100.

PUBLICATIONS/SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY/AWARDS

Dr. Balbir Gurm, a valued member of our faculty, is actively engaged in several significant research endeavors. Dr. Gurm serves as a co-investigator on two impactful projects:

The "Alliance Against Violence and Adversity (AVA)" project, led by PI Nicole Letourneau and funded by CIHR, focuses on addressing violence affecting girls, women, and gender-diverse individuals. This project has been awarded \$2.4 million over 6 years (2022 – 2028) with a funding of \$400,00 per year.

Additionally, she is involved in the "Inclusive Communities for Older Immigrants (ICOI)" project, with co-investigator PI Sepali Gurge and funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council. This initiative aims to develop interventions to reduce social isolation and promote connectedness among older immigrants in Canada, with a funding of \$2.5 million for the period 2020-2027.

Dr. Balbir Gurm is an active participant in the Community of Practice for British Columbia Family Violence and Family Law. This community, facilitated by Dr. Margaret Jackson at the FRE-DA Centre for Research on Violence against Women & Children, serves as a platform for collaborative engagement and research initiatives aimed at addressing issues related to family violence and family law in British Columbia.

Dr. Gurm has had two abstracts accepted on Racism in Education and Healthcare, demonstrating her commitment to advancing knowledge in critical domains. Currently, she is involved in the process of system mapping services for youth in BC, highlighting her dedication to improving outcomes for vulnerable populations.

Dr. Gurm collaborates with Hannah Varto, a Forensic Nurse Practitioner, on strangulation research, further demonstrating her interdisciplinary approach to addressing complex issues. Dr. Gurm actively engages in knowledge translation efforts, working with Network to Eliminate Violence in Relationships (NEVR) to draft health promotion policies based on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) and neuroscience, thus contributing to the development of evidence-based interventions to address relationship violence.

PRESENTATIONS/COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Faculty of the Whole, held on February 23rd, was a full day event which included a wonderful presentation in the morning from Dr. Nicole Harder. The topic "Beyond Tradition: Transforming Health Professions Pedagogy with Effective Pedagogy and Practical Tools" focused on new ways to integrate simulations and sim labs in the health care curricula to better our student's experience and learning. The Faculty of Health has Simulation Lab Steering committee working to identify how to better integrate the use if sim labs into our programs.

The afternoon, opened by Elder Lekeyten, included concurrent sessions on Indigenous plants, Generative AI, Mindfulness, Decluttering and of course, we were very happy to see the Therapy Dogs. Many thanks to Trish Toth and Cheryl Burnstein for organizing these excellent sessions.

The BSN and BSN-AE programs provided a "Welcome Kick-Off" for new students in the first week of January. It was a wonderful, on-campus, event including food, music, meet and greet, and photo booth. The students participated in a scavenger hunt which toured them through the sim labs, the Student Learning Centre, the Library and the Dean's office. Many thanks to Connie Klimek for her hard work on this event. Dr. Balbir Gurm remains actively involved in facilitating Network to Eliminate Violence in Relationships (NEVR), a community initiative aimed at addressing relationship violence. NEVR collaborates with various stakeholders to promote awareness and prevention strategies within the community. Dr. Gurm's dedication to this cause was evident as she participated in radio interviews discussing the significance of December 6 and played a key role in organizing a candlelight vigil at Holland Park.

In addition to her involvement with NEVR, Dr. Gurm holds notable positions and engages in initiatives aimed at fostering community engagement and addressing social issues: Chairing the Minister's Advisory on community engagement with the South Asian Community, led by Minister Lana Popham. This advisory focuses on initiatives related to the establishment of a museum to promote cultural awareness and understanding within the South Asian Community.

Collaborating with youth to update the youth healthy relationships toolkit, aiming to equip young individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to cultivate healthy relationships and prevent violence.

Dr. Gurm also worked with healthcare professionals to update the toolkit on screening for abuse, ensuring that healthcare providers have the necessary resources to identify and support individuals experiencing abuse.

Dr. Balbir Gurm collaborated with DIVERSEcity and PREM to organize the annual One Billion Rising Event. This event aimed to raise awareness about the widespread issue of genderbased violence. Through this partnership, Dr. Gurm demonstrated her commitment to addressing this pressing societal issue and promoting advocacy for gender equality and empowerment.

INITIATIVES/ACTIVITIES

LPN into BSN Program:

KPU is working with the Fraser Health Authority, Ministry of Health, and the BC Nurses Union on an "learn while you earn" initiative for Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs) to complete their academic requirements (BSN) for licensure as RNs. This initiative is in alignment with the BC Health Human Resources Plan, and will also provide additional nurses to Fraser Health to assist with their staffing needs for the Royal Columbian Hospital redevelopment project and the new hospital in Surrey. Work continues on planning for a "pilot" cohort of 24 LPNs that will enter KPU's BSN Program with an advanced standing in recognition of their prior learning and experience as LPNs. This will be an additional cohort, over and above the 2 intakes the BSN Program has each year. Eligibility criteria for this pilot cohort include: current registration with BCCNM as an LPN; currently employed at Royal Columbian Hospital as an LPN; a minimum of 3 years experience working as a LPN; and, meeting KPU's admission requirements for the BSN program. The selection of the cohort will be made by a process established by Fraser Health and the BC Nurses Union. The LPNs that do not currently have the admission requirement courses of BIOL 1160, BIOL 1260, ENGL 1100 and an Arts course will be proceeding through a Summer (May 2024) Term at KPU to take these classes. The LPN applicants will proceed through a "KPU Flex" process supported by the Provost's Office, where applicants will submit a portfolio of their education, work history, additional courses/training taken, etc. to determine eligibility for course credit. There has been an incredible KPU Team working on this initiative that deserve thanks and recognition: from the Faculty of Health: Dean Sharmen Lee, Associate Dean Sarah Beasleigh, DBM Christy Jahn, Sherilyn Sweeney, Connie Klimek, June Kaminski, and the BSN Program faculty; from the Faculty of Arts: Dean Shelley Boyd, Associate Dean Dan Lett and the Departments of English and Criminology; from the Faculty of Science: Dean Brett Favaro, Associate Dean Erika Eliason and the Department of Biology; from the Finance Department: Stef Singer and Kristina Kidd; from the Office of Planning and Accountability: Associate Vice-President Lori McElroy and Norwinda Binuya-Barros; from the Office of the Registrar, Nadia Henwood and Molly Kirsch; from the Office of the Provost: Meredith Laird and Pal Trehan.

Faculty members within the GNIE program are diligently working on curriculum mapping exercises to ensure alignment with program objectives and industry standards. Additionally, GNIE faculty are actively contributing to the preparation of reports that provide valuable insights into the program's performance and impact.

The GNIE program is exploring opportunities to expand its offerings virtually to enhance accessibility and flexibility for students. This initiative reflects the program's commitment to innovative teaching methods and reaching a wider audience. The HCAP program has completed is update of the curriculum to align with the new provincial Registry guidelines. The FoH EDI committee has established Terms of Reference and identified several recommendations from the TFA Final Report to focus our efforts in the area of Curriculum and Pedagogy. The committee will be gathering resources and identify appropriate training activities for FoH faculty members. The Indigenization and Decolonization Community of Practice has identified a goal of bringing Indigenous culture to the Faculty of Health and is planning a "Celebrating Indigenous Ways" day for Fall 2024. As well, they have identified several activities in the xe?el\(\frac{1}{2}\)- KPU Pathway to Systemic Transformation document under "Pathway 1: Reflecting Upon Our Own Biases" as a priority for the community to start with.

Since January 2024, KPU Brewing has implemented a new software, Grist Analytics, that allows students to track brewing data in real time.

The renovations to the 2nd year Biology labs were completed in December allowing us to offer our full complement of first-and second-year Biology and Health Science courses on the Richmond campus for the first time since 2018.

Approval of our revisions to the BSc, Major in Biology, Cooperative Education Option and the BSc (Honours), Major in Biology, Cooperative Education Option by Senate and the Board of Governors.

School of Horticulture Chair Jamie Lamont attended the "Skilled Trades Showcase" event at Thomas Haney high school, and the Langley School District's "Pathway to The Future" event showcasing the Horticulture Apprenticeship Skilled Trades programs. The goal of both events was to build students and parents knowledge of trades and career program opportunities. Jamie shared KPU's School of Horticulture connection to both school districts programs as well as potential post secondary pathways.

On Feb. 15, Sustainable Agriculture hosted a KPU Farm tour with ENTR 1200 (Introduction to Entrepreneurship) class. Faculty and staff toured the class to teach them about both sustainable farming and what it takes to run a small-scale farming business.

New part-time options for completing the Brewing and Brewery Operations diploma were created and will be offered for students entering the Fall 2024 term. The new options will allow students to complete the program in three or four years versus two years full time, offering greater flexibility.

The Brewing Program Advisory Committee met on Feb. 13 and voted in a new chair, Brad McQuhae, co-founder, Konig Brewing Systems.

Six of Brewing first-year students received funding via SRIG to do a project on non-alcoholic beer production. The brewing for this project started on Feb. 28.

Nine students from our programs were awarded SRIGS in November and December: 5 HSCI and 4 BIOL.

There are eleven Health Science and Biology students registered in our senior research courses this semester and look forward to inviting the KPU community to attend their capstone presentations in April 2024.



John Shepherd: ND Rotary Club Contributions

John Shepherd, faculty, is the Grants Chair for the North Delta Rotary Club, which continues to experience rapid growth in demand for its Starfish Pack food supplement program. The Starfish Pack program targets food insecure children enrolled in 14 Delta public elementary schools. Volunteers deliver 246 food hampers to the schools for children to bring home their families, roughly 1-1/4 tons of food in a week. The annual program costs are an estimated \$140,000. The surge in demand, up nearly two-thirds from June 2023 shocked the club.

Vancouver Sun's Adopt a School recently approved a \$15,000 grant to the North Delta Starfish Pack Program. The Community Gaming Grant Program (BC Gaming) approved \$40,100 to the North Delta Rotary Club. Since November, successful applications have been \$15,000 from Adopt a School, \$50,100 from BC Community Gaming Grant Program, \$2,500 from Mazon Canada, and \$4,000 from the Delta Community Foundation.

Joanne Marlow: Book Publication

Joanne Marlow (faculty) published her 10th book in November "How to Find Your Ideal Job in a New Country...A Detailed Guide for International Students." The book was declared a "best seller" on Amazon.com in December. Joanne has been collecting, researching and writing curricu-

lum on this topic for over a decade, and after teaching international students for over six years, she realized that this group needed to hear the reality of leaving their countries to come to North America for their education with the potential of finding a job that excites them and uses their new skills and strengths. Joanne interviewed over 500 international students, new arrivals and HR managers to gain more information on their concerns, needs, and expectations and covered their thoughts and possible solutions in the book.

Melissa Ashman: Faculty and Student Perceptions of Open Pedagogy

Melissa Ashman has published an article about faculty and student perceptions of open pedagogy in the OTESSA (Open/Technology in Education, Society, and Scholarship Association) Journal. A unique aspect of the study was that it assessed the perceptions of open pedagogy of faculty and students across several courses and a range of types of open pedagogy, all within the context of one Canadian post-secondary institution (KPU). The study results indicated students and faculty had positive perceptions of open pedagogy, though they did experience some challenges.

THE OFFICE OF RESEARCH SERVICES

CITI Program Training Test Rollout for KPU Community

ORS is pleased to provide an update on the recent rollout of CITI Program training for the KPU community for selected fac-

ulty and their research teams. This initiative is currently in its testing phase, designed to gather feedback and testimonials before potential expansion across the university. These courses cater to researchers involved in various fields, including social & behavioural, applied and clinical research. The program represents a significant step toward fostering a research integrity, ethics, and compliance culture. The training encompasses a variety of courses, each designed to provide valuable insights and knowledge in different aspects of research ethics and compliance. The following CITI Program courses are offered.

Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR): This course equips researchers with knowledge and skills to navigate ethical issues in research, covering topics such as research integrity, data management, authorship, and conflicts of interest. It provides best practices for doing research for our faculty and research staff. It differs significantly from TCPS and broadly addresses best practices in research not limited to human ethics only.

Social and Behavioral Ethics: This course covers informed consent, privacy, confidentiality, and the handling of sensitive data. It is particularly valuable for researchers working with human subjects.

<u>Transportation of Dangerous Goods/ International Air</u>
<u>Transport Association (TDG/IATA)</u>: Essential for research involving hazardous materials transportation, this course ensures compliance with regulations, safeguarding community well-being and environmental standards.

These courses have been generously sponsored through Health Research BC and have been aligned with Canadian regulations and policies by the Network of Networks (N2) Canada. We are dedicated to continuously improving the training experience and plan to offer workshops attached to the first two courses to include scenarios relevant to social, behavioural and applied research. Moreover, we also offer a comprehensive clinical research course package as a commitment to promoting high-quality clinical research within our university community.

Supporting ENTA: KPU Speaker Series: Don't Push My Buttons

ORS supported ENTA's KPU Speaker Series with information on SRIG Grants and their benefits for enrolled and prospective students. The event took place on November 15, 2023. Pamphlets and posters illustrate the relevance of the SRIG grant to ENTA's needs, aligning with our ongoing commitment to pro-

ACC Membership Updates

As of November 1, 2023, Heather O'Brien from the Farrier Science Program has joined the ACC, replacing Gerard Laverty, who has now retired from KPU.

The Canadian Council on Animal Care's First Assessment Visit at KPU

The <u>Canadian Council on Animal Care</u> (CCAC) performed their first assessment visit at KPU on November 29th and 30th, 2023. This visit marked a significant milestone in KPU's pursuit of attaining Good Animal Practice (GAP) Certification from the CCAC, which will demonstrate that KPU participates fully in the CCAC programs and adheres to its internationally recognized

standards of animal care and use in research and teaching, a requirement of the Tri-Agency Framework: Responsible Conduct of Research and the Agreement on the Administration of Agency Grants and Awards by Research Institutions. The next step in the <u>GAP Certification process</u> is for the CCAC to provide a formal report outlining their recommendations. We will then have six months to respond with our own report outlining what actions we are taking to address these recommendations. The ACC, chaired by Dr. Layne Myhre, hopes to achieve GAP Certification by the end of 2024.

KPU'S RESEARCH LABORATORIES, CENTRES, AND INSTITUTES

Applied Genomics Centre – Funding Advancement

On July 17, 2023, Dr. Paul Adams, the Director of the Applied Genomics Centre (AGC), was awarded a \$278,000 grant from the BC Salmon Restoration and Innovation Fund (BCSRIF), Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO). This funding will allow the AGC to work with the Abbotsford Animal Health Centre on developing molecular tests specific to Aeromonas salmonicida — a pathogenic bacterium that severely impacts salmonid populations and other fish species. This work will include performing whole genome sequencing (WGS) for several Aeromonas species, including A. salmonicida.

The public announcement included the BCSRIF funding received by KPU's Applied Genomics Centre -- \$278,272 in support of a project that includes whole genome sequencing of Aeromonas salmonicida, a pathogenic bacterium that severely impacts salmonid population and other fish species. The Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia team up to protect salmon populations and the fisheries they support.

Applied Genomics Centre – Presentations/Community Activities

November 3, 2023 – Dr. Paul Adams gave a presentation at the KPU Agriculture Summit about how AGC is advancing ag-tech solutions.

December 1, 2023 – Dr. Paul Adams and Dr. Mathias Schuetz gave a presentation to the Board of Directors at Genome BC. December 14, 2023 - The Honourable Diane Lebouthillier, Minister of Fisheries, Oceans, and the Canadian Coast Guard, and the Honourable Nathan Cullen, BC Minister of Water, Land and Resource Stewardship, announced \$86,119,340 for 58 projects receiving funding under the second phase of the British Columbia Salmon Restoration and Innovation Fund (BCSRIF).

Dr. Abhinaya Venkatesan, AGC Molecular Geneticist, attended the press event at the Gulf of Georgia Cannery in Steveston, Richmond.

January 17, 2024 – Dr. Layne Myhre was invited to present details of the Kwiklwetlem First Nation water monitoring pilot project to the Coquitlam River Watershed Roundtable Core Committee at their quarterly meeting. The pilot project is a collaboration between Biology, Environmental Protection Technologies, the Applied Genomics Centre, and the Kwikwetlem First Nation, to assess water quality, toxicity, and bacterial eDNA in water samples from the Coquitlam watershed. Institute for Sustainable Food Systems – Funding Advancement

ISFS received the Climate Action Events Award from the Pacific Institute for Climate Solutions with \$5,000 in funding in October 2023. The awarded funding will support ISFS to coordinate a regional farmer dialogue in the Comox Valley to gather farmer priorities for building drought resilience capacity. The project lead is Naomi Robert.

ISFS received \$3,000 from Farmfolk Cityfolk to support Naomi Robert's research project aimed at the development of food policy and climate change platforms to inform provincial party platform development in the 2024 election.

Ministry of Agriculture and Food awarded \$120,000 to ISFS to complete the project entitled "Food Supply Chain Analysis to investigate resiliency of current BC food supply chain and recommendations to increase resiliency" on December 15, 2023.

Institute for Sustainable Horticulture - Mitacs funding

The Institute for Sustainable Horticulture received approval for a Mitacs grant (\$202,500) to support 21 Interns who will work on the Weston Home Grown Challenge project "Carbonneutral, pesticide-free glasshouse berry production for Canada" at KPU and SFU over the next year.

A second Mitacs grant related to the same project received approval with industry partner Argus Controls for 1 Intern employed for 15 months and valued at \$104,000.

Institute for Sustainable Horticulture - Staffing Updates

In January 2024, ISH welcomed Thaís Almeida, a Ph.D. student from the Laboratório de Controle Microbiano, Federal Rural University of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, to spend 6 months in our lab investigating insect immune responses to natural soilborne fungi that attack insects as well as their responses to some fungi that attack plant pathogens. Thaís is the recipient of an ELAP Scholarship.



Updated Research Help Page

In January, KPU Library launched our updated Research Help Page. Students are also able to use the page to book Research Appointments with KPU Librarians.

New Mahogany Chairs

Richmond Library has new mahogany chairs on display. The chairs are created from recycled vintage mahogany wood originally harvested in Nicaragua and Guatemala between 1950 and 1970. Their creation follows an initiative of urban mining – gathering discarded materials from construction and demotion sites and turning them into new products. The material used for these chairs was discarded by a local ship building company and then donated to and stored by the Museum of Vancouver. The materials were then passed along to be used by Wilson Product Design students. In early 2025, the chairs will be displayed at the Museum of Vancouver as part of *Take a Seat* (working title), an exhibition featuring the design and cultural history of chairs. Product Design Program Launches Clean Air Shelters Project

A design project for year 3 Product Design students, Clean Air Shelters" has students working in teams to learn about collaboration, working with external experts and focusing on meaningful issues / Sustainable Development Goals. This intensive 7 -week project presents an opportunity to reach out to local companies. This year - Instructor Sue Fairburn reached out to BC Wildfire Services to scope where the need was, to General Recycled (a local company working in the material circularity for Aramids) and to local Indoor Air Quality Company: BGE Clean Air for their knowledge in monitoring air quality. The team at BC Wildfire Services's Research and Innovation Team with Lead Natasha Broznitsky (R&I Senior Officer) presented remotely to the students on 16 Jan, followed by Roberta Mac-Gillivrary (CEO of BGE Clean Air) and their Technical Expert Randy Drage on 18 Jan, followed by Dave Kasper of General Recycled on 25 January. The students have been soaking up all the information provided by the experts and learning to develop the key insights that will inform their design direction. The project will wrap up with a final Exhibition of prototypes and team presentations during SDG week on 5th Mar 2024.

New Program Launched - Front-End Development for Interactive Applications

WSD's brand new Diploma in Front-End Development for Interactive Applications was officially approved and launched for fall recruitment in January. A collaboration with the Computer Sciences and Information Technology program in the Melville School of Business, the 2-year Diploma is part of a larger BC tech seat expansion. Students in Front-End Development will have opportunities to work on UX projects with Graphic Design for Marketing students — fusing together the design and coding sides. Faculty Awarded KPU 2024 Chancellor Chair Award

Victor's research aims to engage diverse community groups using a systems thinking and design thinking methodology developed over 14 years for complex social problem-solving, facilitating the understanding of root causes and the creation of systemic interventions. The goal is to develop actionable plans and strategies for communities to implement or share with all community members, including politicians, policymakers, and business leaders, to effect real change and empower communities.

High School Career Presentations



Strong Student Employment

The Career Development Centre shows 535 new students registered on KPU's student job board, *Career Connection*, along with 146 new employers. A remarkable 1,248 employment opportunities were posted, with students assisted through 84 career advising appointments and 265 resume reviews.

Co-operative education has seen 630 Fall and Spring job postings with 301 students admitted into Spring and Summer intakes. 2,321 student job applications were submitted across Fall and Spring terms, a 71% increase from the previous year.

Advising Workshops

The Central Advising team had a busy Fall with a 10% increase in appointments that totalled 2,279 while facilitating course planning workshops for over 100 students.

Getting Ready to Thrive

Student Health Promotion led the 8th Annual Thrive Month celebration back in the Fall. Over fifty on-campus events were hosted on all five campuses by various service areas, such as Student Services, Campus & Community Planning, and Human Resources. These events focused on positive well-being and social connection.

This success led to developing the Thrive Month working group comprising partners from across KPU. This enduring group is planning and strategizing not only for Thrive Month 2024 this October, but to ensure Thrive Month remains a sustainable initiative at KPU for years to come.

Transgender Awareness Week

Pride Peer Leaders celebrated Transgender Awareness Week at KPU Surrey with an engaging and interactive booth. Visitors learned about transgender history and how to be a supportive ally.

Student Mental Health Fair

Student Health Promotion hosted the 2nd Annual *Student* Mental Health Fair at the Surrey Conference Center. The event promoted student mental health through activities like info booths, therapy dogs, low-sensory spaces, painting, video games, and free fitness classes. More than 250 students were in attendance supported by numerous KPU services and community friends.

Cricket Comes to KPU

Sport and Recreation recently collaborated with the KSA and student-led Cricket Club to host an indoor cricket tournament with approximately 40 participants, marking a successful first foray into cricket at KPU. Also new this spring is an intramural table tennis league.

The action continued with the Faculty of Arts, which joined Sport and Recreation to host a dodgeball tournament that fielded 32 teams, and an always-popular 5v5 basketball

tournament!

Food, Focus and Harmony

During October, the Multi-Faith Centre (MFC) conducted a food drive at the Surrey and Richmond campuses as part of Thrive Month. The food collected was donated to the KSA's food hamper program to support KPU students experiencing food insecurity.

In November, the MFC chaplains participated in International Focus Week and hosted tabling sessions at Richmond and Surrey with the theme "One Table, Many Beliefs". Chaplains hosted a discussion around how culture, religion, and beliefs intersect through the act of sharing food and invited students to share their thoughts and cultural backgrounds over some light refreshments.

The Multi-Faith chaplains ensured KPU's continued engagement with the annual UN Interfaith Harmony Week. Chaplains hosted booths at Surrey and Richmond where they invited students to write their thoughts, quotes, ideas, and/or an influential figure that resonated with their notion of peace.

Welcoming New Students

Our flagship new-student orientation event, KPU Welcomes You, hosted 952 new students in Spring 2024 at four events across three campuses. This could not have been done without the help of more than 100 student leaders and, critically, more than 75 KPU employee supporters.



Following "orientation day," the First Year Festival was host to a series of events during the first week of classes and for the first time incorporated the Kwantlen Student Association's *Week of Welcome* nee Welcome Week alongside a KPU-led student resource fair.

Unmet Financial Need

As of November, 964 applications for KPU's full-time bursary program had been received, demonstrating a total need of close to \$2.5 million. SAFA disbursed \$864,200 in award funding to support 404 students in high financial need.

Safer Campuses Training Modules

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office is excited to announce that the <u>Safer Campuses for Everyone training modules</u> are not only live but are now digitally badged! Everyone who completes all four modules will receive a digital badge that demonstrates their commitment to being a member of a safe campus.

Anonymous Reporting Support

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office launched a new webpage in the fall alongside expanded functionality in the KPU SAFE app providing tools for anonymous sexual violence reporting. Messaging and content are being continually refined in consultation with the Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities to ensure a survivor-centred approach.

Our Domestic Recruitment team has had a very busy recruitment season attending recruitment fairs, high schools, and hosting some group tours on campus. Below are a few highlights:

This collaboration marks a significant milestone as it is the first in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region. The agreement facilitates academic advancement for CUD students and opens doors for future partnerships, including student and faculty exchange opportunities between the two institutions.

A new food security fund was also established for students experiencing food insecurity.

FACILITIES SERVICES

UNIVERSITY SPACE, DESIGN & CAPITAL PROJECTS

Entertainment Arts Program – Richmond Renovation: The 3rd-floor renovations are complete and ready for the Winter semester. The renovated 3rd floor includes five high-tech computerized classrooms, a new communication room, and a meeting room. A multipurpose room, gaming room, and a green screen room will be constructed before the end of the fiscal year.



Richmond Main Building – Employee Lounge 1900: The existing carpet and vinyl flooring at the employee lounge needed replacement to correlate with the refreshed furniture in this area.

Teaching and Learning Office Refresh – Surrey Campus, Arbutus Building, Room A2400-A2416: The office refresh was completed on time at the end of January 2024. The 195m² Office was transformed from a disjointed collection of reused furnishings to a cohesive design with an open-concept floor plan. The Teaching and Learning department embraced an Activity-Based Work (ABW) environment with six benching stations, a standing-height community table, comfortable break-out seating, a focus room with four stations, a small meeting room, a private office for two and a comfortable breakroom.

Faculty of Arts Office Refresh – Surrey Campus, Arbutus Building, Room A2110: The office refresh was completed on time at the end of January 2024. This 160m² dated office underwent a significant furniture upgrade, better utilizing space, increasing efficiencies. Increasing storage and workstations was a primary

goal for the project. The newly designed layout has increased from 9 to 13 workstations and added storage throughout.

IT Office Refresh – Surrey Campus, Arbutus Building, Room A358: As the storage demand increased for KPU's IT department, the Facilities Design team responded by removing under -utilized workstations and decluttering the office. New storage racking and a large workbench were installed to alleviate their storage needs. Completing this refresh meant IT wouldn't have to pay \$100/month for off-site equipment storage.

Small Meeting Room Refresh – Surrey Campus: New carpeting, paint, roller blinds, lighting, and furnishings were added to four of Surrey Campus's small meeting rooms. The objective was to match the aesthetic of the recently refreshed Cedar Boardroom.

Cedar Boardroom – Surrey Campus: New tables have been installed in the Cedar Boardroom to address the mobility and modesty concerns from the table installed last year. The Global tables have larger casters, allowing for greater mobility, and a full-length modesty panel providing maximum privacy.

Roller Blinds Update – Langley Campus, East and West Building: Replaced old roller shades in the East and West building with our new standard roller shades.

Cloverdale Dean's Suite – Student Services: A new desk, partitions and task chair were purchased, and the front counter was reconfigured to meet the ergonomic needs of staff members to help reduce the risk of inquiry in the future.

The Assessment and Testing Centre – Tek Pods: Pods work together to create a diverse range of small-scale private environments within the open office. These Tek Pods were installed in 118 FIR to provide access testing services for students with accessibility requirements.



MAINTENANCE & OPERATIONS

Rick Hansen Accessibility Certification (RHFAC): Facilities Services partnered with RHFAC professionals to conduct an audit of all KPU Campus buildings, providing us with a rating for each building and, an RHFAC Rating Summary and a detailed Accessibility Gap Analysis Report, which allows us to see where improvements are needed. To date, with each audit that has been completed, we received an Accessibility Certification Rating, and they are: Brew Instructional Lab, Langley Campus & Header House. We are working to have the rest of the buildings (Tech, Richmond and Civic Plaza) rated by mid-March. As each building is certified, we will order an RHFAC plaque to place in the building.

Richmond Campus South Plaza: Work has begun on the Richmond Plaza renovation. This project will replace the end-of-life membrane that protects the parking lot level below, upgrade lighting and railings, and expand the concrete decking. Projected completion: July 2024







Richmond Melville Conference Room Door Replacement: The KPU Richmond Melville conference doors were replaced. High-quality electric panic hardware and automated door sensors have been installed to increase accessibility for students and staff. The new door systems also include wave sensors to provide a touchless exit option for users.



Surrey Campus Cedar Conference Centre: A complete refresh was done in the Conference Centre during the holiday closure, with paint, new wallcoverings, and carpet tiles installation.



KPU Tech Welding Shop: Extensive cleaning was completed to remove particulates from the equipment and air handling systems.





Snow Response: FSG's supported snow removal activities across the campuses, attending the site as early as 5:00 a.m. to clear snow and ensure the grounds were safe for the KPU community.



ANCILLARY SERVICES

Food Services

Retail Food Services Procurement: The procurement process has resulted in a preferred proponent, and contract negotiations are currently underway.

KPU Bookstores

KPU Bookstore's "Win a Coca-Cola Bike" Contest: The contest concluded, and we provided valuable metrics to Marketing for future promotions and social marketing.

KPU Bookstore POS System: The KPU Bookstore also completed migrating its POS system to the cloud, which reduces transactional processing time, allows quicker troubleshooting, and eliminates the need for POS servers on each campus. Moneris pin pads were also upgraded to ensure continued PCI compli-

ance.

Surrey Campus Bookstore: We have signed an agreement with a local Katzie First Nation artist, Rain Pierre, to develop Indigenous design elements for the Surrey Bookstore.

Rebranding Bookstores: We've begun work to re-brand the Bookstore to become the KPU Campus Store. This is a more accurate reflection of the products and services that we provide

Parking

Tech Campus Parking: With the loss of 25 parking stalls along 55th Avenue due to the hospital construction, KPU Tech parking is often at capacity. Working with a consultant and Facilities, Ancillary Services is looking into options to temporarily expand parking.

Richmond Campus Reserved Parking Signage: Additional reserved-only signage has been installed in the underground parking lot at the Richmond campus to help clearly define the reserved parking stalls.

Print Shop, Mailroom & Receiving

Semester Startup Activities: Course materials and course manuals were produced on target for Faculty for Spring Semester startup. A new Exam Booklet cover was updated and put into production after being reviewed by the Office of Equity & Inclusive Communities. These Exam Booklets are produced at the Print Shop and distributed for Faculty use through the Copy Centres on each Campus.

IT INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES

Entertainment Arts Program

All 11 classrooms in the ENTA project are complete. The 6 classrooms on the 2nd floor are currently being used by the ENTA program, with all required Audiovisual (AV), networking, PC's and monitors with arms installed. The 5 classrooms on the 3rd floor are ready for ENTA use with required AV and networking in place. PC's and monitors and arms will be installed once ENTA is ready to use these classrooms. The display wall is complete (the vendor is scheduled to install a replacement cracked screen in mid Feb). Procurement of AV equipment for the Multipurpose is currently in progress.

Tenant Merger Project

Testing of Information Barriers v2 is currently in progress and implementation is scheduled during the reading break period.

Non-Banner Cloud Project

Agreements for Amazon Web Services (AWS), VMWare on

Cloud (VMC) and Palo Alto have been finalized. The design of KPU's cloud architecture was completed in January. The landing zone and control tower have been setup in AWS. The setup of Firewalls and VMC environment are currently in progress. The first migrations with assistance of the AWS Proserve team will begin mid-February right through to the end of March.

IT APPLICATION SERVICES

BANNER Initiatives:

Banner Tax processing (T4/T2202)

Several significant changes by Canada Revenue Agency were applied to the BANNER system. The IT, Payroll, OREG and Finance teams are working to get this deployed by Feb 28, 2024 deadline.

Curriculum Information Management System (Program phase) Project

This project is in its final stages with a targeted go-live in June 2024.

Ellucian Experience Portal

The Experience team continues its work on a new student portal to replace the out-of-date Online Self Service(OSS) portal product to leverage current web technologies including a new mobile application for student and employee services targeted for the Summer of 2024.

Ellucian CRM Advise

The Ellucian Customer Relationship Management (CRM) Advise project goal is to implement a new advising solution for KPU.

The project team is in the configuration phase with Ellucian, with the move to testing and training starting in April. A soft go -live for staff advising is targeted for June 2024.

Other Projects:

Bookstore POS Cloud Migration

The Bookstore Point of Sale cloud migration project completed in December 2023. The final phase will be to move the main Bookstore server to the cloud later this fall in 2024.

KPU Website Migration to Cloud

The Marketing team's project to move the KPU.CA website to the cloud was completed in December 2023. This now ensures that the website has a higher rate of availability and is independent of the KPU technology infrastructure.

INFORMATION SECURITY SERVICES

Student Multifactor Authentication (MFA) Expansion

Phase one is now complete with all active Melville School of Business students using MFA. Additionally, students throughout all other programs are given the option to self-enroll. To date, a total of 3582 students are using MFA. The next phase of this project will be targeting students in the Faculty of Arts.

Cyber Incident Response Training

KPU Executives were provided a Cybersecurity Tabletop Exercise facilitated by MNP to help the University prepare for a cyber incident. The resulting post-exercise report acknowledged areas of strengths, and a summary of recommendations for KPU to continue maturing its incident response capabilities.

Additional KPU Executive incident response training is planned for later this year along with a workshop to help develop a decision tree for dealing with ransomware incidents.

National Cyber Security Assessment

IT has completed and submitted the annual National Cybersecurity Assessment that enables research and education organizations to annually receive comprehensive assessments of their cybersecurity capabilities. The assessment report will be ready for review and actioning in February 2024.

Student Housing

In January, CCP hosted in-person engagement pop-ups across KPU campuses to inform the development of KPU's first Student Housing Strategy. The strategy will help guide the development of student housing at KPU over the long term, as well

as help shape the business case for KPU's first student housing facility at the Surrey campus. A detailed draft Student Housing Strategy will be available in the spring for University Executive's review and subsequently further community input.

CCP and Procurement Services are in the process of hiring the consultant team who will work with CCP to develop the KPU Surrey student housing business case, which will be submitted to the Provincial Treasury Board for funding approval later this year, following review by KPU's University Executive and Board of Governors.

Surrey Childcare and ECE Facility

CCP has submitted a rezoning application to the City of Surrey for the future KPU Surrey Childcare Facility. The team has now procured professional project management services to help facilitate the design and construction of the building and the project is now starting the design development stage of the process.

Office of Sustainability and the Sustainability Hub

CCP's Office of Sustainability is working collaboratively with members of faculty to establish a KPU Sustainability Hub (the "Hub"), a space where members of the campus community, including faculty, staff, and students, come together to collectively advance sustainable performance at KPU through dialogue, advocacy, and action. The Hub had its "kick-off" meeting on November 15th, 2023. Since then, two "Sub-Hubs" (project-specific working groups) have been created: one to develop a draft institution-wide definition of sustainability for KPU; while the other has been informing the framework for KPU's first Annual Sustainability Report which will be launched later this year.

Launch of the Annual Sustainability Survey

CCP worked with the Office of Planning and Accountability to develop KPU's first Annual Sustainability Survey, which is currently launched for participation from KPU's employees and students. The survey will remain open until the end of February for employees, and until early March for students. This survey will help guide the University's sustainability commitments, including future projects and initiatives, and strategic transportation decision-making. Aggregate results of this survey will be reported publicly through KPU's website and as a part of KPU's Sustainability, Tracking, Assessment, and Rating System (STARS) submission later this year, as well as in KPU's first Annual Sustainability Report. These results will also inform

future sustainability-related outreach materials.

Transportation Demand Management Strategy

In January, CCP hosted in-person engagement pop-ups across KPU campuses to inform the drafting of KPU's first Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Strategy, which is currently underway. The TDM Strategy aims to shape how students, faculty, and staff travel to and from campus by managing travel demand, with a focus on reducing drive-alone (single-occupancy vehicle) trips. The objectives of this strategy are to shift travel patterns towards sustainable transportation modes, reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with campus community travel, reduce demand for vehicle parking on campus, and inform opportunities for redeveloping existing parking lots. A draft TDM Strategy will be presented to the campus community in March after the University Executive's review.

CCP New Staff

CCP has recently hired a new Divisional Business Manager, Zarine Mistry. Zarine brings to KPU over a decade of senior administrative experience from Douglas College. Zarine holds a Bachelor's degree in Advertising and Visual Communications and is currently pursuing a Master's degree in Professional Communications. CCP has also hired a Student Assistant who will support a number of pending projects, including future student engagement on KPU's student housing efforts throughout 2024.

MARKETING, COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND MAJOR EVENTS

Faculty Campaigns

Campaigns to support our seven faculties were all launched in the fall with creative assets to support their priority programs and messaging. The Faculty of Academic & Career Preparation, Faculty of Arts, Faculty of Science, Faculty of Trades and Technology and the Wilson School of Design have primarily utilized a digital advertising strategy this year.

The Melville School of Business is continuing its high exposure campaign with digital advertising as well as out-of-home advertising options including transit shelter ads and a large 68 ft wall mural at the Granville Skytrain station, which expands our reach of over 1.1 million impressions per month.



To support the various campaigns, we also promoted KPU through industry specific magazines and newsletters including the BC School Counsellor's Association, City of Surrey Recreation Guides, CPHR BC & Yukon – People Talk Magazine, BC Business and Business in Vancouver.

We supported the launch of two new programs: Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security and Diploma in Front-End Development. Digital ads were created to promote the new programs as well as a magazine article in Business in Vancouver.

Sponsored Content Stories

We ran two articles on the Daily Hive Vancouver that promoted the <u>Bachelor of Psychiatric Nursing program</u> (December 2023) and the <u>Post-Baccalaureate programs</u> at KPU (January 2024). This platform reaches our target demographic with tens of thousands of readers.

KPU Brand Awareness

We are continuing our KPU brand campaign featuring our students in action. We are receiving a high number of impressions in all of our out-of-home advertising such as digital billboards, transit shelter ads and full wrap busses which reach millions of people per month. Ads are running on four outdoor LED screens at Hwy 99 (Massey Tunnel; North and South bound), Hwy 91 (Alex Fraser Bridge) and Hwy 17 (Tsawwassen Springs) which allows us over 100,000 impressions per month.

In addition, we created a variety of ads to support external affairs initiatives and partnerships including Dress for Success, Delta Chamber of Commerce, Surrey Eagles, Surrey Now Leader, SBOT Business Excellence Awards, Shakti Film Festival and the Surrey Now Leader Community Leader Award.

Social Media

We continue to see an increase in engagements and post link clicks across all our main social media platforms. Facebook – up 33% and 350%, Twitter – up 176% and 628% and LinkedIn – up 32% and 66%.

Event Support

The Marketing Services Department supported various highprofile events with designing marketing materials and promotion including (Re)Imagining the Indian Ocean World: A Symposium on Literature and Culture, New Moon Gala and the KPU Speaker Series at Science World. In addition, we supported the Mindful Campus Initiative within the Wilson School of Design by creating various materials, banners and swag.

Web Infrastructure

The KPU Web Team completed a major web infrastructure project moving the kpu.ca website from local servers to AWS (Cloud Hosting). This was a year-long project that involved a major upgrade to the version of our content management system, Drupal, and other areas of the website to enhance security and web performance. The team worked closely with the IT team to ensure there was little disruption of services to the internal KPU community.

Website

The KPU Website received over 4.3 million page-views during this period and saw a total of 883,000 unique visitors. The top cities web visitors were visiting from were Surrey, Vancouver, Burnaby, Richmond, Abbotsford and Langley. And over 55% accessed our website from a mobile device.

We generated 6,907 leads on the website from digital ads. Leads from marketing campaigns are a point of funnel entries for prospective students. Form submissions from the website lead the prospects to the Future Students office where the data is collected, recruiters reach out to provide more information and we send follow-up emails to keep them engaged with KPU.

Digital Advertising

Our Digital ads resulted in over 31 million impressions and 142,000 clicks through to our website.

We continue to see high performance with TikTok advertising to our domestic target audiences with over 15 million impressions and over 300,000 engagements on the platform.

Our Connected TV Ads (Digital TV programming and targeting) had over 2 million impressions on many digital channels (news stations and popular digital programming).

We launched campaigns for our two new programs in a short period of time and the results are very promising. The digital ads for Diploma in Front End Development for Interactive Applications and Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security resulted in over 20 leads generated for the Future Students office in the first month of running ads.
