








Report to the Board of Governors

November 2024



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Office of the President and Vice Chancellor

Since the last Board meeting in June, we wrapped up a successful summer semester, and in September we began another academic and governance year. What a difference a year makes. We have been beset this year by sudden and confusing policy changes by the federal government regarding international students, and so we have been working hard to stabilize enrollments and thus the financial outlook for the university.

We believe we will be close the approved budget for this fiscal year (including some new, mid-year allocations) and we are already looking at scenarios for 2025/26. This will be a major topic of discussion at all levels of governance for this academic year.

Meanwhile I was fortunate to attend <u>The Learner Conference</u> in Utrecht in July, with outstanding sessions on the impact of generative AI on teaching and learning. Then on to Rome where I met with staff at the Canadian Embassy and was able to visit one of the polytechnic institutions that form a network across Italy, and where there are some interesting possibilities for partnerships.

The KPU Board orientation was held on August 28 and we have some tremendous newly appointed and elected members joining us.

In early September I joined a small group to visit several cities in China, visiting the Beijing Institute of Fashion Technology, the Beijing University of Chinese Medicine, and attending and presenting at the Can Achieve conference in Hangzhou. All this as part of our renewal of activity in China to recruit students and to build pathways and partnerships in key programs, working with our tremendous field representative Jenny Luo.

We were also able to meet with the Canadian Ambassador to China and her staff, and with the incoming Consul to Vancouver, Mr. Zhixue Dong. Some pictures of the trip are seen below.

On September 19 I was pleased to join in the KPU <u>Sustainability Hub</u> celebration. KPU has come a long way in its programming, operations and research in sustainability, and we are well positioned to do more. On September 20 I helped to launch the Office of Advancement's annual <u>Family Campaign</u>.

This period has been dominated by more regulations from IRCC regarding international education, and the impact of those on KPU's enrollment planning and finance. I have briefed Senate and the University community on potential implications, and updates will be going out regularly. Town halls are planned for this month and each month thereafter as the situation unfolds.

I held town halls on the phase one of the proposed AC 16, academic title policy on October 24 and 25, and on the 24 I attended a very good workshop by Cherly Foy from Strategic Governance Consulting Services.

The Ridge-Meadows steering committee continues its work on developing a feasibility study for provision of higher education opportunities in that region. We met on September 26 and October 18.

BCAIU held a day on strategic planning on October 1, and I attended the Ontario College Quality Assurance management board meeting on October 3.

Led by Dean Howes and Heba Elsonbaty, President's Circle held its monthly meeting on October 16, exploring ideas based on the VUCA model of understanding and addressing significant change, based on the <u>Sharon Stein article</u> on such changes in higher education.

I was fortunate in October to also attend the Australian International Education Conference, where there were many sessions on trans-national education in its many forms and which KPU needs to explore. I was also able to meet with one of our key partners in Australia, the Royal Melbourne Institute of Australia.

Polytechnics Canada held its annual national Strategy Group on October 30 and 31 in Ottawa where we connected with senior government officials and brought along partners from Industry. Dave Kasper, VP Sales and Product Development, General Recycled, who has advised and worked with the Winson School of Design over the years, was able to attend with me.

On November 6 to 17 I attended, along with Dr Brett Favaro a "mission" of several invited Canadian universities to Kazakhstan, where the country is interested in working with international universities to building capacity in their emerging higher education system, especially in currently underserved regions. Based on this visit we will look closely at any possible further involvement.

November 20 and 21 saw the visit of Dr. Maria Stark, Professor in the Faculty of Environment, and Canada Research Chair in Ecosystem and Climate at the University of Waterloo. She met with faculty and students at KPU and addressed the university and public at a President's Dialogue event. She also gave a presentation to the Canadian Universities Women's Club and the Peatland Protection Society, whose president is KPU honorary degree recipient Eliza Olson.

November 21 saw the regular Board meeting of the British Columbia Association of Institutes and Universities.

Office of Communications

In May 2024, the Office of Communications welcomed Madison McKenzie into a new role for the Communications team: Digital Communications Specialist. This position is responsible for the creation of informative news videos about KPU and providing media with digital assets such as b-roll video — allowing broadcast media to report on important events even if they're unable to attend. CTV News' report on the new bachelor's degree program in Traditional Chinese Medicine relied on such KPU video coverage, which resulted in a story with a potential audience reach of 15.9 million.

The Digital Communication Specialist role has extended KPU's storytelling reach, allowing for the creation of new engaging digital media content – primarily videos – that greatly increased views and engagement on all external and internal online platforms available to the Communications team. On the KPU LinkedIn channel from June through August 2024, video content doubled the impressions, tripled the views, and quadrupled engagement metrics compared to the same period last year.


During this May 1 to September 30, 2024, reporting period, the Office of Communications also welcomed Simran Mann as a replacement Media Specialist. The media team frequently engaged with news media proactively — pitching and sharing stories that resulted in coverage, such as a Global News feature on the Applied Genomics Centre that reached a potential audience of 9.1 million viewers. Our promotion of a Wilson School of Design project concerning tents for wildfire firefighters resulted in numerous media mentions and accommodating a request for KPU students to participate in a live, in-studio interview on the Global News Morning show.

Our team also regularly responded to requests from news media on a range of topics, such as international student enrolment, allowing for a fair and accurate portrayal of the university. We also continued to put our faculty experts forward to media, as was the case during a rail labour dispute, when we were able to arrange media interviews for a Melville School of Business instructor, resulting in a potential audience reach of 38.1 million. In total, more than 140 media outlets, including the Toronto Star and Global News, drew on perspectives of KPU instructors through media interviews.

From May 1 to September 30, 2024, the Office of Communications helped KPU gain 2,009 media mentions with a potential audience reach of 2.54 billion (source: Meltwater). Of those mentions, 1,797 were positive and 212 were neutral. In addition, Office of Communications stories and news releases attracted 340,000 impressions on the KPU LinkedIn and the KPU News X (formerly Twitter) accounts combined.

The office relaunched the employee newsletter on September 24 in a new digital format. The newsletter, which uses a magazine reporting style, is focused on engaging employees and creating a sense of community by highlighting faculty and staff achievements, the work of faculties and departments, and more. By Oct. 4, the newsletter had received 439 views from employees, with more promotion set to go out through October. The office is aiming to distribute the newsletter every other month, with the second issue planned for mid-November.

Twenty-six internal community news stories were published to the employee portal intranet platform. Video content has been integrated into the SharePoint employee portal and the Today@KPU email system as both standalone content and as an enhancement to written stories. Between June and the end of August 2024, there was a combined five per cent increase in Today@KPU viewership compared to the same period in 2023 and a combined 26 per cent increase in viewership of stories published to the Employee Portal.

AVP, Indigenous Leadership

The office supported leadership with communications on key topics, such as the university budget, overdose prevention and the international student cap. We provided research (sector scan, audience, keyword, etc.) and writing support to enhance or create webpages for intimate partner violence, substance abuse, the Bachelor of Traditional Chinese Medicine, the Faculty of Health, the Nursing department and the Biology program. Work on the Office of the President pages was completed. The team also wrote and edited stories for KPU International, KPU Brewing and others.

On September 12, KPU proudly raised the Reconciliation Flag to celebrate the resilience of Indigenous communities, in anticipation of the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on September 30. This significant day honors the children who were lost to residential schools and supports the survivors and their families.

As we embark on the second year of the xé?el+ Pathway to Systemic Transformation, KPU reaffirms its commitment to reconciliation, emphasizing the vital role of education and dialogue in fostering healing between Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities.

In a further step towards honoring our Indigenous heritage, the Surrey Main building has been renamed the Maple building, aligning with our campus's theme of native trees. To commemorate this change, a vine maple will be planted nearby, symbolizing our connection to the land and its rich history. Notably, the word "maple" translates to həṅḍəminəm, the language of the local First Nations, reinforcing our commitment to cultural recognition and respect.

Policy and Academic Affairs Team

Graduate Studies

The Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS), along with Policy AC5 Graduate Degree Studies, became effective as of September 1, 2024. As the FGS comes into operation, two websites of the FGS, the external-facing homepage at <u>www.kpu.ca/graduate-</u> <u>studies</u> and an internal SharePoint site at

<u>kpuemp.sharepoint.com/sites/fgs</u> are now live. The Policy and Academic Affairs (PAA) team will continue to develop the content on both sites.

Since June 2024, PAA conducted a post-secondary institutional sector scan and research on relevant regulations and policies in support of graduate studies. PAA is currently consulting with the Office of the Registrar on a number of graduate studies general regulations to support future graduate studies at KPU.

A set of bylaws is required for the creation of a governance structure (Graduate Studies Council, or "GSC") in the FGS at KPU. The bylaws will allow the GSC to govern its activities, to act upon matters relating to graduate studies at KPU, to consider matters of academic standards and policy that concern the governance and responsibilities of the FGS, to revise and expand its bylaws, and to establish relevant standing committees where appropriate.

The draft GSC bylaws will be forwarded to Senate Governance and Nominating Committee on October 15, 2024, for consideration and recommendation to Senate for approval. The GSC will be created in early fall 2024 once Senate approves its proposed Bylaws. The draft regulations will then be sent to the GSC for consideration and recommendation to Senate for subsequent approval. It is anticipated that the GSC will convene its first meeting in November 2024 once Senate approves the GSC bylaws at its October 21st meeting.

AC15 Micro-credentials, AC16 Academic Title Awards

The PAA team, in support of the President's and the Provost's offices, have consulted with Senate and a number of Senate Standing Committees in September to solicit ideas and feedback on the revision of AC15 and the development of AC16, which went through Phase One Posting from September 3 to September 23. The team supported three AC16 university-wide virtual townhall sessions (September 20, September 24 and September 25) led by **Dr. Alan Davis** and **Dr. David Burns**. The sessions were well attended by staff, administrators and faculty. The team will continue to consult with the University community throughout the month of October to gather feedback and suggestions during the policy development and consultation process.

Policy Review in Academic Year 2024-2025

In late spring 2024, PAA consolidated progress reports and policy review requests for individual Policy Sponsors at KPU for the upcoming academic year 2024-2025. In late May 2024, the team reached out to the Policy Sponsors to initiate the 2024-2025 policy review process. An information note along with Policy Sponsor's status reports have also been sent to the Polytechnic University Executive in late August for their review and action. PAA will continue to support Policy Sponsors and Policy Developers in this work throughout the academic year. One of the ways we do so is through the newly launched policy review dashboard.

Using PowerBI, the PAA team has created a policy review dashboard at the PAA SharePoint site. The dashboard is an improved version of the annual policy review reports sent to Policy Sponsors, with real-time updates on statuses of policy reviews, including subsequent revision/elimination work after review, for every policy at KPU.

Updates to Enhance Accessibility on Policy Development at KPU

The PAA team has committed to creating a more personcentered and inclusive space for meaningful and effective service and resources for the KPU community. This goal is in close alignment with the Vision 2026 goals identified in Accessibility Plan 2023. The team has put together a draft project plan, completed consultations with and received support from **Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh** (Lead Advisor on Disability, Accessibility, and Inclusion) and the Office of Equity and Inclusive Committee (OEIC).

The project plan identified three broad, key actions: We will consider both visible and invisible barriers in designing our consultation process and provide multiple and more accessible means when soliciting feedback; we will revise our templates and resource documents on the website to better support accessibility. We will develop creative web content that includes accessibility features including but not limited to video, audio, infographics and content that aligns with Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG).

Curriculum Support Team

CourseLeaf

The CIM Programs software was launched during the summer and is now being used to draft all program development and revisions. This software manages approval workflows, houses a searchable database of all programs and is integrated with the software that supports the University Calendar and course outlines.

KPU Flex

KPU Flex will launch a webpage this fall for candidates who are not current students and are interested in learning more about recognition of prior learning. This webpage provides information about credit for prior learning and contact information for candidates to connect with the team to learn more. Information candidates provide on this site is integrated with the new customer relationship management system which is used by the Future Students Office and Academic Advising, so that contacts can be supported through all their communications with KPU. Following a successful pilot project with two programs in 2023/24, the Flex team is working with the Brewing and Brewery Operations Department and with the Melville School of Business to set up Rapid PLAR templates for candidates to submit their request and for faculty to use to record the assessments.

Generative AI

The faculty member drafting team for Generative AI has begun to meet on the creation of a set of offerings to be implemented in Fall 2025.

Micro-credentials

The Curricular Support team is ready to assist proponents or committees interested in learning more about Microcredentials and accessing the forms and workflows to create or revise the criteria on which these offerings may be granted to students. The open badges which represent the competencies defined in the micro-credential are portable, verifiable, and shareable by the student.

Academic Integrity Team

The Academic Integrity team has supported in-person and online classes with in-class presentations on academic integrity and Draft Coach during the summer and fall 2024 semesters. In addition to being part of the KPU Welcomes You orientation, student resource fairs, and First Year Festival, the team also participated in the Faculty of Health's kick off event amazing race on September 3rd.

October is Academic Integrity Month at KPU. This included events for students, staff, and faculty, including boothing at multiple campuses, collaborating with the Learning Centres, Library, and Teaching & Learning Commons for workshops, and a keynote on "Your Brain and AI: The intersections of Gen AI, Academic Integrity and Executive Function" presented by Dr. Brenda McDermott and Lorelei Anselmo from the University of Calgary. KPU was also 2024's proud host of the annual province-wide event BC Academic Integrity Day on October 28th at KPU Richmond, featuring Dr. Alana Abramson with a keynote on "Restorative Justice in Academic Integrity and Beyond," facilitated activities, and a student panel.

We have collaborated with the KPU Learning Centres on a pilot project to provide a training session to peer tutors on Draft Coach, so they can better understand the tool and feel more comfortable sharing this with the students they meet with. On September 4, the unit was also part of the International Peer Mentor Welcome at KPU Surrey, engaging with international students in a fun and interactive event.

Connecting with staff and faculty has also been a priority. The unit participated in the Arts Cookies and Coffee event on July 12, was part of Teaching & Learning's Establishing Your Teaching Practice Workshop for new faculty on August 27, presented at the Arts Annual General Meeting on August 28, had a table at the HR New Employee Orientation on September 11, participated in the Arts Academic Integrity Teach-In on September 26, and had a table at the Chairs Circle event on October 11. The unit is collaborating with the business and arts academic integrity committees and planning is also underway for the unit's involvement in KPU's Faculty Connect event in February 2025.

New resources that have been developed include the Intro to Policy ST2 Video, Possible Resolutions for an Academic Integrity Breach through the Informal Process, the Supports to Faculty to Promote Academic Integrity infographic developed with the Teaching & Learning Commons, and a Dos and Don'ts document on grade bartering for students developed in collaboration with the Student Rights and Responsibilities Office and International Advising.

Restorative Justice

The self-paced Restorative Approaches to Academic Integrity Breaches Moodle course was launched in Summer 2024, and a Lunch and Learn on Restorative Justice and Academic Integrity was presented by Dr. Alana Abramson on September 6. Dr. Alana Abramson continues to support faculty through consultations and a monthly Today@ Announcement on restorative justice.

Other

Susan Xia, the Interim Manager of Academic Integrity, participated in the European Network for Academic Integrity Summer School in Konstanz, Germany in September, learning about best practices and engaging in discussion with academic integrity leaders around the world.

Continuing Professional Studies Team

The Ministry approved KPU's application for funding of shortterm courses under the StrongerBC future skills grant program, with a total of 24 eligible courses within the period of September 2024 to February 2025. The <u>future skills grant page</u> is now live with the list of courses, eligibility criteria, and information on how to apply.

In the summer, the Wilson School of Design attracted 80 learners who registered in CPS courses such as Sewing Dresses, Working with Knits, Making Commercial Patterns Fit, and Sumoffering in October.

CPS Central spearheaded a strategic planning session with the CPS leads from the Faculties of Health, Trades, Science, Schools of Business, and Design. It provided a valuable opportunity to collectively assess CPS' current position, create a shared vision for the future, and identify key strategies that leverage its competitive advantages.

CPS Central has also established standards for development and instructor costs and developed a budget template to assist Faculty units with planning and forecasting.

Registration is now open for the Teaching Children to Read course, which will run from November 20 to December 18, 2024. This course is eligible for funding through the StrongerBC future skills grant.

Work Integrated Learning Team

Lead Advisor on Work Integrated Learning Dr. Larissa Petrillo

KPU is building a culture of sharing around their <u>Work-</u> <u>Integrated Learning</u> practices, with essential internal relationships, community building with external partners, and regular communication with counterparts at other institutions.

mer Design Foundation Academy. KPU International, in partnership with the Faculty of Academic and Career Preparation, ran a short-term English program for 30 Japanese students. They are also offering the same program this Fall to two cohorts of Mexican students sponsored by the Mexican government.

The increase in Work-Integrated Learning at KPU stems from university-wide support for the initiative. Through the Office of the Provost, the following resources and supports have been enabled during the 2023-24 fiscal year:

In July, CPS Central and HR launched the first Generative Artificial Intelligence course for KPU employees, with a second

Including All Citizens Team

Lead Advisor on Disability, Accessibility and Inclusion Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh

In addition to the work that supports Including All Citizens Pathway (IACP) and other initiatives, the Lead Advisor has had a busy start of term.

The Lead Advisor has been working in collaboration with **Kelsey Chaban**, interim Indigenous Library Liaison and **Joanne Skabar**, Indigenous Library Assistant, on piloting the library's braille printer for instructors use in class. The Lead Advisor has two students who read braille, and we have been piloting making sure all materials are printed and ready for weekly class.

The Lead Advisor and **Dr Jennifer Hardwick** received an Open Educational Resource (OER) grant to create educational resources for Critical Disability Pedagogy that forms the foundation for IACP. These resources include creating digital films with two students hired as Service-Learning Students. The finished resources will be uploaded as OER on the IACP website. The Social Research and Demonstration Corporation (SRDC) organized a workshop of experts from Skills Trade BC, Community Living BC, other service providers, Joel Murray, Associate Dean of the Faculty of Trades and Technology, and the Lead Advisor. The workshop was the conclusion of the Opening the Door to Trades project that explored how supported employment practices that include accommodations, modifications, and customized supports can be introduced into apprenticeships and the skilled trades in the province. The Lead Advisor introduced IACP as an exemplary pedagogical model that would advance and indeed 'open the doors to trades' and that KPU's Faculty of Trades and Technology would be the perfect post-secondary faculty to pilot such an initiative. This has been a goal for IACP since 2020. The attendees were very excited about the IACP model and having this important work starting at KPU. The Lead Advisor and Associate Dean Murray are organizing a meeting to start this important work.

The Lead Advisor has been invited to join the Reimaging Community Inclusion (RCI) Employment Committee that is advising the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction as an expert on inclusive post-secondary education.



In Fall 2024, a WordPress resource site will be developed, in consultation with Indigenous Studies. This site will include articles, books, websites and other resources to support <u>xé?elt</u> - <u>KPU Pathway to Systematic Transformation</u>, and in relation to decolonizing teaching (and other) practices at KPU.

The Learning Centre's goal is to ultimately launch these resources university-wide with the aid of the Teaching and Learning Commons.

Graduates of the BTCM program will have met the academic requirements for registration as a Traditional Chinese Medicine Practitioner (R.TCM.P) with the CCHPBC.

On Sept. 13, KPU Brewing participated in a collaboration brew



explored food systems, focusing on ecosystems, relationships, and pollinators. Finally, on June 24, the same class shared their paintings and poetry about pollinators with staff and enjoyed a

mini tasting tour of various flavors and crops. These activities aimed to enhance students' understanding of the environment and food systems while fostering creativity.

Kathy Dunster was invited to lead the public in a ceremonial tree planting at the Hastings Park Sanctuary (PNE) on August 19 celebrating the 25th anniversary since the creation of the wetland and habitat for species at risk near the headwaters of Renfrew Creek. The Sanctuary is part of collaborative plan to restore Renfrew Creek and salmon spawning habitat through the PNE grounds and re-connect to its restored estuary at New Brighton Park on Burrard Inlet.

From October 17–18, KPU Brewing sponsored a booth at the 2024 BC Craft Brewers Conference in New Westminster. Instructor Alek Egi (BREW) presented on "Pasteurization for Low



and Non-Alcohol Beer," while Dr. Mathias Schuetz (AGC/BIO) participated in a panel and workshop on the future of the BC hop industry with the BC Hop Growers Association. KPU's **Environmental Protection Technology** diploma program will pause admissions for September 2025 while it conducts a program review to ensure the courses remain relevant and effective. This review is expected to lead to revisions in the curriculum starting in September 2026.

Through his consulting practice, Environmental Protection Technology instructor, **Andrew Frank**, has recently advised the Chiefs Executive Council of the Okanagan Nation Alliance on a public awareness and communications strategy resulting in a joint statement between the Syilx Okanagan Nation and NDP leader David Eby on transborder consultation with US Tribes that recognizes the role of the Syilx Okanagan Nation as the representative of Sinixt people in Canada. On September 27, **CADD Technologies** welcomed a visit from Nucor Rebar, North America's largest rebar manufacturer. Andrew Frank: The Heiltsuk First Nation

Public Relations instructor, Andrew Frank, has partnered with and developed a comprehensive communication strategy for key Indigenous communities within British Columbia. Through his private practice, Andrew worked with the Heiltsuk First Nation and the Chiefs Executive Council of the Okanagan Nation Alliance and spearheaded multiple high-profile stories that broke in early October. One of these stories touch on the racial profiling of a BC father and daughter duo and another on an on ongoing trans-border dispute between Indigenous groups in the U.S. and Canada, among many others. This is particularly exciting for us as we consider Andrew's involvement in both of these cases as ideal illustrative case studies that will be incorporated into his PRLN courses. This is envisioned to afford students an opportunity to apply theoretical concepts to real-life situations that will provide a clearer understanding of how academic principles function in practical concepts.

Andrea Niosi: PRME

ENTR faculty Andrea Niosi delivered a one-hour workshop at the Sixth PRME Chapter North America Biennial Meeting, held in May/June 2024. Her presentation focused on an open pedagogy project she has been developing with her ENTR students since 2023. As part of her second-year elective course, Persuasion & Influence, students are creating an educational, openlicensed game and training kit, called 'Persuasion Quest', with the aim of transforming individuals into "active allies" in support of advancing the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). This innovative gaming solution from Niosi and her team of students was developed through a combination of generative-AI and extensive secondary research on preselected SDG in a localized context of their choosing with the intention to teach "Game Players" how to effectively build ally-ship through effective, targeted, persuasive techniques.

JoAnne Marlow: Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP)

JoAnne Marlow, an Advanced Communication Instructor was selected to speak at the ACBSP's annual conference in June. She spoke on the topic "Sustaining Employment—Aligning Students with their Ideal Employers." She also presented a similar topic at the UN Sustainability Event at KPU. As a result of the students following her guidelines and preparing professional cover letters, resumes, and excellent communication interviews, several of her students have found work to help sustain their health, well-being and motivation while at KPU.

Darren Francis: Excellence beyond the Classroom

Faculty member Dr. Darren Francis, as coach, and his son Hayden Francis (12) represented Team British Columbia at the U13 AAA National Baseball Championships from August 22nd to 26th in Woodstock, Ontario. Team British Columbia went undefeated and beat Ontario in extra-innings to win the first National Championship for British Columbia in over a decade.

Celebrating Jacob Dumansky's Achievement: From Local Talent to Team BC for the WHL Cup

Joanne MacNeil (Dean's Office Coordinator)'s 15-year-old son, Jacob Dumansky, has achieved a major milestone by earning a spot on Team BC for the WHL Cup. Jacob, a Yale Hockey Academy U18 player, was selected in the second round of the 2024 WHL Draft by the Kamloops Blazers and has signed a WHL Scholarship and Development agreement. His success follows years of dedication, including his participation in BC Hockey's Program of Excellence. Joanne's commitment, driving Jacob to practices and hosting another player, has been instrumental in his progress. We congratulate both Jacob and Joanne and wish Jacob the best as he competes in the WHL Cup.

Publications/Scholarly Activity

Melissa Ashman: Open/Technology in Education, Society, and Scholarship Association.

Applied Communications instructor Melissa Ashman authored a conference proceedings article titled "A Framework for Evaluating the Creation and Adaptation of Open Textbooks," published by the Open/Technology in Education, Society, and Scholarship Association. The article addresses the substantial increase in the use of open educational resources (OER), such as open textbooks, during the COVID-19 pandemic, which prompted a rapid shift to online learning across the globe. This transition underscored the critical need for robust frameworks to evaluate the creation and adaptation of open textbooks for virtual classroom.

Ashman's work synthesized the evaluation and quality criteria from 31 scholarly articles into a cohesive framework and produced a framework that offers online educators a structured approach to assess or develop open textbooks, with key categories including content, accessibility, technology, open licenses, and instructional design. Additionally, Ashman introduced a new category, **verification**, to ensure comprehensive quality standards are met. This framework provides valuable guidance to enhance the rigor and effectiveness of open textbooks in online education.

Mandeep Pannu: Indigenization and Decolonization funding

CSIT Instructor Mandeep Pannu has been awarded a one-time funding grant to support the Indigenization and decolonization of the Computer Science and Information Technology department. This significant funding, provided by the Office of the Associate Vice President, Indigenous Leadership, underscores KPU's commitment to the xé?el+ KPU Pathway to Systemic Transformation initiative. This initiative reflects a broader focus on reshaping mindsets and fostering a more inclusive culture across KPU.

Lindsay Wood: Indigenization, Decolonization and Reconciliation funding

Faculty member Lindsay Wood was awarded one-time funding through Student Support Services/Initiatives, Indigenous Guest Presenters, Partnership and Engagement. This is in support of the work her and Justin Molander are doing in Indigenization, Decolonization and Reconciliation within the Melville School of Business

John Shepherd: Public Library Quarterly

In response to a request from the editor of *Public Library Quarterly* for a journal article on optimizing the public's use of library resources, John Shepherd, an Accounting faculty, has partnered with librarians Allan Wilson and Kaitlyn Vecchio to undertake a research project. Their study focused on both onsite and offsite usage of the facilities, resources, and collections at public library branches. For this project, Shepherd and his team specifically concentrated their research on the Prince George and Richmond Public Libraries. The article was uploaded to the journal's website in October, for a peer review.

Surrey Board of Trade Workshop partnership

The Melville School of Business has partnered with Surrey Board of Trade to co-host a two-day workshop centered on *Leveraging AI for Small and Medium Business Growth*. This workshop is slated to hold between November 14 and 15 (moved from its original launch date of Sep 26-27). To address the unspoken concern about the displacement of human processes in favor of technology, this workshop was designed and targeted at employees and leaders in small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) who are ready to embrace AI for growth and innovation in order to earn a competitive advantage and drive efficiency in their businesses. MSB instructor Marcelo Machando was entrusted with developing the framework for this workshop, drawing upon his extensive experience and proven success in leading strategic initiatives across global industries.

APPLIED GENOMICS CENTRE



ISH welcomed Olivia Puszka, an upper-level horticulture student, to our staff in September to work part-time on a soil microbial health project. We were fortunate to receive 80% funding from YESP for this position.

PRESENTATIONS/COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Two members of ISH attended the Weston Family Foundation Home Grown Challenge networking event Oct 7-8 in Toronto, followed by attending the two-day Canadian Greenhouse Conference in Niagara Falls. Dr. D. Henderson presented an update on progress of the KPU Weston Foundation Home Grown Challenge team entitled "Carbon-neutral, pesticide-free glass house berry production for Canada", and Dr. Li presented a research poster at the Greenhouse conference entitled "Using UV-C light to control aphids in strawberry" L. Ma, A. Tamanaei, and D. Henderson.

FUNDING ADVANCEMENTS

 Dr. Li Ma has received NSERC ARD and Mitacs funding for a three-year research project in collaboration with Sollum Technologies Inc. with total funding of \$ 540,000 (\$360,000 from NSERC, \$180,000 from Mitacs, and an industry contribution of \$90,000). This project, running from August 1, 2024 to July 31, 2027, will be conducted in the ISH research greenhouse to determine the specific effects of different light wavelength combinations on the growth, yield, fruit quality, shelf life, disease (powdery mildew), two major pests (spider mites, aphids), and beneficial predators in greenhouse-grown strawberry. Additionally, the grant will support the training of highly qualified personnel involved in the research, including one postdoctoral research fellow, three Mitacs student interns, and one technician.

- Dr. Deborah Henderson received a contract for ISH with the BC Center for Agri-innovation (BCCAI) to work for 12 months with Terramera Inc. on a project entitled "Development of Biological Pest Control Solutions for Controlled Environment Agriculture" valued at \$155,925. The project will investigate the efficacy of two novel biological and plant extract biopesticides on four common greenhouse pests: aphids, whiteflies, spider mites and Thrips, with the goal of replacing pesticide use in food production with environmentally and non-toxic alternatives.
- Mohammad Ameri, Research Technician ISH, just completed a research project (\$59,000) with Cascadia Seaweed, funded by BCCAI and the industry partner, entitled "Biostimulation effects of kelp extract on germination, growth, yield, and quality of some greenhouse crops." This preliminary study of extracts of two kelp species has provided data for a larger study to follow.
- Deborah Henderson and ISH just received an industry contract with advanced AgriScience Inc. entitled "Frost protection biopesticides" to gather baseline data required to develop two actinomycete microbes as biological frost protectants for agricultural crops. This project, valued at \$45,000, will develop formulations, conduct shelf life studies, evaluate antibiotic susceptibility profiles, develop mass production SOPs, and evaluate the two technical grade biopesticide products for toxicity and efficacy. It will provide critical safety and preliminary data for two follow-up projects, already submitted to Genome BC and USDA. A fourth related proposal will be submitted with a partner at SFU for an NSERC Alliance grant.

PROGRESS OR COMPLETION OF INITIATIVES

• The ISH team is still involved with the Weston Family

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Foundation Home Grown Challenge project entitled "Carbon neutral, pesticide free, glasshouse berry production for Canada" (\$1M) with several industry partners and an SFU Mechatronics partner. New partners include: Neu-Peak Robotics Inc. (BC), Koppert Canada, Radical Clean Solutions (US), Let's Grow (Netherlands) and MPS (Netherlands), Wageningen University Greenhouse business unit (Netherlands). The proposal due early Feb. for the scale up phase of this project is in progress.

National Controlled Environment Agriculture (CEA) Research Network. With partners at Toronto Metropolitan University, Deborah and ISH have proposed a national CEA network of academics and industry to accelerate the development of agri-tech and biological advancements needed to best support this industry. Three other university partners have joined (U. Guelph, U. Windsor, U. Ottawa) along with several industry partners. KPU and TMU are coapplicants on a collaborative CFI Innovation proposal, NOI submitted Oct. 2 with a value of > \$8M in infrastructure.

OTHER UPDATES

The ROBA kindergarten established in the highlands of Ethiopia has started its second year of operation. It's first year was a huge success and the community has asked for an expansion. The funding has been by payroll giving thanks to the KPU Foundation, the Ethiopian diaspora in BC and Washington, and the Sfaira Foundation (Vancouver). The photo is of the children in front of the flag before entering the classroom. This is our second project with the NGO ROBA and it opens the door for further collaboration with this and two university partners in Ethiopia including opportunities for field schools and student internships.

This knowledge will bolster our advocacy for Indigenous ways of knowing as we develop teaching resources, deliver workshops, and consult with both internal and external key partners.

Content Updates for Indigenous Awareness Courses

- This initiative aims to incorporate multimedia to enhance the learning experience and engagement with Indigenous Awareness courses offered at KPU for both students and employees. Additionally, it seeks to complete four translated versions of the English course to increase the exposure of Indigenous awareness among speakers of other languages.

- 388 Moodle and 2,861 Kaltura accounts were successfully merged in order to ensure faculty teaching in Fall 2024 have access to development sites that were created before the recent login changes.

- <u>Storying Universal Design for Learning</u>, by Seanna Takacs; Lilach Marom; Alex Vanderveen; and Arley Cruthers McNeney - This resource compiles post-secondary student voices on accessible teaching practices and universal design for learning (UDL) components that have been integrated into their classes. Students reflect on meaningfulness and engagement, accommodation plans, course de-

sign, and instructor supportiveness. This guide offers suggestions for teaching to support instructors in building more accessible classrooms.





Figure 5 Artists Meher Breja (left) and Emma Campbell (right) and their artwork at Surrey campus library

The 2024 Design Educators conference put on by the Association of Registered Graphic Designers (RGD) explored the theme of Compassion, Creativity and Community. In attendance were WSD's Graphic Design for Marketing (GDMA) Faculty members Erin Ashenhurst and Marga Lopez, and Heather Clark from WSD's Fashion Design and Technology program. With diverse and engaging programming the team were particularly impressed by the keynote speaker, Ellen Lupton, who presented on how to teach more inclusive narratives in design history.

Design Thinkers Conference

Faculty Marga Lopez also attended RDG's Design Thinkers conference, a two-day event featuring established designers working in areas including UI/UX, illustration, branding, and typography, all discussing the creative process.

Carley Hodgkinson - Generative AI Course Development

Carley Hodgkinson, Graphic Design for Marketing Chair and faculty has a fall time release to develop a course that looks at design and generative AI. Carley is tailoring the course to be about design workflows and productivity – where can GAI provide a helpful assist along the way to a design solution? PROGRAM/POLICIES/INITIATIVES

Students In the Community

Our programs give true meaning to the immersive, polytechnic and community-based design education at KPU. GDMA (Graphic Design for Marketing) students received behind the scenes, industry-only tours of local businesses such as Porchlight Press, Met Printers and Mitchell Press. They also embarked on a field trip to the Polygon Gallery for a curatorial tour of the photography show Anti-Icon: Apokalypsis by artist Martine Gutierrez. Students related this work to themes in their second-year course on Popular Culture. In addition, students visited the Vancouver Art Gallery for Copy Machine Manifestos: Artists Who Make Zines, as well as Black and White and Everything In Between: A monochrome Journey and of course, the omnipresent works of Emily Carr. Third year Interior Design students visited the firm Area3 Design to gain insights into how their studio prepares for client presentations as well as a sneak peek into their design process.



The Interior Design program kicked off the semester with traditional Startup Week activities including "sketch camp" and a "vertical" studio where teams of students from all four years work together to propose a solution to a community-based project. This year, the program worked with the team at Vancouver Coastal Health's Banfield Pavilion for long-term senior care in asking our students to design solutions for their social / common areas. Several alumni served as mentors for the teams.



Programs Sign Partnership & Exchange Agreements with New Design University in Austria

We were thrilled to host Prof. Dr. Herbert Grüner, the Rector of New Design University, our respected partner institution in Austria. Dr. Grüner spent the week at KPU engaging in insightful discussions with students and faculty. The Student Exchange Agreement between our institutions was officially renewed, solidifying our ongoing partnership. Prof. Dr. Herbert Grüner hosted a well-attended Lunch & Learn session to promote NDU to our design students. Presentations included a current NDU student on exchange with us as well as a Wilson Design student who studied at NDU on exchange last year.





Office of the Chief Financial Officer

The Finance department held its summer event in July. Staff members from each division were organized into six teams, encouraging cross-division participation and collaboration. The teams embarked on a Wild Goose Chase scavenger hunt in Fort Langley, followed by a lunch buffet back at Langley campus to conclude the event.

The first quarter variance report (midyear budget review) confirmed that KPU was in a position to support a limited number of additional, one-time-only budget allocations for the current fiscal year.

CFO attended events/workshops not previously shared:

From January 2024 to date, I had the opportunity to attend several virtual events, webinars and workshops, and a couple of in-person events.

On January 9th, I attended EAB's virtual workshop on *Academic Finance Data to Improve Hiring, Course Planning, and Resource Allocation.* The workshop focused on the challenges and benefits of managing, examining and applying academic finance data. Key topics included the importance of understanding academic finance data, considerations data collection and trend identification, and how this data can be used to support strategic decision-making and ensure the long-term sustainability of institutions.

On February 13th, I attended EAB's virtual workshop on Reckoning with Relevance: 2024 Higher Ed State of the Sector. The session identified six key trends that are significantly shaping the strategic and operational direction of colleges and universities. It emphasized the importance of strategic planning and highlighted critical decisions necessary to address both immediate challenges as well as long-term threats to institutional sustainability. February 29th, I attended CAUBO's virtual roundtable on Resource Allocation and Budget Models. The roundtable reviewed key insights from CAUBO's Resource Allocation Survey, released in September 2023. Representatives from three institutions shared lessons learned from their experiences with budget modeling. The group discussed the strategic nature of formula-based budget resource allocation models, the conditions required to maintain flexibility in times of fiscal constraint, and the unintended consequences of growthbased incentives.

On March 7, I attended *IPAC's Summit Leadership in Disruptive Times* virtually, where the panelists addressed recent disruptive events spanning political, economic, social, technological and environmental sectors. They shared insights into how they and other leaders have navigated these challenges, highlighting both successful strategies and areas where leadership fell short. March 27th, I attended CAUBO's virtual event on *New Sustainability Financial Reporting Requirements and Implementation Toolkit*. The event provided an overview of upcoming reporting changes and guidance on how universities can adapt

their existing policies, processes and structures to meet new sustainability reporting requirements. The session offered tools and tips focused on governance, strategy, integrated enterprise and sustainability risk assessments, scenario planning, as well as relevant measures and reporting practices.

From April 11 – 12, I travelled to Washington, DC, to attend EAB's 2024 Roundtable for Chief Business Officers. The session allowed Chief Business Officers and Chief Financial Officers the opportunity to engage in interactive, executive-level discussions on the most pressing challenges facing higher education today. Topics included strategies for building financially resilient institutions, establishing a more efficient and effective higher education workforce, the opportunity and risks associated with AI in higher education, and a forward-looking discussion on future action planning. I also had one-on-one discussions on specific items pertaining to KPU and how EAB could provide resources to help navigate these issues.

On May 30th, I took IPAC's virtual course on *Integrity First: Values and Ethics for a Modern Public Service*. The course focused on key aspects of values and ethics in public service, with an emphasis on upholding high ethical standards amid rapid changes across all levels of government in Canada. The content was organized into three themes: the foundational values and ethics for public servants, ethical decision-making, and the protections and responsibilities associated with ethical conduct in public service.

On June 10th, I attended EAB's webinar on Addressing Rising Institutional Costs: Immediate, Short-term Tactics to Effectively Target Cuts and Eliminate Inefficiencies. In the webinar, EAB experts highlighted the core financial challenges currently facing the higher education sector and then explored some of the most promising and proven cost-containment strategies. Participants gained practical insights into cost reduction tactics and the importance of proactive planning to prepare for future financial shocks and challenges. This was well aligned to the strategies I am currently exploring for KPU. June 18th - 20th, I participated in the virtual CFO Excellence virtual training. This program was designed to enhance CFO expertise and equip participants for success by developing a strong executive presence, building effective teams, and driving organizational change. The training emphasized transforming into a trusted advisor, adding significant value to the CFO role, and ensuring the long-term success of the organization.

On September 16th, I virtually attended the *Time Mastery Masterclass with Kim Moody* offered by Mackay CEO Forums, designed specifically for CEOs and Executives to learn how to maximize productivity. Key highlights included strategies for saving time daily by transforming my to-do list, ensuring a balance progress across all areas, and achieving business targets without personal sacrifice, promoting both professional success and personal well-being. September 25th, I attended AGB's webinar on Strategic Insight for Higher Ed Trustees. The

webinar offered valuable insights on leveraging data for more informed strategic decision-making. It emphasized the importance of interpreting key financial metrics, identifying early warning signs, and determining when strategic action is warranted.

On October 10th, I attended EAB's webinar *Guide to Cost Containment Strategies*. EAB experts presented a comprehensive approach to cost management, highlighting key insights from their latest research. Participating partners received a list of effective short- and long-term cost-saving strategies, and a preview of forthcoming research initiatives.

Staffing

Tracy Germaine, Associate Vice President, Finance, is no longer with KPU, and the team welcomed Cyril Lopez, Interim Associate Vice President, Finance, to support the Office of the CFO until March 31, 2025. Thank you Tracy for your contributions to KPU and welcome Cyril! The recruitment process for the permanent Associate Vice President, Finance is underway.

Catherine Denton, Confidential Assistant to AVP Finance, joined the Office of the VP Administration in the role of Executive Assistant to provide her expertise and support during the Executive Assistant, Administration's maternity leave until March 2026. The recruitment process for the Interim Confidential Assistant, Finance is underway.

Financial Services

The Financial Services teams recently welcomed new members:

- Financial Reporting team: Shooka Heirat, Interim Accountant; David Bentley, Accountant; and Nick Smith's term Accountant position became permanent.
- Accounting Services team: Hardono Salim, Interim Accounts Payable Clerk

Betty Hoang, Interim Manager, Accounting Services, resigned in September 2024, and the recruitment process for the permanent Manager, Accounting Services is underway. Thank you Betty for your contributions to KPU.

Kristine Kidd, Director, Financial Services (Reporting and Budget), resigned in October 2024. The recruitment process for the Director, Financial Services (Reporting and Budget) is paused until a Manager, Financial Reporting is onboarded. Thank you Kristine for your contributions to KPU.

Procurement Services

The procurement department at KPU has prioritized enhancing Indigenous reconciliation through Indigenous economic opportunities and partnerships as part of its social sustainability efforts. To achieve this, the department collaborated with UBC to adopt and implement an Aboriginal Business Directory. The main goal of this initiative is to influence and track improvements in Aboriginal contracts, particularly in the direct award threshold.

A review of direct payments without Purchase Orders (PO) was conducted, and the findings were utilized in continuous quality assurance training to enhance efficiency and compliance in procurement payment processing.

- KPU Cloverdale Electrical Shop Renovation awarded in August 2024.
- KPU Richmond Central Washroom Modernization currently at the planning stage.
- Consultant Services for Campus Masterplan Update competition is currently posted.

Business Performance & Advisory Services (BPAS)

The reorganization of the Business Performance and Advisory Services ("BPAS") department, to create stand-alone Internal Audit and Business Advisory divisions, is currently in progress. The recruitment of the Director, Internal Audit position is underway. The Directors will be responsible for the recruitment of positions to support key functions in their respective divisions.

The Senior Business Advisor completed the first Follow Up Audit for Fiscal 2024/25. Two investigations have been closed.

CAMPUS AND COMMUNITY PLANNING

Raising awareness about Environmental Wellness during Thrive Month

In October 2024, the Office of Sustainability held events during Thrive Month to promote "environmental wellness," emphasizing the connection between personal and community health and a healthy environment. The Office of Sustainability organized two Wellness Walks, a Drop-in E-Bike Workshop, and participated in five Resource Fairs. The Wellness Walks, cohosted with KPU Wild Spaces, took place at KPU's Richmond Farm and Cougar Creek, Surrey. Participants discussed the links between nature and mental and physical well-being and incorporated Indigenous perspectives. The E-Bike Workshop, cohosted with HUB Cycling, allowed the KPU community to test electric bikes, promoting sustainable transportation. Over five days, Resource Fairs were held across all five campuses, allowing the Office of Sustainability to share environmental wellness resources with the KPU community. These fairs also offered the KPU community an opportunity to donate lightly used clothing as part of a University-wide drive for Sustainable Development Goals ("SDG") Week in March 2025. In collaboration with the Office of Sustainability, the Sustainability Club, and the Kwantlen Student Association, this initiative aimed to reduce clothing waste.

KPU's Silver Rating from the Sustainable Tracking, Assessment, and Rating System (STARS)

In September 2024, KPU announced that it had received a silver rating for its first STARS report submission. There are four possible ratings under STARS: bronze, silver, gold, and platinum. Institutions receive silver when their overall score is between 45 and 64. KPU received a middle-range silver with a score of 53.24. Moving forward, the Office of Sustainability will apply lessons learned from the reporting process to help inform KPU's long-term sustainability planning processes. The Office of Sustainability will utilize the Sustainability Hub to discuss options for advancing our STARS score in future submissions, notably by examining credits that will offer the greatest University-wide benefit and have the least financial impact. Overall, the STARS initiative will prove instrumental in providing KPU with a benchmark to compare itself against other institutions and best practices.

KPU Communities Trust Updates

Policy Statement process Campus and Community Planning and KPU Communities Trust ("KPUCT") have collaborated to develop a policy statement that establishes commitments for those portions of KPU's campuses that are proposed to be leased to KPUCT in the future, including the Paterson Park property. These policy statements explore the most recent planning and development contexts for each site, focusing on land-use, density and urban de-

sign, as well as outlining a range of potential housing scenarios. The work has been undertaken to further inform KPU's ongoing discussions with the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills related to the leasing of portions of KPU campuses to KPUCT.

The Archeological Overview Assessment process • As part of ongoing relationships with the First Nations on whose traditional territories KPU's campuses are located, KPU and KPUCT agreed to complete an Archeological Overview Assessment ("AOA") for the Cloverdale, Langley, Surrey, and Richmond campuses; as well as the Paterson Park site in Delta. The intent of the AOA is to assess the risk for archeological materials and/or deposits protected under the Heritage Conservation Act ("HCA") being present within the sites. This is the first stage of assessment and could lead to the need for an archeological impact assessment in the future. Initial site visits were conducted in October 2024. The visits focused on undeveloped areas and involved various key parties, including an archaeological consultant, KPU and KPUCT administrative staff, KPU Faculty member Brian Pegg (KPU Anthropology), along with First Nations representatives.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Information Security Services

Student Multifactor Authentication ("MFA") Expansion

MFA is currently being applied to all active KPU student accounts with expected completion by end of 2024.

Cyber Incident Response KPU Executive Training

The KPU Executive team has completed Cyber Incident Response training whereby an executive-level incident response ransomware decision tree, including a decision matrix and communication plan, was developed from these incident simulation trainings and has now been integrated into KPU's Cyber Incident Response Plan.

IT Application Services

Ellucian Student Portal (MyKPU)

The MyKPU working group and ERP Steering Committee initiated a soft rollout of the current student portal. The team aims to complete the student portal rollout by early 2025.

Ellucian Customer Relationship Management Advise

Ellucian Customer Relationship Management Advise rolled out its first phase to advisors.

BANNER Document Management System for Finance

Finance has completed its implementation of building and transitioning documents to the BANNER Document Management systems to take advantage of a paperless model for document management.

IT Infrastructure Services

Childcare Project

IT has been involved in plans for the childcare facility and child development program's space and recommendations for network connectivity and AV through the spaces have been established. A site visit with the network cabling vendor is recommended to determine the best pathway for network connectivity to the KPU technology infrastructure.

Blackbox Theater Project

IT has been involved in plans for the Blackbox theater space and recommendations for network connectivity and AV through the space have been established. Preparatory work in moving an existing technology enhanced classroom and an ATS testing center has been completed.

Langley Music Reno Project

Recommendations for the Langley Music Reno project's network connectivity, desktop computers, and AV have been made during the budgetary phase of the project. IT has met with the space designers and reviewed initial options for the design and layout of the rooms.

Hacking Lab / Front End Web Development Project

IT has been involved with the classroom setup for the Frontend Web Development program which is currently in use. Also, final setup of backend systems for the hacking program has completed.

Non-Banner Cloud Project

95% of all targeted systems have been migrated to the AWS cloud.

AV and Digital Classrooms

 Langley Simulation Labs - Phase 1 of this project is complete for the 4 labs (new headphones with upgraded audio).

MARKETING

Faculty Campaigns

Faculty Campaigns have been successfully launched for the Faculty of Academic and Career Preparation, Faculty of Health, and Wilson School of Design. The remaining faculty campaigns are being finalized and are scheduled to be launched in the next month. Advertising is primarily utilizing digital channels to promote the programs. The Marketing team tracks and analyzes the engagement daily to ensure KPU is targeting the right audiences.





KPU Branding

In fiscal 2024, the Marketing team worked with a marketing agency on a KPU brand strategy and creative refresh. This included a brand strategic and creative audit, updating the creative platform and developing new notional applications (graphic devices, photography, videography, illustration, animation style). The tone of voice, key messaging, evergreen copy and brand guidelines were also updated. This work involved consultation with staff, faculty, current students and the marketing advisory committee. The viewbook committee (teams from various departments work closely with recruitment, current students and the various target markets KPU serves) was also instrumental in working through development of the assets and finalizing the campaign.

After many months of refinement, KPU launched its new brand campaign in summer 2024. New highway billboards were designed and activated within KPU communities as well as new

target communities such as Pitt Meadows, Maple Ridge, Coquitlam, Abbotsford and Chilliwack. Digital billboards were also activated near the Alex Fraser Bridge and Tsawwassen Mills locations, and a new mural at Guildford Town Central was launched.

Digital Advertising

KPU's digital advertising continues to perform well. Top performing ad conversions total 409 this period. This is a 261% increase from the same time last year (113 conversions last year). In digital marketing, a conversion occurs when a user sees an ad, clicks on it and then submits their information through a form that records their information in a customer relationship management system.

KPU continues to experience an increase in overall impressions, clicks, and conversions for KPU search campaigns. For this reporting period, there were 951 conversions for our KPU branded search campaign. Last year for the same period, the search campaign resulted in 224 conversions.

There was a significant increase in conversions on the Google platform. This reporting period garnered 2,496 overall conversions. Last year for the same period, there were 1,503 overall conversions on Google (66% increase). Advertising efforts continue for the new Front-End Development for Interactive Applications program. This reporting cycle brought 218 conversions from Google and Meta platforms.

Recently, KPU launched a campaign specifically targeting student prospects in the Fraser Valley. searching for postsecondary programs. The campaign was very successful in generating a significant number of clicks and conversions at a relatively low cost per conversion.

Richmond Main 2050 - Computer Lab Renovation: Classroom 2050 in the Richmond Main Building was converted into a computer lab to support the Cloud Architecture & Security Citation and Front-End Development for Interactive Applications programs. The renovation included new computer desks, ergonomic chairs, motorized dual roller shades and pin-able surfaces for displaying student work.

Student Support Services – Furniture Reupholstery: The lounge furniture in Maple Building Lobby 130 was reupholstered with new fabric and colours. The furniture was given a refresh and avoided unnecessary replacement.



Career Development Centre – Storage Refresh: The storage and lounge area in the Surrey Career Development Centre office was improved with new storage cabinets, resulting in space that is both functional and professional looking.



Maple Building - Signage Update: To coincide with renaming the Surrey Main Building to the Maple Building, exterior signage at key entrances was updated to reflect the change, along with a QR code linked to the pronunciation of the new name, "maple," translated by Fern Gabriel, into handaminam, the language of the Kwantlen, Katzie, Tsawwassen, Kwikwetlem, and Musqueam First Nations.

Electrical Shop Renovation: The renovation of the electrical shop on the Tech campus has reached a significant milestone with the completion of the concept and design development phases. South Workshop 1810 shows a transformation that includes updating one existing lab and adding three new teaching labs, thereby increasing the capacity for teaching space. Meanwhile, North Workshop 1813 is showing a renovation that will introduce 51 wood structures, providing individual electrical demonstration spaces for students to work in. Faculty of Arts Spray Booth Refresh: A new spray booth for the printmaking studio, Spruce 130c, was installed in August 2024 and was ready in time for the Fall semester. This new booth addressed lighting and drainage concerns and improved the overall user experience.

Maintenance and Operations

Summer Maintenance Activities: Various maintenance activities took place over the summer to prepare for the fall semester. Of note are the KPU Surrey covered walkway column resurfacing, classroom maintenance, and Surrey Main water feature cleanout. The Pride crosswalks at Surrey, Tech, and Langley were all recoated as well.



Richmond Plaza South Entrance: The entire south concourse is being replaced due to end of life. Completion of this project is slated for early November 2024. This Ministry-funded project will increase the accessible space on the south plaza by 25%, providing a continuous and paved surface to enhance day-today activity and events on campus.



Surrey Cedar Air Handling Unit Replacement: A Ministryfunded renewal project involved replacing five end-of-life gasfired air handling units on the Cedar Building with electrical air source heat pump systems. Phase II will involve the final remaining two units on Cedar after completing the electrical vault upgrade.







Surrey Arbutus/Fir Underground Heating Loop: The final stage of the underground heating loop replacement was completed under the sidewalk between Arbutus and Fir. This centralized loop, fed from the boiler room in the Birch Building, was dis-

covered to have pitting in other sections of the campus.



Facilities Event Planning: Facilities Room Booking and Event Planning teams, along with the FSGs, supported nearly 1,200 space requests and bookings in the last six months. Included with this, along with working closely with KPU's Major Events and many other business units, was the planning and delivery of 95 large events across all campuses in the past six months with a minimum of 100 participants or more.

Annual Climate Change Accountability Report: KPU has submitted its annual mandatory carbon emissions report for 2023 to the BC Government, outlining our emissions, actions, and plans to continue reducing GHGs at KPU campuses. KPU's total GHG emissions in 2023 were 2,458 tCO₂e, which represents a 236 tCO₂e reduction from 2022. To provide context, natural gas use from space heating, hot water supply, cooking, and labs was 91% of our emissions source.

Ancillary Services

Food Services: With the start of the fall term, Dana Hospitality re-opened the Surrey campus cafeteria and introduced a new micro-market concept at the Langley and Richmond campuses. Each location has been rebranded and offers unique menu items, with South Asian cuisine in Surrey and a Poke/Sushi/Stir fry bar in Richmond. The micro-market locations in Langley and Richmond also now have a hot soup station and heat-andserve entrees.



KPU Campus Stores: The Campus Stores have seen an impact on sales due to reduced foot traffic. With the opening of the new micromarket at Langley, the Campus Store coffee station was removed from the sales floor and repurposed in the office as a work surface. Stationery and snacks were moved back to their original positions.







Parking Services: The loss of street side parking around the Tech campus has been causing significant pressure on parking capacity. In August, the rear gravel lot was re-graded and curb stops put in place to create a further 30 parking spaces on campus. This area has been designated for KPU parking permit holders only.



Print Shop, Mailroom, & Receiving: The Print Shop has the new flatbed and roll printers installed and operating. Production of signs, recently sent out externally, is seeing significant savings for KPU. For example, in a year, FSO requests about 300 signs at a cost of about \$55-\$70 each. We can now produce the same signs in-house for a cost to KPU of about \$10 each. Wayfinding signage at KPU can now be produced inhouse, capturing about 80% of KPU's wayfinding signage, while 20% will still need to be outsourced. This will bring considerable savings to KPU's Wayfinding signage.

Accessibility training - Disability Inclusion: Advocacy in the Workplace, is a workshop that will be offered on November 15, 2025 by Tim Reitsma from <u>Invisible Condition</u>. Three more workshops are planned for the following months (Dec 2024 – Feb 2025).

Training for Student Services: OEIC is offering two threehours EDI workshops for Students Services staff through Senomi Solutions, November 21 and 27, 2024.

Dr. Asma Sayed delivered a guest lecture/discussion on racism and development of anti-racism policy for a Policy Studies 3110 course taught by instructor Ellen Pond.

Other Updates:

OEIC Sponsorship Fund Open: The Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities introduced in September a new funding opportunity for students and employees. The OEIC Sponsorship Fund is designed to support innovative projects, events, and initiatives that champion equity, diversity, inclusion, anti-

racism, decolonization, social sustainability, accessibility, and intersectional social justice at KPU. Launch of this fund meets the requirements of one of the recommendations of the Task Force on Anti-Racism

UDEC Sponsorship Fund Open: The UDEC Sponsorship Fund (previously the PDEC Sponsorship Fund) is provided through the Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities (OEIC) and it supports events and initiatives that further the goals of equity, diversity, inclusion, anti-racism, accessibility, decolonization, and intersectional social justice at KPU. Funding is now available for 2024-2025.

Call for Members - Accessibility Consultation Committee: The OEIC made a call for membership to a new sub-committee to further support accessibility at KPU. The Accessibility Consultation Committee will focus on advising and providing consultations regarding accessibility needs across the institution (for example, reviewing policies and procedures, building plans, etc.). This committee will work in collaboration with the existing Accessibility Committee whose focus is to advise on the implementation of the Accessibility Plan.

EDI Action Plan: The Canada Research Chairs Program will be providing a template to all the institutions who have fewer than five CRCs to complete their EDI Action Plans. Institutions will have 14 months from the time the template is received (sometime in Fall 2024) to complete the Plan. KPU's draft recommendations are ready for incorporation in the template. **Anti-Racism Toolkit:** OEIC, in partnership with the Teaching and Learning Commons, will be releasing an Anti-Racism Toolkit. A draft has been completed.

UDEC first meeting: In preparation for the transition to the next university president, the President's Diversity and Equity Committee (PDEC) was restructured and will be known as the University Diversity and Equity Committee (UDEC) as of September 2024. Since September 2023, PDEC has been housed in and supported through the Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities (OEIC). Under the new name, President Davis will continue to chair the committee. The Vice-President, Equity and Inclusive Communities, Dr. Sayed, is the co-chair of the committee. The committee is an information-sharing and consultation body for institution-wide projects, events, and initiatives that require feedback on EDI, anti-racism, and accessibility-related issues. While OEIC is now a central office for people to consult with when needed, UDEC will allow KPU members to continue to share institution-wide information. JEDI awards and sponsorship funds will continue to be administered through OEIC.

OEIC set up a table at the **Thrive Month Resource Fair** in the Surrey Spruce Atrium. This coincided with National Coming Out Day, October 10, 2024.

OEIC set up a table at the **Student Resource Fair** in the Surrey Main Courtyard, September 3, 2024.

KPU Family Campaign Kick-off Breakfast

On September 20th, the KPU Foundation held its annual Family Campaign Kick-off with a breakfast hosted by the Foundation on four of our five campuses. The main event, held at KPU Surrey acknowledged staff and faculty donors as well as donors from the KPU Foundation board, KPU Alumni Association board, and members of the KPU Board of Governors. This year we were able to announce that more than \$144,000 was raised by staff, faculty and members of our three boards, before matching, bringing the total to \$288,000 raised. Candy Ho spoke on behalf of both she and John Grant's decision to create a new endowment this past year to support students who are single parents or students coming from a single parent household.

Ignite a Dream raised \$80,000

On September 28th, the Surrey Fire Fighters Charitable Society in partnership with the KPU Foundation hosted the 10th anniversary of Ignite a Dream at the Cloverdale Tech campus. More than 300 tickets were sold to this evening of wine tasting and food pairing to raise funds to provide educational opportunities for youth in Surrey who have shown great resilience in overcoming adversity. The event raised more than \$80,000.

Organizational Development

Employee Engagement

In August, the Campus Engagement Events initiative was launched, with the objective of fostering connection and wellbeing across the university. This initiative provides a vibrant platform for colleagues to come together and strengthen community ties through various engaging activities. By promoting interaction and inclusivity, we aim to enhance the workplace culture and encourage meaningful relationships among all employee groups.

Programs

The launch of Elevate: KPU's Leadership Foundations program was announced in October. This is a leader enablement program designed specifically for new leaders, with the goal of providing training and tools to enable success for those who have started a people leadership role at KPU with direct reports within the past year, whether they have transitioned internally or are newly hired to KPU in a management capacity.

Employee Workshops

Human Resources offered several professional development workshops and webinars to KPU employees which included: Effective Feedback & Evaluation Techniques for Admin Employees, Taleo Hiring Manager/Recruitment Support Training, Conflict Resolution for Managers, The Emotional Effects of Retirement, Managing Your Time and Energy, Generative Artificial Intelligence, Essential Skills for Managers, Managing Hybrid Teams, Having the Courage: Difficult Conversations Level 1 Foundational, and Supporting Employee Wellness.

The team also facilitated a variety of needs-based sessions for various departments/areas at KPU, including:

- Employee Engagement Workshops
- Faculty Chairs Circle Series
- Department Strategic Planning Workshop

In September, the first in-person New Employee Orientation was hosted by the Organizational Development Team, marking a significant milestone in welcoming new team members to our university community. This engaging event provided an opportunity for newcomers to connect with colleagues, learn about our organizational culture, and gain valuable insights into resources and supports available to them.

Staffing

In August, we welcomed Michelle Wootton to the team, KPU's first Organizational Development & Inclusion Advisor. This role is designed to enhance our commitment to fostering an inclusive workplace culture and will provide strategic support in developing initiatives that promote diversity, equity, and inclusion. The Advisor will work collaboratively with departments across the university to implement best practices, share valuable resources, and strengthen our community connections.

People Services

Compensation

The Compensation team, along with other key parties processed the 2024 Administrative Merit Increases for all eligible excluded employees, effective July 1, 2024, based on performance over the 2023 calendar year. With the recent revisions of the Terms and Conditions, KPU introduced prorated increases this year for eligible employees who were hired in to or started a new administrative role in 2023. Previously, these employees were not eligible for an increase until their 12month probationary period had been completed.

Health and Benefits

The Health and Wellness team has expanded with the addition of an Accommodations and Return to Work Specialist. This new role has enhanced the team's efficiency in reviewing accommodations and allows for proactive assessments of ongoing accommodations at regular intervals, ensuring employee success.

Work on the Wellness Strategy for KPU employees is ongoing. The operational plan for implementing the strategy has been finalized and was presented to the Wellness Strategy Focus Group in August. We are gradually incorporating elements of the Wellness Strategy into our messaging, and we will continue to develop resources and metrics to support a culture of beingwell.

Human Resources Information Systems (HRIS)

The HRIS team recently finalized the split of vacation balances in September 2024 between BCGEU and Administrative employees, making it easier to track interim placements of BCGEU employees in Administrative roles from a vacation standpoint.

Payroll

Payroll recently welcomed Mika Lim to the team, KPU's first Payroll Analyst. This is an exciting new position which is re-

sponsible for verifying the accuracy of payroll processing and data by performing audits on payroll activities and developing controls to ensure quality assurance.

The Talent Acquisition team refreshed and relaunched the Hiring Best Practices workshop in June of this year, offering leaders and those involved in the hiring process a choice to attend in-person or virtually. The workshop focuses on topics such as promoting a positive candidate experience, recognizing biases in recruitment, and ensuring inclusive and compliant hiring practices. Two additional in-person sessions have been scheduled for October and November and will continue to be consistently offered several times a year.

Risk and Security

Emergency Planning

Emergency Planning continues to advance the program through a series of key initiatives and outreach efforts. Several upcoming projects are in development to enhance campus safety and preparedness. The team has been actively promoting the program across the university through presentations to various groups, including Divisional Business Managers and the Animal Care Committee. A significant milestone in these efforts is the recent update to the KPU Safe App. The app now features a more intuitive design, making it easier for users to access critical information quickly and efficiently, further supporting the university's commitment to safety.

Occupational Health & Safety (OHS)

KPU conducts annual fire drills, as required by the BC Fire Code, to prepare building occupants for organized evacuations during emergencies. This summer, the OHS team, in collaboration with Facilities, successfully held fire drills at the Langley, Tech, Richmond, and Surrey campuses.

OHS launched an updated online employee safety orientation which mandatory for all new employees in accordance with WorkSafe BC OHS regulations. The course includes new content and a more interactive design. Additionally, a new online Supervisor Safety Course was introduced to help guide supervisors with their safety responsibilities.

OHS also published the second edition of its OHS at a Glance Report, tracking safety metrics throughout the year. The report is available on the OHS SharePoint site and reviewed by Joint Occupational Health and Safety committees.

Risk Management

Risk continues to support the university with various ongoing engagements including the renewal of the Cyber Insurance Policy and Fleet insurance Program. In addition, the team is currently meeting with functional leads across the university as part of the annual risk review process.

Security Operations

During this period, Campus Security generated 317 Incident Reports related to the following topics: alarms, property crimes, suspicious activity, trespassing, aggressive behavior, harassment, and intimidation. Security and Police identified a repeat bike thief, with charges against them currently pending. Security also supported the threat assessment team, campus events, VIP visits, and staff facing personal safety concerns. Outreach efforts included hosting the Surrey Police Service Chief in September.

Student Affairs

Strong Student Employment and Renewed Support

The Career Development Centre (CDC) shows 712 new stu-

dents registered on KPU's student job board, Career Connection, with students assisted through 102 career advising appointments and 183 resume reviews. Summer saw 85 student co-op placements, with another 70 in the fall term.

The CDC renewed their contract with Symplicity Career Services Manager (CSM), a customizable web-based platform used to manage programs and activities for students, employers, and faculty.

This fall marked the inaugural Co-op Connect event. In partnership with Alumni Affairs, this opportunity connected co-op students with alumni to foster career development through networking and industry insights.

Get Ready! Get Hired!

The Career Development Centre hosted another successful Get Ready! Get Hired! Job and Volunteer Fair, with over 600 registered students and 48 employers. The event connects students and alumni with employers looking to fill active employment posts. Employers showcase part-time, full-time, internships, and co-op opportunities that are perfect for students and alumni looking to expand their experience beyond classes and build their network. The event also brings volunteerism to the forefront to help students and alumni find life-shaping opportunities with community organizations in need of volunteers.

KPU's Seanna Takacs Awarded for Leadership on Disability Access

Dr. Seanna Takacs is being recognized for her outstanding work in higher education. A Learning Specialist with Accessibility Services at KPU, Seanna received an award from the Disability Resource Network of B.C. for her outstanding service, leadership and advocacy for disability access in B.C. and with national organizations, ahead of <u>Disability Pride</u> <u>Month</u> celebrated each year in July.

Seanna works tirelessly in supporting students and faculty at KPU to ensure learning access for students with disabilities and in dismantling ableism. Co-chair of the Accessibility and Inclusion Community of Practice for the Canadian Association of College and University Student Services, Seanna is also cofounder of the Canadian Higher Education Universal Design for Learning (UDL) Collective.

Seanna is now co-writing a guide for universal design for learning (UDL) that centres the voices of students with disabilities. Up next? The accessibility lead for KPU Wild Spaces plans to co-write a UDL guide for place-based/land-based pedagogy.

Sport and Recreation Offers Drop-ins and Wellness Resource Event

Sport and Recreation offered drop-in basketball and, for the first time, indoor cricket throughout the summer term. Both sports saw high levels of participation and engagement.

In addition, in collaboration with Student Health Promotion, a wellness-focused event for ARTS 2000 students led 40 students through an engaging presentation on resilience and how to access wellness resources on campus. This was followed by an outdoor social with lawn games and sports activities.

Expanded Peer Wellness Team

This fall, Student Health Promotion welcomed four new student volunteers to the Peer Wellness Team. The Peer Wellness Team is made up of KPU students who facilitate peer-led social events on campus, help students navigate KPU's health and wellness resources, and advocate for enhanced student health and well-being on campus.

In collaboration with Sport and Recreation, Student Health Promotion hosted three National Health & Fitness Day events on KPU campuses, facilitating several outdoor and indoor activities for students such as cornhole, football toss and giant chess.

Welcoming New Students this Fall

Nearly 1,000 new students attended New Student Orientation events across KPU's campuses. New students learned about the different resources KPU has to offer through the support of nearly 100 student leaders and over 50 staff from the KPU community.

The <u>KPU Collective</u> peer mentorship program also launched this fall with a team of four Peer Mentors and over 40 mentees. In addition, Mature Student Orientation hosted nearly 60 new students where they had the opportunity to connect and learn about relevant campus services.

Office of the Registrar

Inaugural OReg Day

The Office of the Registrar hosted its inaugural OReg Day, an employee engagement day to bring together over 50 staff from across three campuses for team building and employee engagement activities. Participants worked in groups to tackle problem-solving challenges, encouraging staff to think creatively and work collaboratively.

• At Burnsview Secondary we presented the basics of how to file annual tax returns and promoted KPU programs.

- Pacific Autism Family Network Fair: Discussed and promoted horticulture programs with prospective students.
- Invergarry Adult Education Career Fair: Attended the fair, generating numerous leads.

• Hosted tours and presentations for DIVERSEcity, SUCCESS, and various high schools throughout September and led a presentation and campus tour for newcomers with permanent resident status, encouraging applications for English upgrading.

• Represented KPU with the Brew faculty at the Vancouver Craft Beer Festival, engaging attendees interested in brewing and followed up by providing minilectures at the BREW Discovery Day and assisting students with their applications for the brewing program.



• Engaged with students at the School District 78 Hope Career Fair, encompassing students from Hope and Boston Bar, highlighting the Wilson School of Design.

- Promoted KPU at the Progressive Intercultural Community Services Society (PICS) Mega Job Fair on a live news segment.
- Visited various high schools in Langley and Maple Ridge, with KPU's booth drawing significant interest.

• Hosted a comprehensive tour of the Langley Campus for Summerland School, showcasing the Health, Environmental Protection Technology, and Brewing facilities.

• Attended a 2SLGBTQIA+ event promoting KPU and the Wilson School of Design.

Student Enrolment Services (SES) Web Refresh

The Office of the Registrar has relaunched two crucial student-facing web pages: <u>kpu.ca/registration</u> and <u>kpu.ca/ses</u>, which have been reorganized to enhance the student experience.

Additionally, new video resources have been added to support our students. These videos, available on both refreshed websites, provide step-by-step guidance on common processes such as registration, fee payment, and updating personal information. New videos are continually developed so students and the KPU community are encouraged to check back regularly for updates.

Zoom Appointments with Student Enrolment Services

A year after launching Zoom virtual services, SES has continued to refine these offerings to better serve students. Students can now schedule 15-minute virtual appointments to receive dedicated support at their convenience. This service has been well received, with an average of 10 appointments being scheduled weekly.

Expanded Support Partnership with Academic Advising

Central Advising and SES initiated a new collaboration during the fall registration period to broaden student support. In addition to 15-minute drop-in appointments with an Academic Advisor, SES provided personalized follow-ups within the same office area. This support includes assistance with registration processes, troubleshooting registration issues, providing tuition payment information, and much more.

KPU International

IRCC Immigration Status Changes

In September 2024, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, Canada (IRCC), announced further immigration changes to reduce international students, including tighter caps for study permits and changes to Post Graduation Work Permit Program (PGWP) eligibility. As a result of the numerous changes made by IRCC to the International Student portfolio, it has become increasingly vital to engage with our agents, enhance our digital media presence and strengthen our in-country presence.

Pre-Departure Sessions and Recruitment Events

In June 2024, KPU International hosted Pre-Departure Sessions and Recruitment Events in Chandigarh, India, and Kathmandu, Nepal. Carole St. Laurent (AVP, International), Ann Yuan

(Director, Recruitment, Admissions & Articulation), and Uttkarsh Bhardwaj (Manager, South Asia) engaged with newly admitted students, prospective students, family members, and recruitment agent partners.

Agent Appreciation Event - Kathmandu

KPU International held an Agent Appreciation Event in Kathmandu, Nepal, attended by Carole St. Laurent and Uttkarsh Bhardwaj to honour top-performing recruitment agents and further strengthen existing partnerships.





Recruitment Initiatives

Kathmandu: Uttkarsh Bhardwaj represented KPU at the Mega Educational Fair in Kathmandu, Nepal, which was cosponsored by KPU. He connected with prospective students, promoted Canada as a preferred study destination, and clarified recent IRCC changes. The event received local media coverage, further increasing KPU's brand visibility in Nepal.



Sri Lanka: Anuradha Wickramasinghe (Recruitment Coordina-

tor, South Asia) met with recruitment agent partners and prospective students in Sri Lanka, providing training and raising KPU's brand awareness.

India: Manpreet Kaur (Recruitment Coordinator, South Asia) met with over 30 recruitment agent partners in India to promote KPU programs and provide training to counsellors. Ramit Malhotra (KPU Field Representative in India) participated in several recruitment fairs, engaging with prospective students and promoting KPU programs.





Taiwan: KPU welcomed six visiting students from Taiwan Shu-Zen College and plans to visit their campus during an upcoming trip to explore further partnership opportunities.

China - Can-Achieve International Education Conference (Sept 11-14, 2024): Dr. Alan Davis and KPU's China representative, Jenny, attended the Can-Achieve Annual Conference. Dr.



Davis delivered a presentation on "KPU and the Job Market in

BC: Canada's First Bachelor of Traditional Chinese Medicine" which was well-received and generated increased interest in the program.



Local (Canada): KPU International hosted three high school visits, featuring information sessions, demo classes with faculty, and campus tours at the Surrey and Richmond campuses.

Mandarin and Cantonese Registration Sessions

In late July, KPU recruiters and student advisors hosted two registration sessions in Mandarin and Cantonese for students with language barriers, particularly those in pathway programs. These sessions helped students successfully navigate the registration process and enroll in their desired courses.

International Advising Updates

- Oksana Nhuien returned from maternity leave and resumed her position as an International Student Advisor.
- A total of 1,550 Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP) completion letters were issued to graduates from May, June, and September.
- Three in-person PGWP workshops were held in May, June, and September at the Surrey Main and Richmond campuses, with a combined attendance of 364 international students. The workshops provided guidance on PGWP application procedures and updates on IRCC policies.

Fly and Dine

The International Student Life Team (ISTL) successfully organized the Fly & Dine event, which provided students with an exciting virtual trip to the Rockies through FlyOver Canada, all from the comfort of Vancouver. Following this immersive experience, students enjoyed a communal lunch at an Italian restaurant, where they engaged in conversations and made new friends.



Flower Workshop

A Flower Workshop was organized at Civic Plaza for postgraduate students, where participants had the opportunity to select their favourite flowers and choose wrapping paper to create beautiful bouquets. This event was ideal for postgraduate students, who often have busy schedules balancing studies and work. Over 60 students participated in this engaging experience.



Trip to Victoria

A trip to Victoria was organized for students, thanks to partial sponsorship from KSA. Participants had the opportunity to experience stunning landscapes and historic sites, savour a delightful lunch, and explore the Royal BC Museum. This enriching journey attracted 40 enthusiastic participants.



Candle Workshop

We hosted a candle workshop that offered students the chance to craft candles using gel wax. Participants explored the art of blending scents to create unique fragrances and shaped their own candles. This engaging workshop attracted 15 students eager to learn the art of candle making.

International Peer Mentorship (IPM) Summer Welcome Social

The IPM Summer Welcome Social was organized as an engaging and interactive event where mentors and mentees met in person for the first time this summer semester. Students participated in a variety of activities designed to foster connections, including human bingo, musical chairs trivia, giant Jenga, Connect-4, and an assortment of board games. Additional highlights included a summer photo booth, a postcard writing station, and a giant interactive map for new international students to discover key Vancouver landmarks. The craft corner featured bracelet-making, sunglasses decorating, and colouring activities.

IPM Tye-Dye Teambuilding

The IPM Tie-Dye Teambuilding event brought together international peer mentors to strengthen their relationships through a creative tie-dye workshop. Mentors personalized their staff T-shirts for the term, promoting collaboration and team spirit through this engaging hands-on activity.



IPM Summer Socials

Events specifically tailored for first-term students were hosted by the International Peer Mentors. Open to all mentees in the program, these events provided opportunities to enjoy a variety of activities around the lower mainland, allowing students to build relationships with peers while getting to know the city in a



fun and engaging environment. These included Queen Elizabeth Park Picnic and Bloedel Conservatory, Central City Fun Park, Gobo VR Escape Room and Arcade, and an on-campus mingle and treat giveaway.

IPM Summer Appreciation

The IPM Summer Appreciation event was organized to thank International Peer Mentors for their contributions throughout the semester. Held at New Westminster Pier Park, the event featured a team-building scavenger hunt using the Goose-Chase app. Mentors completed various challenges, capturing their experiences through photos and videos shared in realtime. Following the scavenger hunt, mentors gathered for a meal at Pizzeria Ludica, a board game café in New Westminster.



IPM Fall Welcome Social

The IPM Fall Welcome Social was hosted to provide mentors and mentees with the opportunity to meet in person for the first time this semester. The event featured a variety of activities, including human bingo, a giant interactive map station highlighting key Vancouver landmarks, and a postcard writing

An outing was organized for students to the local Cineplex cinema near KPU Surrey to enjoy one of the biggest shows of the year, Inside Out 2. Our group had special seating and a dedicated zone, enhancing the experience. Students loved the movie and enjoyed complimentary popcorn and

fountain drinks. This type of event is easy to organize regularly—what could be better than watching a great movie on a Tuesday night?

Bowling and Pizza Night

Recent bowling activities showcased our students' impressive skills.

In collaboration with Scottsdale Lane Bowling, we reserved several lanes for students to compete against one another while enjoying pizza and drinks. This weekly activity has the potential to evolve into a regular term-based event, providing an enjoyable experience for our students.

Go Karting

While quality indoor karting options in Metro Vancouver are limited, "Fast Track" in Langley provided an exceptional experience. Students who enjoy extreme activities, speed, and competition showcased their talents on the track, with impressively fast average lap times. Participants enjoyed multiple rounds of karting, refueling with energy bars and water in between. The day concluded with a presentation to award the top three racers with medals and mini prizes.

Outdoor Games and Picnic

A smaller-scale, free event was hosted for students to relax and enjoy the summer vibes at one of the most popular parks, Bear Creek Park. The day included competitive relay games, tug-of-war, trivia, and music.

Time for Science

The Time for Science event provided students with an exciting visit to Science World, where they explored the wonders of science in an interactive and engaging environment. A large group of students participated in hands-on exhibits, captivating demonstrations, and informative presentations that sparked curiosity and enhanced their understanding of scientific concepts.

Pre-Arrival Webinar

A webinar was organized for new international students arriving in Canada for their first semester. This session provided essential information on what to expect upon arrival, covering topics such as insurance, life at KPU, and adjusting to life in Canada, thereby helping to prepare them for their new journey.

TAX Webinar

In collaboration with the Canada Revenue Agency, we hosted a webinar to provide students with valuable information about the Canadian tax system, eligibility for benefits, and tips for avoiding scams.

New Design University (NDU) Rector Visit

Dr. Herbert Grüner, the Rector of New Design University, visited KPU from September 16 to 20, 2024, to engage with faculty and students, further strengthening the partnership between the two institutions. During his visit, the Student Exchange Agreement was renewed, reaffirming the shared commitment to providing global opportunities for students in design-related fields. Dr. Grüner's visit fostered insightful discussions on expanding collaboration and enhancing student mobility between KPU and NDU.

SIN Workshop

In collaboration with Service Canada, we organized an inperson social insurance number (SIN) workshop to provide students with important information about Social Insurance Numbers (SIN). The workshop covered the significance of having a SIN and included tips on how to protect it from identity theft. Service Canada officers also assisted students with their SIN applications.

International Virtual Live orientation

The International Virtual Live Orientation welcomed new international students from over 15 countries, with peak attendance averaging over 100 viewers. This online session served as a vital transition before in-person orientation and featured multiple members of the KPU International team, including representatives from Student Life, International Advising, Study Abroad, OIRAA, Academic Integrity, and IPM Mentors. Participants received essential information and tips on navigating university resources, understanding academic expectations, and adjusting to life in Canada. They also had the opportunity to ask questions and engage with fellow students. This orientation not only prepared students for their academic journey but also fostered a sense of community among diverse backgrounds.

KPU Welcomes You - In-person Orientation

KPU Welcomes You is an engaging week of in-person orientation designed for new students, organized by the Orientation team with support from various university departments, including the International Department. Hosted across multiple campuses, this event welcomes over 500 new international students each term. During the orientation, the Student Life Team provided an official introduction, assisting new students in navigating the campus, answering questions, and offering essential information. Attendees learned about upcoming events, accessed valuable resources, and connected with fellow students, fostering a sense of community and facilitating a smooth transition to their new environment. The orientation booths played a crucial role in ensuring that new students felt welcomed and supported as they embarked on their academic journey at KPU.

EAIE Conference

KPU representatives, including Diane Purvey, Provos and VP Academics Carole St. Laurent, AVP International and Ada Lee, Manager Global Partnerships attended the 34th European Association for International Education (EAIE) conference in Toulouse. The delegation had fruitful discussions with international partners, exploring new mobility opportunities and collaborations to enhance global education at KPU.

TRAC Webinar

In collaboration with the Tenant Resource and Advisory Centre (TRAC), we hosted a webinar to provide students with information about tenants' and landlords' rights and responsibilities, and what to expect when renting in BC.

KPU Delegation to China

KPU's recent trip to Beijing, Shanghai, and Hangzhou resulted in the renewal of key partnerships and exploration of new collaborations. The delegation, led by President Alan Davis, included Zainab Al-Koubaisi, Director of Global Engagement, Andhra Goundrey, Dean of the Wilson School of Design, Ada Lee, Global Learning and Partnerships Manager, and Jenny Luo, China Field Representative. Key outcomes included the renewal of the MOU with Beijing University of Chinese Medicine for KPU's Bachelor of Traditional Chinese Medicine program, in-depth discussions with the Beijing Institute of Fashion Technology, and the exploration of student exchanges with Shanghai Polytechnic University and Donghua University. Dr. Davis also presented at the CanAchieve Conference in Hangzhou, showcasing KPU's innovative approach to BC's job market needs.

International Forum and Expo at Universidad de Guanajuato

Candy Ho represented KPU at the 9th International Forum and Expo at Universidad de Guanajuato. Her visit emphasized the importance of global learning and international collaboration, focusing on the UN Sustainable Development Goals. She connected with students and professionals, fostering crosscultural exchanges and discussions on career development and sustainability in education.

Global Indigenous Learning Experience (GILE)

The Global Indigenous Learning Experience (GILE) program, held from July to August 2024, was a hybrid program in collaboration with Edith Cowan University (ECU) in Australia. For the first time, KPU Indigenous students had the opportunity to travel to ECU for an immersive, in-person experience, fostering deeper connections and intercultural learning. In return, ECU students visited KPU for a week, engaging in cultural exchanges and joint academic projects. This hybrid model allowed participants to explore Indigenous knowledge systems and cultural resilience through both virtual and in-person interactions, creating a rich learning environment.

Office of Associate Vice President, Planning & Accountability

Student Experience

The 2023 Student Satisfaction Survey Power BI dashboard was published in August, providing the overall results of the 2023 survey (broken down by international/domestic student status), the survey methodology, and the ability for users to filter the results based on their unique needs. New for this year is a Comments tab, where users can view student responses to all open-ended survey questions. Users can search the comments in a variety of ways (e.g., keyword searches, filtering by domestic vs. international students, etc.). This functionality has also been added to the 2022 Student Satisfaction Survey Power BI dashboard and will be included in all Student Satisfaction Survey dashboards going forward. A screen shot of the Comments tab is provided on the following page.

Also completed during this reporting period was the consultation for the 2024 Student Satisfaction Survey, which involved several members and areas of the KPU community to assess priority information needs. The consultation process was initiated in late August and consisted of a survey-based consultation form and targeted meetings and discussions with key individuals and groups.

Produced a student profile infographic using administrative and student satisfaction survey data to communicate student enrolment and registration trends, demographic statistics, graduate outcomes, and more. The infographic was published on OPA's SharePoint site. Graduate Nurse International Education (GNIE) Graduates Survey: This is a recurring survey of recent graduates from the GNIE program, designed to provide feedback on the program and report on their nursing-related work experience and readiness for nursing practice in Canada. A combined report of the last three cohort results was delivered to the program chair in June.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Program Completion Survey: This is a recurring survey for students about to graduate from the BSN program. Students provide feedback about the program including their development of professional competencies and overall satisfaction. The most recent iteration of the survey was open from May to June and results were reported to the program chair in August.

Open Lab Survey: This was a brief, one-time survey designed to learn about Faculty of Health student usage of the open labs and preference for open lab times to enhance student experience. Survey feedback was collected summer 2024 and results were delivered to the Faculty of Health leadership September 2024.

International Peer Mentorship Program Survey: This program matches senior students at KPU with new international students in order to increase social connections and help them navigate services and resources while studying at KPU. Surveys were conducted of both mentors and mentees to elicit feedback on their experiences in the program. The surveys were conducted July to August and a report of the results was delivered to the Office of Global Engagement in August.

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Integrated Planning

- Monitored enrolments and applicants to estimate final enrolments for FY25 so Finance can assess the impact of declining international enrolments on the budget.
- Provided a list of all eligible KPU programs related to the Immigration, Refugee, Citizenship Canada changes in Post Graduate Work Permit-eligible programs to support international recruitment and also assessed the impact of these changes in international recruitment.
- Created a prototype of an Annual Program Metrics report that consolidates existing dashboard data to provide key performance metrics on 36 limited-intake programs and 40 open-intake disciplines about the health of their programs. The prototype was presented to the Deans and Provost for feedback and to facilitate discussion on the development of a plan for launching the reports in the coming months.
- Ongoing enhancements and updates of OPA Power BI dashboards: Academic Standing, Grade Distribution, Credential, Applicant Funnel, Enrolment Tracking, Current Enrolment, Enrolment By Year, Over-Enrolment, Seats, Employee, Retention Overview, Limited-Intake Retention, and others.
- Provided FTE data to Finance to support the Council of Western Canadian Financial, Logistical, and Operational Personnel (COWFLOP) and FTE data to IT to support IT infrastructure licensing requirements.
- Supported the KPU 50th anniversary book project by providing past years' student and employee headcounts.
- Provided BC post-secondary institutions enrolment data to Facilities to support their research on carbon emissions in the sector.
- Supported the Faculty of Arts in the preparation of their Cohort Pilot by identifying high demand Arts courses and providing the number of students that take the same courses on the list in the same semester.

Enrolment Planning

- Created the Stable Enrolment report for Fall 2024 as of September 17, 2024 in the PowerBI Enrolment Tracking Dashboard and made available a midterm period report in the same dashboard.
- Delivered a Course Planning Using Prerequisites dashboard to assist course planning in academic departments by providing an estimate of the number of students who are eligible to take a course (i.e., those who met the course prerequisites).

- Supported the chair of the English department in projecting course enrolments in future terms for ENGL 1100, 1202 and 1204 given the decline in international enrolments.
- Developed and distributed an infographic fact sheet that provides an overview of enrolment (e.g., headcounts, FTEs, and international student seat utilization) for the most recent semester and academic year for KPU decision -makers. In this reporting period, a fact sheet was produced for Fall 2024. Fact sheets are produced each term following the stable enrolment date and are published on OPA's SharePoint site.
- Provided Human Resources (and Payroll) with the list of instructors and classes with over-enrolment due to Last Class to Graduate (LCG) for Fall 2024 to provide to the KFA in compliance with article 11.02.a of the KPU-KFA Collective Agreement.
- Provided HR (and Payroll) with the Summer 2024 Final Over-enrolment Report due to LOU #11 (Over-enrollment Process) and Article 11.02 (LCG).
- Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Spring 2025, Summer 2025, and Fall 2025 are currently running and dashboards are updated weekly. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted, and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of international applicants.
- Applicant Tracking Reports: Provides weekly updates during the final six months of the applicant cycle on expected conversions of applicants to admitted and admitted to enrolled. Once registration begins, the report also includes the number of admitted who actually registered in courses. The weekly updates for Spring 2025, Summer 2025, and Fall 2025 are ongoing.



Creativity

Research, Scholarship and Innovation Partnerships

 Research Advancement Strategy Survey: this survey was conducted of 1,890 KPU employees active in the Spring 2024 term and was open from May 9 to June 2, 2024. The purpose of the survey was to support the Senate Subcommittee on Research to develop a Research Advancement Strategy by eliciting employee input on the role that research and scholarship play at KPU. The report of results was produced June 12 and aggregated closed-ended responses were published on OPA's SharePoint site.

Quality

Continuous Improvement

- Supported KPU International in their annual agent performance review by providing data on international student enrolment and performance by agent.
- Program Review: OPA's Quality Assurance Team supports the Program Review process, from planning to data collection to coordination with the Senate Standing Committee on Program Review (SSCPR). The work the QA team supported this reporting period includes:

- Course Feedback: Course Feedback surveys for Summer 2024 were conducted for 1104 sections. The Quality Assurance Team prepared and delivered 693 reports to instructors. In addition, 57 aggregated reports were delivered to post-probationary instructors. Deans received the reports for probationary instructors and aggregate reports for post-probationary instructors. We continued to use social media and incentives (one \$200 gift card) to promote the course feedback surveys and increase response rates. The response rate for Summer 2024 was 33%, the highest response rate in any semester since Summer 2019.

Accountability and Transparency to Friends, Communities, Partners and Governments

- Submitted the 2023/24 Institutional Accountability Plan and Report, which received Board approval in September, to the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills October 3. The report includes KPU goals, a summary of key accomplishments addressing our strategic priorities, and VISION 2026 performance measure results along with contextual information to describe KPU's role in providing service to our students and communities.
- Assisted Human Resources in the preparation of Human Resources Database (HRDB) data for submission to the Post-Secondary Employers' Association (PSEA).
- Completed the annual data submission to Universities Canada, which included domestic and international student enrolments for 2023 and 2024, as well as numbers of tuition waiver visa students, certificate/diploma visa and domestic students, undergraduate and graduate outbound domestic students, and continuing education domestic students.

Submitted data for Maclean's Facts and Figures 2025, which includes information such as student enrolments, geographical origins of students, and undergraduate tuition and fees.

Submitted the KPU cohort to BC Stats for the Baccalaureate Graduates Student Outcomes Survey (BGS).















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
